PHEASANT SEASON OPENS MONDAY Bang! With pheasant season opening Monday (Oct. 19) it doesn't take much longer than a gunshot to cut off a lot of important telephone calls.

In fact it would be quicker than you could say Jack Robinson. Michigan Bell Telephone Company pointed out there were 216 cases of cable damage caused by shotgun blasts last year and renewed its annual plea to hunters: "Please don't disable our cables."

Ironically, a shotgun-damaged cable could affect the lives of two classes of people in which the hunter should be most interested—his own, and those of farmers, who often are hunters' hosts, permitting them to hunt on their lands. Each year, there are nearly as many hunter injuries as there are cable damage reports. And in most cases, a telephone comes into use when a hunter's friends quickly look for help—whether it be calls to the doctor, ambulance, hospital, drug store, or family. You might say it's possible for a hunter's life to hang by a telephone line—which won't work if it's shot full of holes. And farmers are not at all happy if they can't get a phone call through because of damaged cable facilities.

Michigan Bell also pointed out that willful damage is discouraged by penalties ranging up to \$4,000 plus four years imprisonment. In addition, a hunter can be held financially liable for damages—which can go as high as several hundred dollars. Most damage, of course, is caused by over-zealous nimrods.
