Methodist Minister Begins Fourth Year in Clarkston

This coming Sunday, June 28th, The Reverend William J. Richards, pastor of First Methodist Church, Clarkston, will begin his fourth year as pastor of this church by preaching on the subject, "Together with God." This will also mark the beginning of his seventeenth year as a minister in The Methodist Church.

The Reverend Mr. Richards just received the appointment for his fourth year of service in the Clarkston Church from Bishop Marshall R. Reed, Resident Bishop of The Michigan Area. Since succeeding the Reverend Mr. Bert Atkins, under whose ministry the church flourished and grew, the church has continued to show encouraging growth, now numbering over 850 members, and enjoying an average weekly attendance of 425 members, in two services.

Recently released by the Official Board of the church was the annual report of the church indicating that 138 new members were received this last year. The church's total budget showed an expenditure of \$56,722.00 which included funds expended in both the operating expenses and the Building Fund.

High point of the year's program was the new parsonage, the first unit of construction to appear on the new seven-acre building site near the Clarkston High School. This was dedicated last October 26th, at a cost of \$27,000.00. The total property owned by the church now has reached a valuation of \$203,000.00.

The church school enjoys an enrollment of 500 children with over 70 adults serving as teachers and officers in double sessions every Sunday morning. The Sunday School program is carried on in the three buildings with Primary and Juniors meeting in Wesley and Epworth Halls.

Under the leadership of Mrs. Russell Coltson, the Woman's Society of Christian Service has grown to a membership of 175 women in six circles. The Methodist Youth Fellowship has also shown growth numbering nearly 80 young people in the Senior Hi Fellowship, 25 in the Intermediates, and 20 in the College Age group. This year Miss Georgia Robinson and Mr. Clifford Irwin will be co-presidents of the groups. A Youth Caravan will arrive in town on August 1st and begin a full week of activity for the young people at the church.

On Monday, August 10th under the leadership of Director, Jean Fitzthomas, 24 teachers will conduct the annual Daily Vacation Bible School for some 350 children and young people. The school will be open to all children of the community and will take place in all three church buildings.

Added to the staff of the church this summer is the Reverend Mr. Milan W. Stitt, who will assume the ministry of youth and pastoral calling.

STATE FIRE MARSHAL ISSUES CAUTION

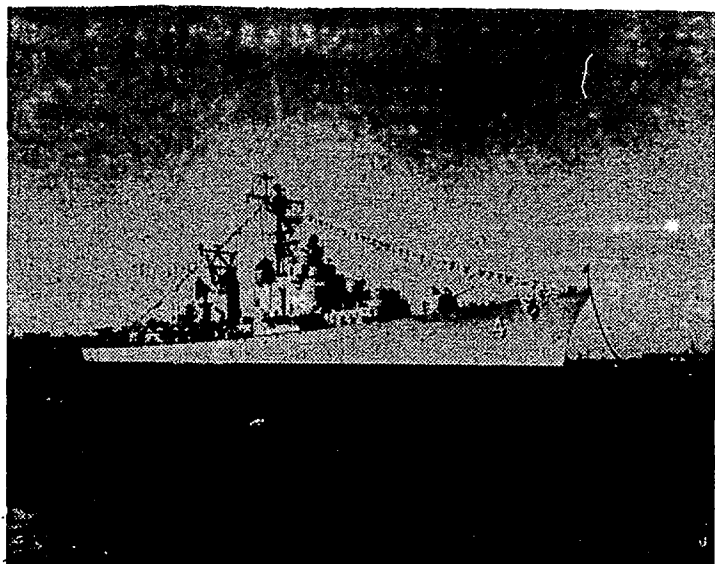
The recent appearance of a number of new and dangerous fireworks devices in Michigan has prompted the State Police fire marshal division to caution merchants and residents against risking arrest or injury as a result of illegal sale, possession or use of fireworks.

Two of the most hazardous "new ones" cited by Detective Captain Glenroy Walker, chief of the fire marshal division at East Lansing headquarters, are known as "atom perls" and "tire jokers". The perls are very explosive and constitute a definite fire hazard while the joker explodes when attached to the tire of a moving vehicle and could cause a serious accident.

All fireworks, with the exception of caps for cap pistols and sparklers containing no more than .0125 pounds of burning elements, are illegal in Michigan, Walker pointed out. Sale or possession is a misdemeanor punishable by a \$100 fine or 90 days in jail, or both.

If either merchant or fireworks customer is in doubt about the legality of any fireworks devices, he should call the local fire chief, police department, sheriff or State Police post for the answer.

Always use double-acting baking powder in baked products that are to be frozen. It is also a good idea to use pure vanilla extract rather than imitation vanilla flavoring says Evelyn Appel, instructor in foods and nutrition at Michigan State University. Cake frostings that contain beaten egg whites should not be frozen, says Miss Appel. You can frost cakes after they come out of the freezer.

VETERANS SELLING HOME SHOULD CONTACT VA

A veteran selling his home and GI mortgage should first contact the Veterans Administration if he wishes to be released from liability to the Government on his GI loan.

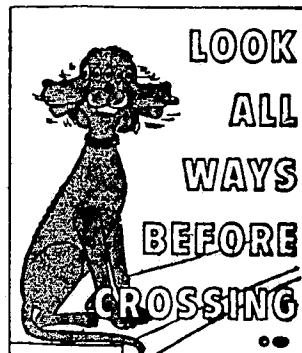
Such a release protects the veteran in the event the new purchaser defaults in payments, Lloyd H. Jameson Manager of the A Regional Office in Detroit, said today.

Jameson explained that a 1956 law allows veterans to be released from liability to the Government, provided the new purchaser meets credit requirements and assumes the veteran's obligations to the Government on the GI loan.

The new purchaser need not be a veteran, Jameson pointed out, and the Government's guaranty of the loan is not affected by releasing the veteran from his

liability. Release of the veteran from liability to the Government does not automatically release him from liability to the lender.

However, Jameson emphasized, VA makes no charge for this service, Jameson said, although the lender may require the payment of a nominal fee for the processing of his release.

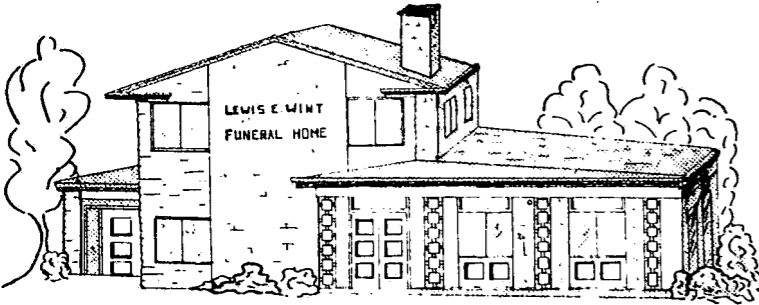

CARE WILL PREVENT FLASH FIRES

With the boating season in full swing and a greater number of boats in use on Michigan lakes this summer, Detective Captain Glenroy Walker, chief of the Michigan State Police fire marshal division, has urged caution in refueling to prevent flash fires.

He also reminded that under the law gasoline containers must be painted red and labeled "gasoline".

Most boat fires occur as a result of carelessness when spilled gasoline or its fumes are ignited either by an ignition spark or someone smoking. Some result from failing to turn the motor off while refueling.

Walker suggested that boaters give fumes several minutes to evaporate before starting the motor if gas is spilled while filling the tank. Never smoke or allow others to smoke while the motor is being refueled and do not clean parts of the motor or boat with gasoline, he warned. Even a friction spark is frequently sufficient to touch off a flash blaze.

Gasoline cans should be stored in an out of the way place where fire will not result from smoking or being too close to any burning object, such as a camp stove or kerosene lantern.

Quick care can make stain removal easier, remind clothing specialists at Michigan State University. Immediate laundering of washable cottons—that is, washing while the stain is still fresh and moist—may prove just as effective as special treatment for removing coffee, tomato juice, drink and chocolate.

Press the hem of a skirt with the iron at right angles to the hem edge. Pressing crosswise, or around the skirt, may stretch the edge into a rippled effect.

White or very light lining is the rule for a lampshade—unless it's purely for decoration. Dark linings absorb some of the light that should fall on the magazine or book you're reading.

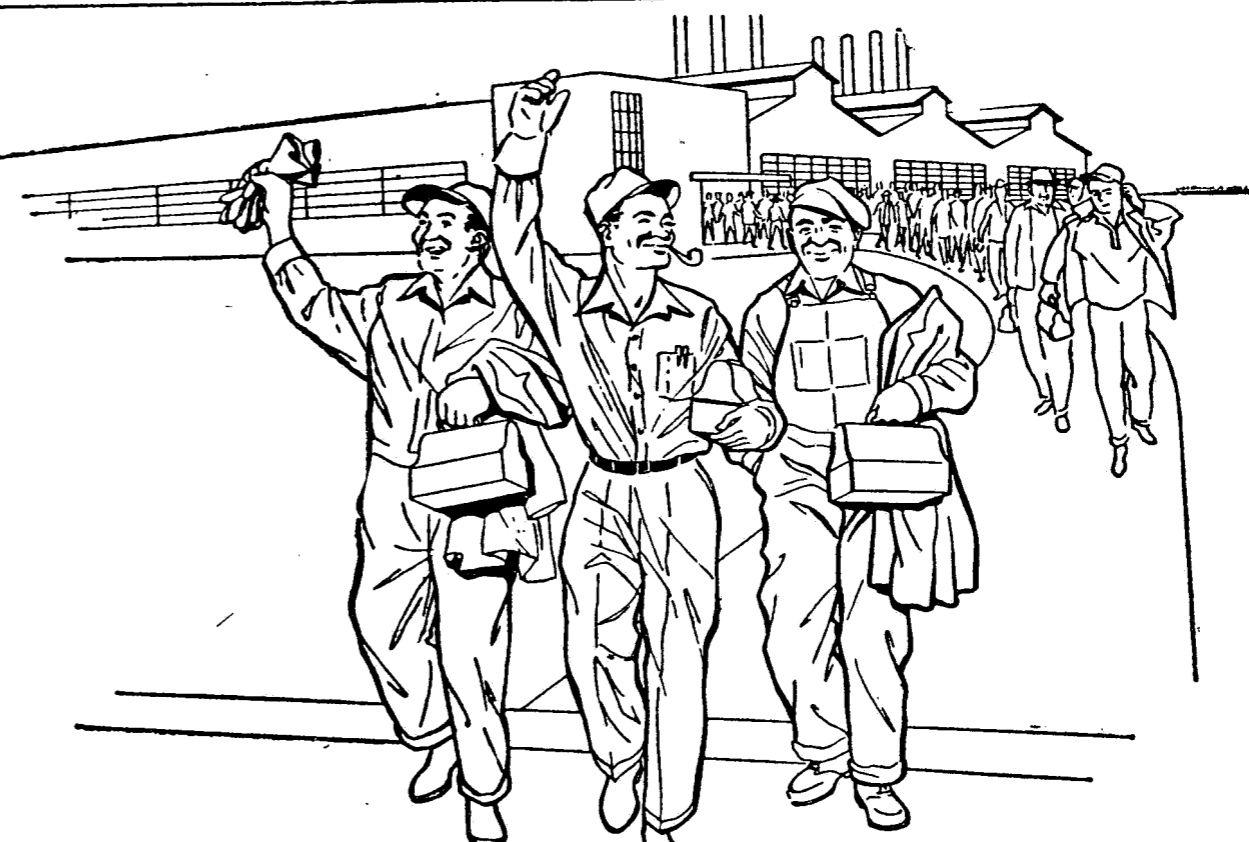

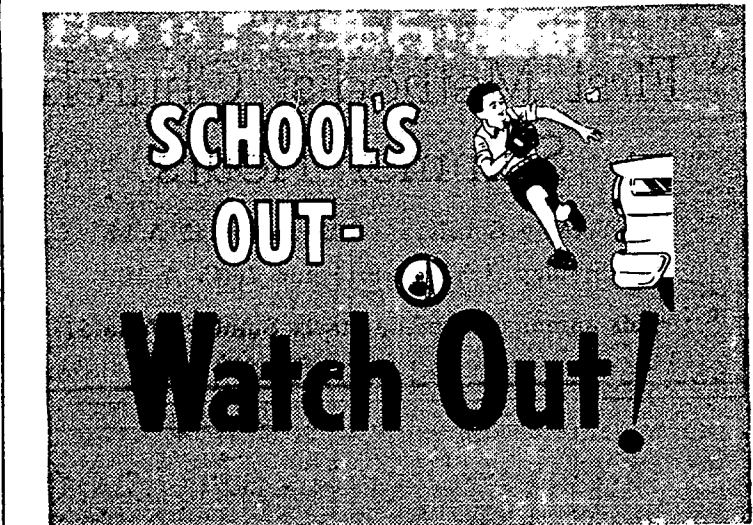

DETROIT EDISON CHANGES RESIDENCE RATE SCHEDULE

Detroit Edison residential customers who use more than 750 kilowatthours of electricity a month will benefit from a new and lower step which has been established in the company's residence rate schedule.

Approval of the rate change was received from the Michigan Public Service Commission May 28. Beginning June 1, it affected some 12,000 of Edison's more than a million customers.

Customers who heat their home with electricity are those most apt to realize the potential savings (about 11 per cent) on the kilowatthours used in excess of 750 each month, company officials said.

They pointed out that though the present average use of electricity in homes is considerably under the new end step, the

trend in residential demand is strongly upward. The increasing use of electricity for home heating is a strong factor in this upward trend, they said, and thus more and more customers may be expected to qualify for the rate advantage.

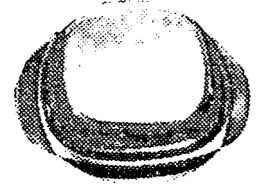
From 1948 through 1958, annual domestic use of electricity by Edison customers increased from 1.4 billion to 3.6 billion kilowatthours. At present, there are 1,200 "all electric" homes — whose facilities of course include electric house heating — on Detroit Edison lines.

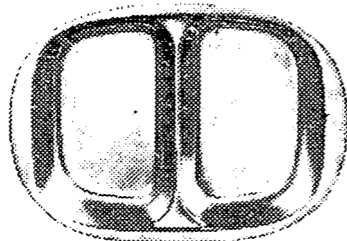
