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



### SCHOLARSHIPS MADE POSSIBLE BY MARCH OF DIMES

May 1st is the deadline for filing applications for the new four-year College Health Scholarships made possible by the March of Dimes, the Reverend G. Burton Hodgson, chairman of the Oakland County Chapter of The National Foundation, announced

Application blanks now are available through guidance personnel in high schools and colleges in Michigan, Mr. Hodgson said. Winners of the scholarships will receive \$500 a year, or a total of \$2,000 for four years of college training in the fields of medicine, medical social work. nursing, physical therapy and occupational therapy.

Twenty Health Scholarships will be offered in Michigan this year, the chairman said. Winners, to be selected by a state commit tee made up of members of the five health professions included in the program, will be announced this summer. Awards will be made on the basis of scholastic achievement, personal aptitude and financial need.

All graduating high school seniors in Oakland County are eligible for scholarships in the fields of nursing, physical therapy and occupational therapy. Mr. Hodgson said. This is the first dent activities program of wide time in history that a national scholarship program of this kind has been open to high school students, he pointed out.
