GOODWILL ASKS: IS YOUR CHILD A YEAR OLDER?

Mothers have a tendency to hold on to their children's clothes from one season to another, even though they know that the bathing suit or summer play clothes will be much too small by the time a year rolls by, Mrs. Helen M. Kopka, promotion director of Goodwill Industries, told a large audience of area women at the Goodwill Industries plant on Tuesday.

"I guess we don't want our children to grow up," she said, "and maybe we are guilty of yourful thinking."

"Our children are a year older today than they were in 1958, and they are bigger, too." "The purpose of a tour of

Goodwill workshops is to show people how much their clothes would mean to others if they were given to Goodwill instead of cluttering up closets", Mrs. Kopka said.

She pointed out that, besides helping handicapped men and women hold down jobs and receive rehabilitation, the clothes are made available to others at low prices after being cleaned, repaired and pressed.

Many women are both contributors of clothing as well as customers of Goodwill retail stores. Thus they donate materials that are outgrown or in need of repair, and replace them at budget prices. It is a capital gain for everyone.

"Let's not forget the spiritual gain that a person gets when he knows he has helped another," Mrs. Kopka concluded.

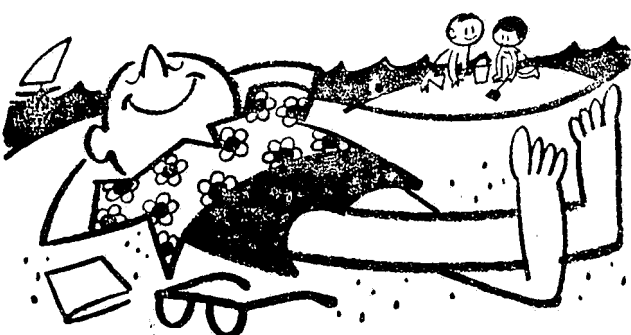

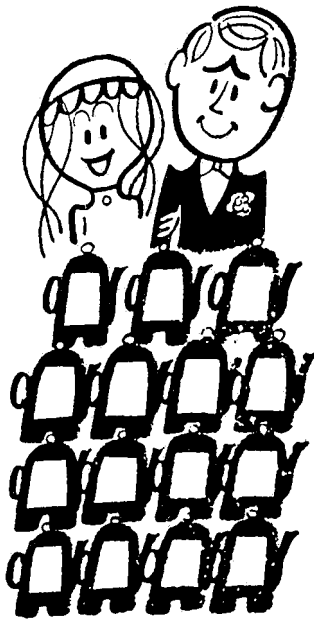

Librarians are also preparing a combined list of local history material to inform patrons what is available in North Oakland County.

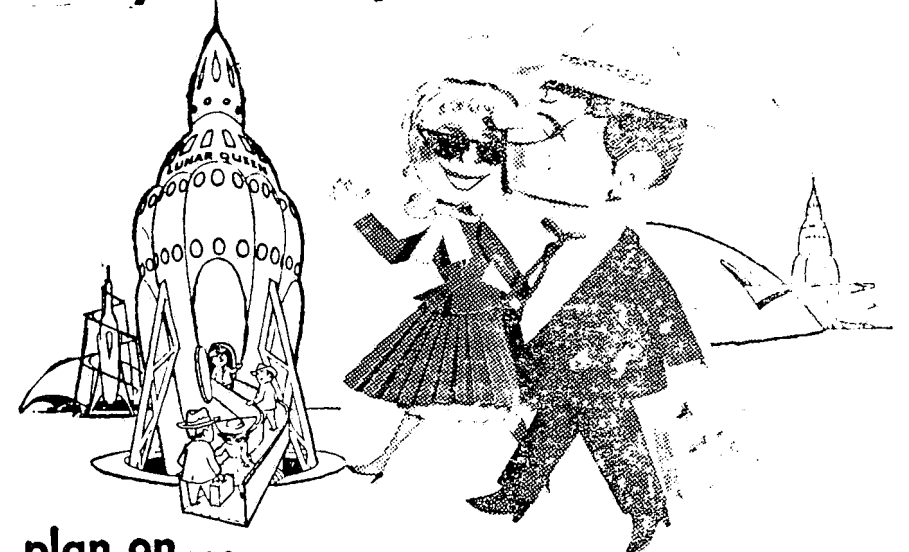
