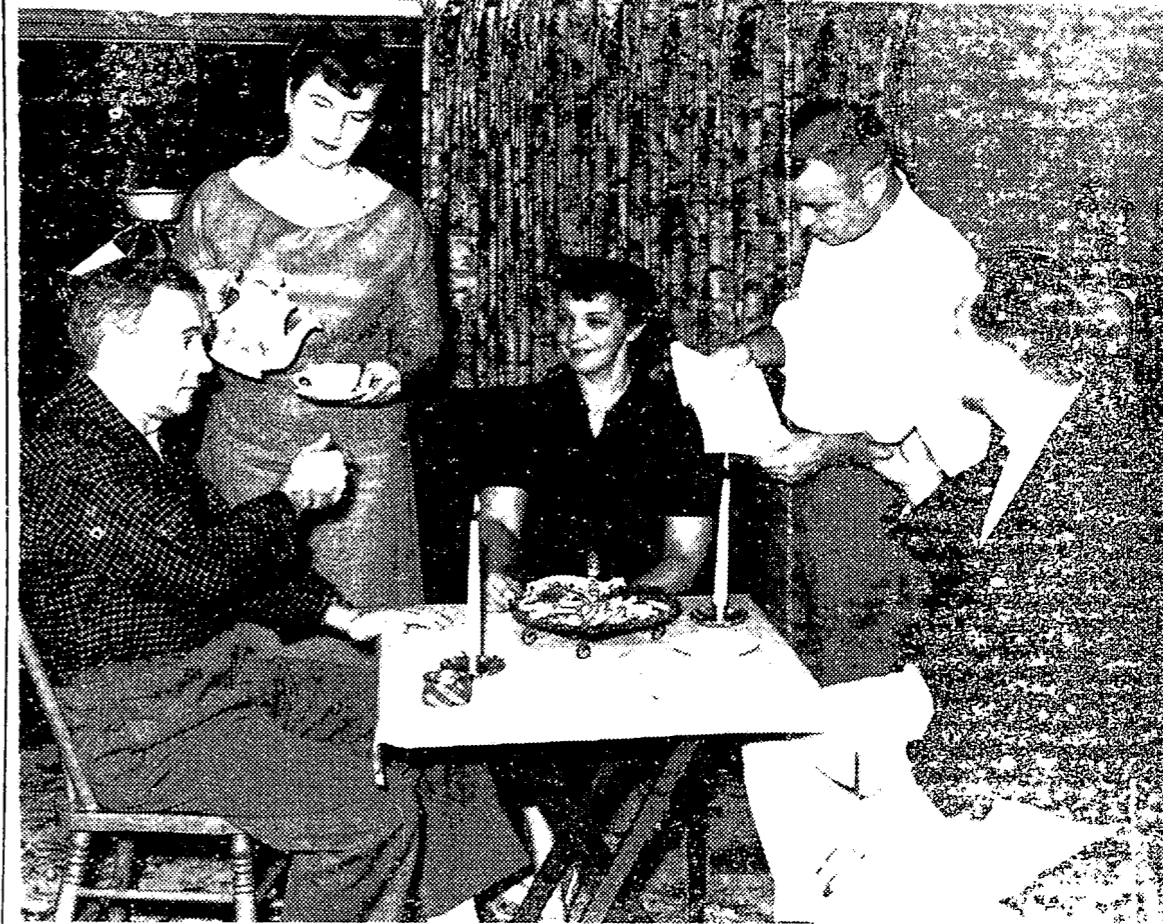

Cynthia is active in school, having had a part last year in their annual play and she belongs to the Future Teachers of America Club. She hopes to be eventually a secondary education teacher.

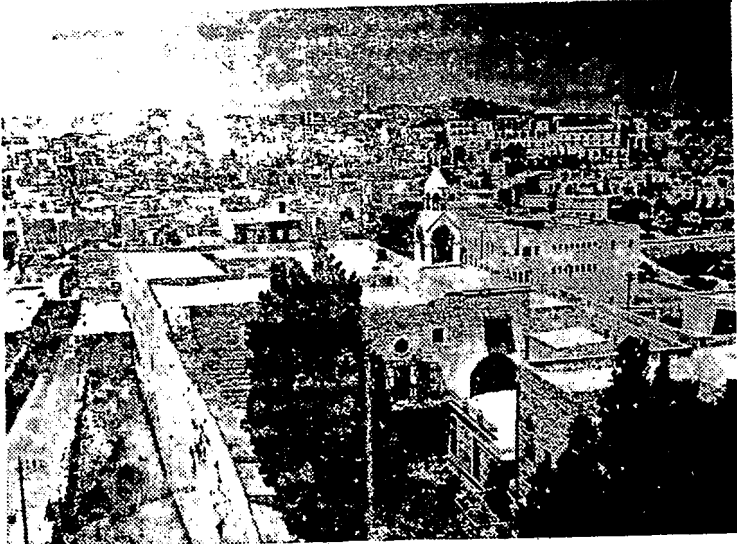
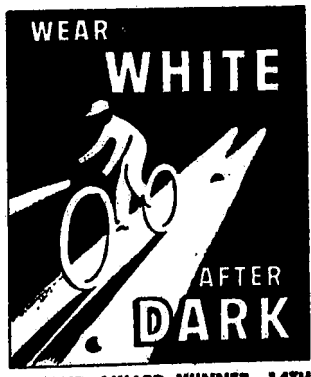
Other school activities have been in the Racket or Pep Club at school. Cynthia made top prize in selling magazines to earn money toward the senior trip.

U. S. LEADERS DISTRICTED BY SOVIETS

Russians very often have the idea that the American people are entirely different from their leaders in government, says University of Michigan student Roger Anderson of 393 West Iroquois, Pontiac.

Anderson, a member of the 1959 U.S. - USSR student exchange under a Lisle Fellowship, says: "The Russians regard our people as good and the government, somehow mysteriously, as bad. I found it very difficult to convince them that our government is controlled by the majority of our population and our rightfully elected representatives."

"As a matter of fact, I found myself making roughly the same distinction between the people and the existing government of the Soviet Union. But I hope my reasons are more logical."

Anderson found an almost universal pride in Russian technical progress since the revolution, often based on distorted statistics.

Russia's boast of producing as much wheat as five other countries turned out to be a comparison with Switzerland, Denmark, Greenland, Iceland and Belgium.

Anderson says it was obvious to him that the Soviets desire a higher standard of living. "This is, of course, perfectly natural. One of the quickest ways to this goal, in their opinion, is a great acceleration in apartment building construction and housing space for each family."

"They seek enjoyment just like most people. They look to the quietness of parks and the excitement of sports competition. They enjoy winning a game of volleyball and like to laugh at a good joke."

"Up to this point we agreed on what we wanted from life. We differed on how to achieve these desires."

TIRED OF WINTER? U. S. ASTRONOMER SAYS: 'GO SOUTH'

If you prefer the sultry heat of summer to winter's cold crisp days, you should hasten south

of the equator immediately, a University of Michigan astronomer advises.

"The reason? 'The official beginning of winter comes at 9:35 a.m. Tuesday (Dec. 22),' says Associate Prof. Hazel M. Losh (Ph. D.)."

"That is the instant of the sun's turning north, or the winter solstice, when the sun reaches its most southerly point in its apparent yearly trip around the earth."

"On that day, the sun will swing its shortest daily arc across the southern sky, with the day being about nine hours long and the night - 15 hours." Thus Dec. 22 will be the shortest day of the year, Professor Losh explains.

"The date of Christmas is believed to bear some real relation to the sun and the winter solstice. It is likely that the date of the Christian celebration was set to agree closely with the earlier pagan festival attendant upon the rejoicing of the sun's turning eastward."

"On Dec. 22, the sun will start its long trek north again toward summer, continuing to lengthen days and shorten nights until our longest days of June," she notes. "Conversely, in the southern

hemisphere, the summer season will be starting at the same moment as our winter, for the seasons are reversed in the two halves of the globe.

"Contrary to many popular beliefs," Professor Losh continues, "the seasons do not depend primarily upon the variation of the earth's distance from the sun, but rather on the 23 1/2 degree tilt of the earth's axis."

"During our winter, the earth's north pole is tipped away from the sun, and we have our cold weather because the sun is shining on the northern hemisphere at an oblique angle, while at the same time the earth's south pole is tilted 23 1/2 degrees toward the sun, with the southern hemisphere getting the most heat of the year."

"However, we in the north benefit by the fact that at this time the earth is about 3 million miles closer to the sun than during our summer. This tends to make the northern winter a little milder and the southern hemisphere's summer a little hotter."

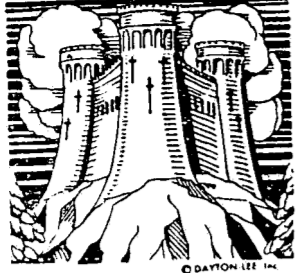


