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Bible School At Crescent Hills

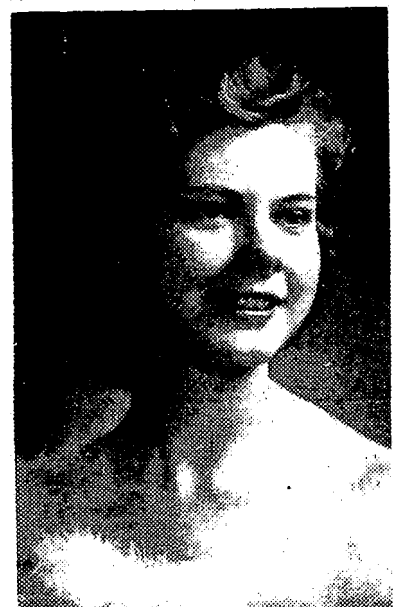

Church Celebrates At Andersonville

The Church at Andersonville celebrated its one hundredth birthday last Sunday. Many old timers, members and friends of the church gathered for the morning worship at 10:45 when Reverend Alger Lewis, a one-time Andersonville boy, brought the message. There was special music by the choir; a trumpet solo by Earl Ganther and vocal duet by Misses Andrea and Faye Jenks. More than two hundred enjoyed the pot-luck dinner at noon.

In the afternoon much rem-

iniscing was done and several ministers spoke briefly. The ministers were: Reverend Paul Vanaman of Clarkston, Reverend E. M. Main of Royal Oak and Reverend William Spence, a former pastor at Andersonville Church. Miss Minnie Mae Cook read the history of the church and there was special music by Mr. John Pierce, Mr. Weber Ware, Mrs. McCurry, Mrs. Garrison, Mrs. William Spence and her daughter, Reverend and Mrs. Main.

The message in the evening, following a lovely supper, was given by the Reverend Robert Vonoyen, pastor of the White Lake Presbyterian Church. The special music was by Messrs Jimmy Steenson, Schroup and Halsey and Misses Andrea and Faye Jenks.

One of the highlights of the day was the playing of the old organ by Mrs. Laurabelle Chestnut Maguire. The organ over sixty years old was replaced by a piano three years ago, but it was brought back to the church for the celebration. Judy Harnack presided by the choir and Alice Lounsbury was the accompanist for some of the special numbers.

One of the rooms in the church brought back many memories. The Day brothers of Andersonville had collected many old pictures, old chairs and other old furniture and had them on display.

The church was built in 1859, organized by folks who lived in Andersonville, but had to travel to White Lake for church services, and sponsored by the White Lake Presbyterian Church.

In 1870 a small house was built to the east of the church and used as a manse and later used as a community house. In 1890 a bell was put in the belfry of the church and not until 1902 was the church steeple added. Also in 1902 the church entryway was changed, a center aisle was added, benches were removed and pews were installed for which the members were charged a rental.

In 1894 the Ladies' Aid Society was organized and some of the charter members were present at the Centennial celebration on Sunday.

Because of a drop in attendance in 1941 the church was closed for a while and it was in 1942 that Mr. Weber Ware revived the activities in the church by starting a Sunday School. In 1953 the church was released by the Presbytery of the Presbyterian Church to the people of Andersonville who made it a Community Church. They immediately moved the church back on the lot, added a basement, installed a furnace, put on a complete new belfry and steeple, in fact the church was completely remodeled.

Reverend Edwin H. BuBois is the pastor of this very active church.

Open House At Colombiere

Open House for Colombiere College, new novitiate of the Detroit Province of the Society of Jesus, is scheduled for Sunday June 21st, 1 to 5 p. m. The new building is situated in Springfield Township, about 39 miles northwest of downtown Detroit, on Big Lake Road just off of U. S. 10. The Open House scheduled for this Sunday marks the climax of two years of construction work, and more than five years of planning. July of 1957 saw the ground-breaking ceremonies at the Clarkston site.

and just a year ago the cornerstone for the new building was blessed.

The principal structure of the college is five stories high, but because of the rolling terrain, six levels are included in the building as designed by Diehl & Diehl, of Detroit. The fourth floor serves as the main floor, affording entrance to the chapel and dining room, each of which has accommodations for approximately 200. The classrooms and libraries have been placed in wings adjoining the main central wing.

The new building provides accommodations for the first four years of training for young men who will enter the Jesuits from the Ohio and Michigan areas. The College has rooms for 80 scholastic Novices, 60 Juniors, 20 Novice Brothers, 20 professed Brothers, and 16 faculty members and guests. It has an infirmary, 10 classrooms, libraries, and recreation facilities for the young men.

Most of these men will be destined for the priesthood, a program of 15 years of training for a Jesuit. By this method of study and religious practice he ambitions to become the many-sided man ready for an assignment anywhere, that St. Ignatius, 16th century founder of the Jesuits, wanted his men to be. The first two phases of this training program begin in a novitiate such as Colombiere College. During this first two years, the young man is introduced to the Jesuit rule of life. He first makes the thirty-day retreat, living in silence, meditation, and prayer. The ideals and objectives of the Society of Jesus are taught him while he learns to practice humility and obedience. At the end of the two years the Novice takes perpetual vows of poverty, chastity and obedience. For two more years, the young priest-to-be lives in the same seminary but in a different part of the building. He studies the classical languages in particular, and the other courses of a liberal arts college. It is at this time that he begins to work toward his academic degree in some major study for which he is fitted.

A Novice Brother spends six months as a Postulant, and then during two years of novitiate, he takes his training in the manual arts. He then takes his religious vows and becomes the professed Brother. Jesuit Brothers are the "ground crew" of Jesuit communities. They are the businessmen, the technicians, the tradesmen who consecrate their talents and skills to help in the salvation of souls. Side by side with the priests and seminarians, at home and in the foreign missions, the devotion and ingenuity of these handy-men keep the Jesuit apostolate running smoothly. The Brothers are true religious in every sense of the word. Men consecrated to Christ by vow, they share the apostolic labors of the Society of Jesus. While working at the job for which they have both talent and interest, they dedicate this work to their own salvation and assist in the salvation of their fellow men.

The men trained at Colombiere College will be future teachers, preachers, administrators, missionaries, and scholars of the Jesuit institutions in the Ohio and Michigan areas. The

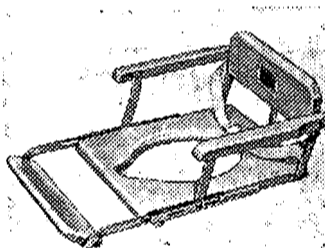

LOCAL WITNESSES TO ATTEND CONVENTION

Mr. William P. Strong, president of Jehovah's Witnesses announced today that the Pontiac North congregation of Jehovah's Witnesses has been invited to attend a four-day convention to be held July 9 to 12

at the IMA Auditorium in Flint, Michigan. Mr. Strong will lead the local delegation of about 110 persons.

The convention is arranged for Jehovah's Witnesses by the Watchtower Bible and Tract Society, Inc., located in Brooklyn, New York. A total attendance of 8,000 is anticipated.

"The purpose of the meeting," said Mr. Strong, "is to provide additional Bible instruction for the Witnesses enabling them to be awake to their ministerial duties. For this reason the program carries the theme of 'Awake Ministers.' There will be morning, afternoon and evening

sessions devoted to Bible talks, discussions and practical demonstrations, he explained.

Mr. Strong further reported that several members of the Watchtower's world headquarters in Brooklyn would be on hand for the convention and will appear on the program. Highlight of the convention will be the public address at 3 P. M. on Sunday, July 12, on "When God Speaks Peace To All Nations".

USE CARE IN WATER SPORTS

The State Police report that 27 persons met death in Michigan waters in May, 22 of them after May 14, and there were 25 injuries in 39 reported boating accidents.

Three swimmers drowned, five boat operators and seven boat passengers were killed or drowned in accidents, one skin diver lost his life when his equipment failed and 11 persons died in miscellaneous mishaps, including three children, two youthful fishermen and three who committed suicide.

Fear was expressed that ac-

cidental deaths will mount during the ensuing vacation months unless water sports enthusiasts pay more attention to safety in operating boats and engaging in other activities in the water. Water deaths for the first five months of this year total 51.

Following much the same pattern as the increasing number of cars on the highway, more and more boats are being found on Michigan's lakes and rivers with the opening of each summer season. More boats, like more cars, increase the exposure to accidents and call for greater caution on the part of the driver.

A new law passed by the legislature last summer and which went into effect in September requires persons involved in watercraft accidents to submit a report to a law enforcement officer if there is death or injury or damage exceeds \$50. Failure to report is a misdemeanor.

In addition, the law provides that any person who operates a watercraft or steers or controls himself while on skis, water sleds, surfboards or similar contrivances in disregard of the safety of others also is guilty of a misdemeanor.

Some of the more common violations of water safety shown in reports received on boating accidents at State Police headquarters include overloading the boat, reckless driving, standing up to change positions, failure to wear life jackets, water skiers maneuvering too close to bathing areas, and putting heavy, high-powered motors on boats too small to handle them.

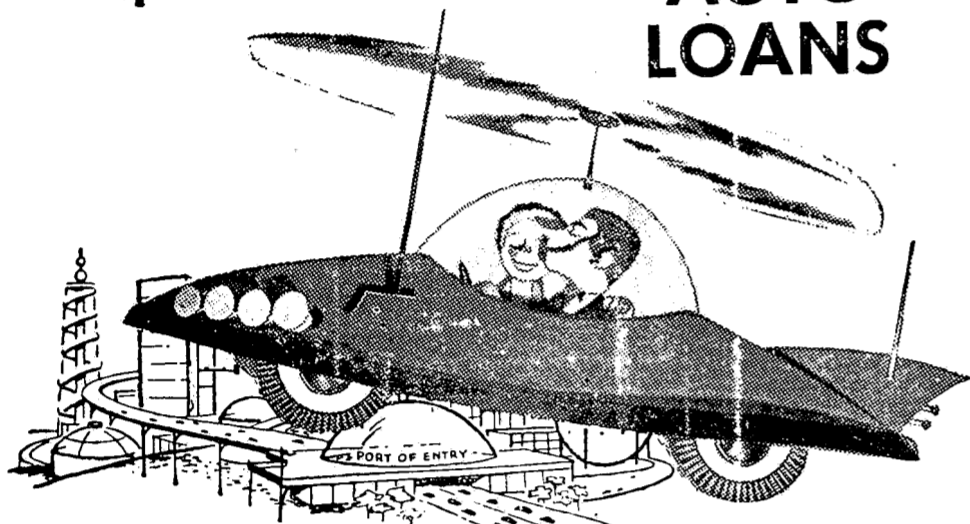

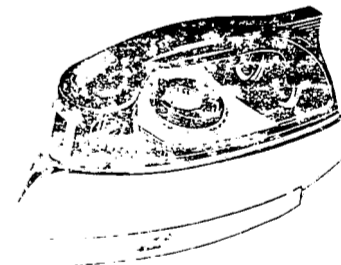

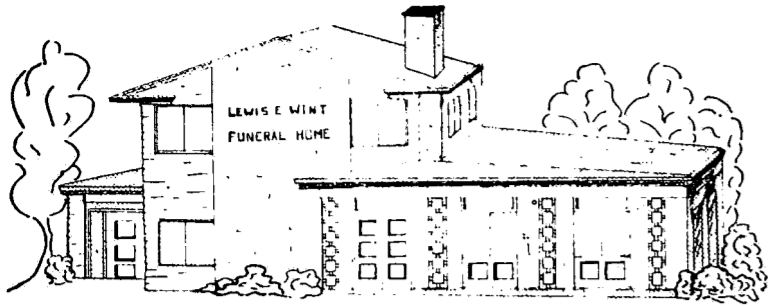

"There's no reason for anyone to hold up on buying his Savings Bonds", Cote said, "in order to await Congressional action. The Treasury has announced that, if Congress approves the request, interest rates on Savings Bonds will be increased retroactive to June 1."

President Eisenhower sent a message to Congress June 8 recommending improvements in the terms of Savings Bonds, in connection with other public debt matters. His message was accompanied by a statement from Treasury Secretary Robert B. Anderson proposing an increase in the interest rate on Series E and H Savings Bonds from the present 3 1/4 per cent to 3 3/4 per cent, when held to maturity. The proposal also provides for a rate increase of approximately one-half percent on all outstanding bonds purchased prior to June 1, 1959.

"It's a good idea to hang onto your present Savings Bonds, too", the State Director pointed out. "If Congress accedes to the Treasury's request, the old bonds you now have will begin immediately to draw a higher interest rate, without any action on your part."
