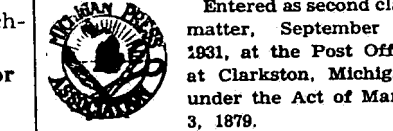

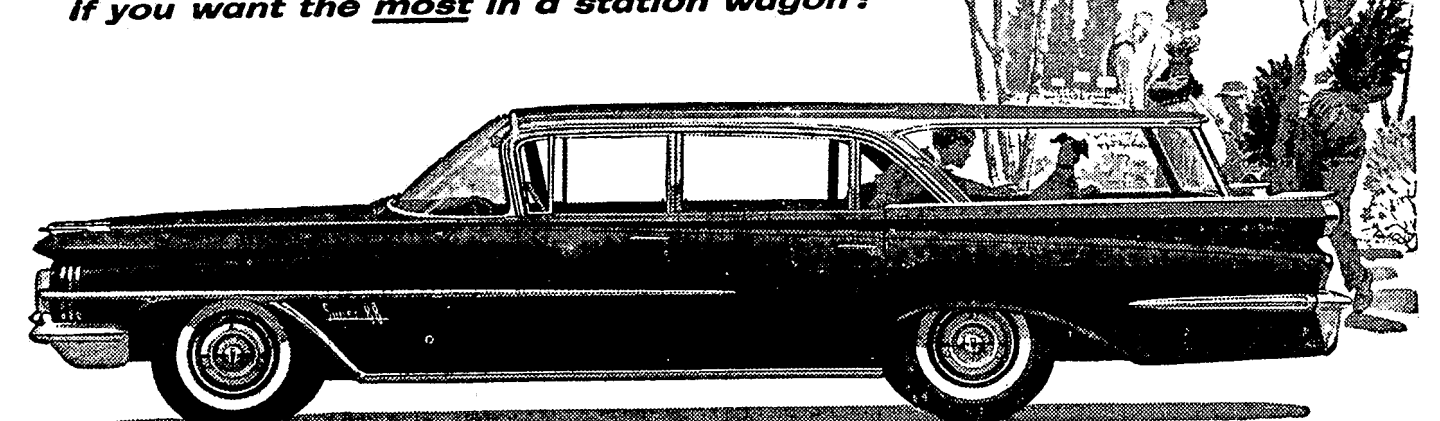

MSUO STUDENTS CENTER COMPLETED IN SEPTEMBER

Charter Class to have "Home Away From Home"
Another building is taking shape at Michigan State Univer-

city Oakland, on the Walton Boulevard site, midway between Pontiac and Rochester. It will be a one-story Student Center, adjacent to the first academic structure, now nearly finished. Designed to be a "home away from home" for MSUO students, the Center is scheduled for completion in September, when the Charter Freshman Class will take over the campus, according to Roy J. Alexander, Director of Student Services at MSUO.

This functional building is of contemporary American design, with a minimum of decoration, and is located to the east of the main academic building. The approach to the Center is an artistic covered walkway; many such walkways are planned throughout the campus.

Architectural plans for the Center specify ample eating facilities, including dining rooms, cafeteria and snack bar, spacious lounges, student activity areas and office space. A 40x70 foot basement recreation area will provide accommodations for ping pong, square dancing and similar activities.

This building will be headquarters for student publications, dramatics, club groups, student body meetings and many other extra-curricular activities. Here is where the Charter Freshman Class will probably make decisions on school colors, student policies and other important milestones in the growth of Oakland-Macomb Counties' first university.

Cost of the unit is \$700,000. Delos Hamlin, Chairman of the Oakland County Board of Supervisors, has announced that a considerable part of the amount will be contributed by Oakland County. This structure is one-third the ultimate size of MSUO's Student Center. Future additions are planned, to be constructed as the student body grows and the need arises for expansion. When finally complete, the Center will be large enough to take care of the entire student activities program.

MSUO expects to have a student activities program of wide variety, which will be planned cooperatively by the faculty, student body and the head of student activities, who will also be the manager of the Student Center.

HAWAII FEATURED IN "CINERAMA SOUTH SEAS ADVENTURE"

The Hawaiian Islands, rediscovered in 1778 by famous explorer Captain James Cook and so renamed from the original Sandwich Islands, have been a magnetic and romantic lure to world travelers and adventurers. In

Mark Twain's eyes they were the loveliest fleet of islands that lie anchored in any ocean".

In Cinerama-South Seas Adventure these lustrous islands are presented in their utmost charm. At the famous beach of Waikiki, surfboard champions are tossed by the waves in thrilling races. From the pineapple fields to Don the Beachcomber's, from the resting place of Pearl Harbor, to the International Fashion Show and to a memorable Hawaii wedding, the visitor finds warmth and happiness, and always, "Aloha".

SCHOLARSHIPS MADE POSSIBLE BY MARCH OF DIMES

May 1st is the deadline for filing applications for the new four-year College Health Scholarships made possible by the March of Dimes, the Reverend G. Burton Hodgson, chairman of the Oakland County Chapter of The National Foundation, announced today.

Application blanks now are available through guidance personnel in high schools and colleges in Michigan. Mr. Hodgson said. Winners of the scholarships will receive \$500 a year, or a total of \$2,000 for four years of college training in the fields of medicine, medical social work, nursing, physical therapy and occupational therapy.

Twenty Health Scholarships will be offered in Michigan this year, the chairman said. Winners, to be selected by a state committee made up of members of the five health professions included in the program, will be announced this summer. Awards will be made on the basis of scholastic achievement, personal aptitude and financial need.

All graduating high school seniors in Oakland County are eligible for scholarships in the fields of nursing, physical therapy and occupational therapy. Mr. Hodgson said. This is the first time in history that a national scholarship program of this kind has been open to high school students, he pointed out.

For prospective medical school workers, scholarships will be awarded starting with the junior year of college and extending through the two years of required graduate work. For prospective physicians, scholarships will be awarded to college upperclassmen who have been accepted for admission to medical school.

"The Health Scholarship Program is the first its kind ever attempted on this scale," Mr. Hodgson said. "Through it, a minimum of 505 young Americans annually will be offered the opportunity to become the disease fighters of the future. The program represents a tremendous

March of Dimes investment in human resources. It is estimated it will cost \$12,000,000 during the next 10 years. But through it, thousands of young people will find careers that count in the future of this country and for all peoples everywhere."

Through this program The National Foundation hopes to alert the youth of America to the rich possibilities in the health professions, the chairman said. These professions, the chairman said, are severely understaffed. Jobs in all parts of the country are waiting for every graduate.
