WATERFORD SCHOOL SYSTEM FEATURED ON T-V

Waterford Township's school system will be featured on a half-hour television show on WNEM-TV (Bay City) Channel 5, May 23, at 5:30 p.m.

Filmed on location, the story of Waterford's school growth since 1945 will be told on the weekly "Pinpoint" series pro duced by the Michigan Education Association, in cooperation with educators from Flint, Bay City, Saginaw and Midland areas.

The May 23 production will focus on the need for schoolcommunity cooperation in providing for new schools. Waterford Township, which has passed each bond issue and millage campaign since 1945, provides an excellent example in this area.

Through the efforts of Superintendent William Shunck, a competent school board and community-wide democratic action. the township has successfully met a tremendous growth in school population. Since 1945, enrollment has jumped from 3,000 to nearly 12,000.

Waterford's success is even more unique in view of the fact that state equalized valuation for each child is half the state average. SEV behind each Waterford student is \$7,200; the state average is \$14,000. As a result the community has shouldered a large share of the burden in school financial support.





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

Aspiring young musicians from high schools in Michigan and surrounding states will study at Michigan State University June 28 to July 18 at the annual Youth Music Program.


About 250 youths interested in furthering their musical interests and abilities will partcipate in the three-week program spon-sored by the M. S. U. department of music.

"Private instruction may be obtained from outstanding artist-teachers on the various band and orchestra instruments, piano, organ, harp, voice and theory,'

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
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Trees for Tomorrow




