## Crusade Results Please Leaders

Tuesday afternoon The Rev. Mr. Glenn Trembath, Director of The Ground-Breaking Crusade of First Methodist Church, reported that \$87,194.80 had been received by the church with over 65 families still to be heard from. With reports still to come, he stated that it looks as if the total will go well over \$90,000.00. While final reports are still incomplete The Clarkston News will print a full resume of the Crusade in next week's issue.

Rev. William J. Richards, the pastor, indicated that many more families of the church and community participated in this year's Crusade than the one held in 1957. He further stated that such loyalties and sacrifices on the part of his constituents make a tremendous impact on the church. He especially congratulated the over 100 workers whose devotion and loyalty has made the construction of the new church possible next year.

Under the direction of Visitation Chairmen, Lee Volberding and Paul Hinkley, nearly 600 homes have been contacted by the men of the church. These men reported at the Achievement Service held Monday night in the church that the participation on the part of the people they called on was a most inspiring experience, and the amount of subscriptions raised was beyond their expectations.

The General Chairmen of the Ground-Breaking Crusade, Philip Smith and Jack Frost voiced their thanks for all the devoted help they received. This was directed toward the women of the church who served the meals to the callers as well as to the workers.



## LOCAL STUDENTS NAMED SEMIFINALISTS IN MERIT SCHOLARSHIP COMPETITION

Principal S. F. Goedde of Clarkston today announced that two local students have been named semifinalists in the 1959-60 National Merit Scholarship competition. They are David Sanford and John Kieft.

The local students are among 10,000 of the highest scorers on the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test, the nation-wide test of educational development given in over 14,500 high schools last spring.

The semifinalists named today outscored over 550,000 classmates and thus moved a step closer to the goal of all — winning one of the coveted Merit Scholarships to be awarded in the 1959-60 Program. The group of 10,000 semifinalists is composed of the highest scorers in each state, prorated according to state population.

The semifinalists now face another rigorous three-hour examination, the Scholastic Aptitude Test of the College Entrance Examination Board, which will further confirm their high scores on the NMSQT. This second test will be given in testing centers throughout the U. S. on December 5, 1959. Those who repeat their high scores on this second test will become finalists in the competition.

John M. Stalnaker, President of National Merit Scholarship Corporation, which conducts the annual Program, predicts that over 95 per-cent of the Semifinalists will get past the second hurdle — the December 5th examination — and become finalists.

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
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**RENT ADJUSTMENTS

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
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
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nature in the black funneled clouds of a tornado. More than any other kind of storm known in Michigan, the possibility of a tornado striking suddenly, wiping out whole families, even communities, produces a special anxiety in the tornado belt of the state.

The tornado which hit eastern Michigan from Flint to Lakeport on June 8, 1953, is listed in the most destructive in the nation since the year 1900. It killed 116. It will be remembered by hundreds who suffered injury or the loss of homes and property.

But every year in Michigan, one type of traffic violation results in the death of about the same number of people as died in that record tornado. They don't all die at once, or in the same area, or in an awful environment, so the grim impact of number goes relatively unnoticed.

They die one or two or three at a time, in different places, in traffic accidents produced by a driver who went through a stop sign, ran a red light, ignored a "yield" sign. These little violations happen all the time and there probably isn't a driver, still living, who hasn't committed them on occasion. There are also a considerable number of drivers no longer living who committed the same little violation.

Unlike tornadoes, there is no "violation belt" across the state in which these fatalities occur. They happen everywhere, anytime of day or night.

Last year 24 people died when a stop and go light was violated.

Fifteen of these were in urban locations. But 209 fatal and injury accidents involving this violation were in rural areas, compared with 133 recorded as urban.

Of the 54 who died when a stop sign was violated, 48 of these were in rural areas. And of the total fatal and injury accidents where the stop sign was violated 478 were in rural locations compared with 125 for urban.

In disregarding other types of warning signs or signals, another 30 people died. Of these 22 were rural location fatalities. Of the total fatal and injury accidents recorded for this violation, 112 were rural and 20 were urban.


