## Pioneers To Hear About Genealogy

When the Clarkston Pioneers meet in the Community Center on Tuesday, April 23rd they will be favored with a talk by Miss Alice D. Serrell of Rochester. Miss Serrell will speak on "Making Genealogy Live". As Genealogy is one of Miss Serrell's hobbies she is well versed on the subject and delights in telling others about it.

Miss Serrell was born in Avon Township, the daughter of Harry J. and Kate Davis Serrell. She is the great-great granddaughter of Enos Parker who settled in Bloomfield Township in 1823 and great-granddaughter of Arthur Davis, one of the first pioneers in Independence Township. The first township meeting held in Independence was at his home in April, 1837, and he was elected the first township clerk.

Miss Serrell graduated from the Pontiac City Schools in 1926 and then busied herself as a bookkeeper. She held several positions before accepting one at VanHoosen Farm in Rochester in 1937. She remained at the VanHoosen Farm as bookkeeper and secretary to Miss Sarah VanHoosen Jones until 1952, at which time the Misses Jones and Serrell decided to retire from routine occupations.

Among Miss Serrell's hobbies is travel—she went to Europe in 1953, around the world in 1956 and to Scandinavia in 1958. Other hobbies include Genealogy, Patriotic Societies, Philately and civic duties. She is a member of General Richardson Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution; General Alexander Macomb Chapter of United States Daughters of 1812; Detroit Society for Genealogical Research; Business Women's Club of Rochester; Y.W.C.A. Board (in Pontiac); and is on the Advisory Board of Bertha VanHoosen Hospital, Inc.

There will be door prizes and refreshments.

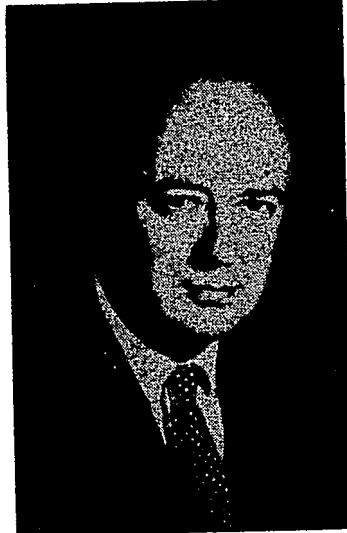

## Special Speaker At First Methodist

Ross J. McLennan, Executive Director of The Michigan Temperance Foundation, will speak at First Methodist Church in Clarkston on April 19 at 9:45 and 11:00 a. m.

Mr. McLennan, a member of the Detroit Methodist Conference of the Methodist Church, returned to Michigan after serving as Vice-President of Taylor University, Upland Indiana. He has been a leader for the "drys" since graduating from Garrett Biblical Institute in Evanston, Illinois. He

spent several years lecturing for the National Prohibition Committee, and has been a special lecturer on alcohol education for the United Presbyterian Church temperance committee.

He is a member of the National Temperance and Prohibition Council in Washington; the Methodist Church Board of Temperance, and served on a committee under the State Superintendent of Public Instruction that compiled a school textbook on alcohol education to be used in the public schools of this state.

Mr. McLennan has been a lecturer for the U. S. Army Air Force speaking specifically on the effect of beverage alcohol upon the individual in a highly technical job.

It was under the direction of Mr. McLennan that the "Near Beer Bill" was introduced and passed by the 1957 State Legislature. This bill made the selling, giving, or furnishing of "near beer" or "brew" to any minor a criminal offense punishable by imprisonment and/or a fine. Previously, "near beer" or "brew"—a low-alcohol content beverage that looks, tastes, and smells like beer, could be sold to anyone regardless of age.

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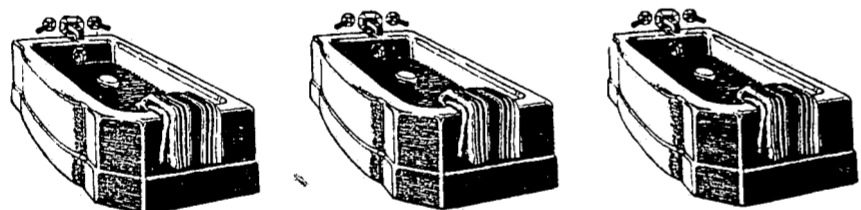
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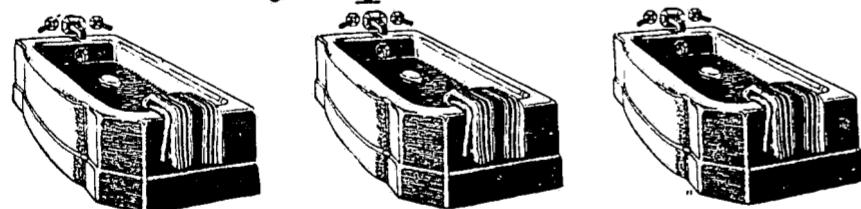

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**OPERATION FRIENDSHIP  
IN OAKLAND COUNTY**

Activities of "OPERATION FRIENDSHIP" in Oakland County will center about Pontiac State Hospital during Mental Health Week April 26 through May 2. "With 3,100 mental patients in the Hospital, our goal is to bring that same

number of visitors to the Hospital—one visitor for every patient," said Mrs. Mary Fink, president, Oakland County Chapter, Michigan Society for Mental Health. "OPERATION FRIENDSHIP" to be conducted across the nation, will be the largest educational project of its kind, aimed at increasing public un-

derstanding of mental illness, the number one threat to the nation's health.

"Visits will give new encouragement to patients", Mrs. Fink said, "and provide an opportunity for the hospital staff to show the progress the medical profession and related behavioral sciences are making in this vital health area."

Pontiac State Hospital officials have arranged special tours and demonstrations for each of four days during Mental Health Week.

Monday, April 27, has been designated Public Officials' Day. Activities will start at 10:30 A. M. at the Administration Building.

Tuesday, April 28, has been set aside for visits by clergymen and church groups.

On Wednesday, April 29, women's organizations are invited to visit the hospital.

Thursday, April 30, will be Community Day, set aside for visits by Parent-Teacher groups, men's service clubs, professional groups and members of labor organizations.

Each day's program will include visits to areas of special interest and clinical demonstrations. Various members of the Hospital staff will discuss some of the newer phases of treatment. Special emphasis will be placed on the Geriatric and Children's Units.

Groups interested in further information concerning visits to the Hospital are invited to contact Mr. R. L. Arthaud at Federal 5-8146. Oakland, Genesee and Macomb are among the ten counties in southeastern Michigan served by the Pontiac State Hospital.

"If desirable and practicable, the Planetarium may be combined with a guided tour of the other exhibits in our building," says Miss Thorpe.

Other displays in the four-story Museum center around the other natural sciences—anthropology, geology, paleontology, biology, and conservation.

The stars at night are big and bright—or in daytime, for that matter—at The University of Michigan Exhibit Museum's newly completed Planetarium.

A year in planning and developing, the 18-foot dome and large Spitz Star Projector went into operation recently. The Planetarium is part of the Exhibit Museum's new Hall of Astronomy.

"The Skies Tonight," as the demonstration is called, is one-half hour in duration. It can be adapted for viewing for school children from the third grade up.

Here's how it works: As the room darkens, there appears on the Planetarium's dome those stars visible on that particular date plus the moon, planets, Milky Way and even the sun.

Accompanying the sight are stories about the star pictures in the sky and astronomical data especially suited to various age levels.

In the finale, as the seated group looks into the domed sky, the motion of the stars is speeded up. "Within minutes they appear to rise and set just as they do outdoors all through the night," says Exhibit Museum senior docent (guide) Heather G. Thorpe. School and other groups num-

One of the most helpful allies of physicians in the fight against cancer is an informed public. This series of questions and answers is designed to help spread that knowledge. For further information, contact your local American Cancer Society office.

**What is cancer?**  
An uncontrolled growth of abnormal cells. Normal cells are tiny, independently growing structures, billions of which make up the whole body.

**Are all cancers alike?**  
No. There are many different kinds of cancer occurring in different parts of the body, and differing in their response to treatment. Cancers are alike in that they grow and tend to spread, and, if not treated, almost always cause death.

**How does cancer spread?**  
By cells growing from one tissue directly into another and by breaking through the walls of blood vessels and then being carried by the blood stream to other parts of the body. The cells also may enter the lymphatics, and be carried by the lymph glands.

**How fast does cancer grow?**  
There is no set rate of growth. Some types grow more in a few weeks than others in several years.

**7 DANGER SIGNALS**

1. Unusual bleeding or discharge.
2. A lump or thickening in the breast or elsewhere.
3. A sore that does not heal.
4. Change in bowel or bladder habits.
5. Hoarseness or cough.
6. Indigestion or difficulty in swallowing.
7. Change in a wart or mole.

If your signal lasts longer than two weeks, go to your doctor to learn if it means cancer.
