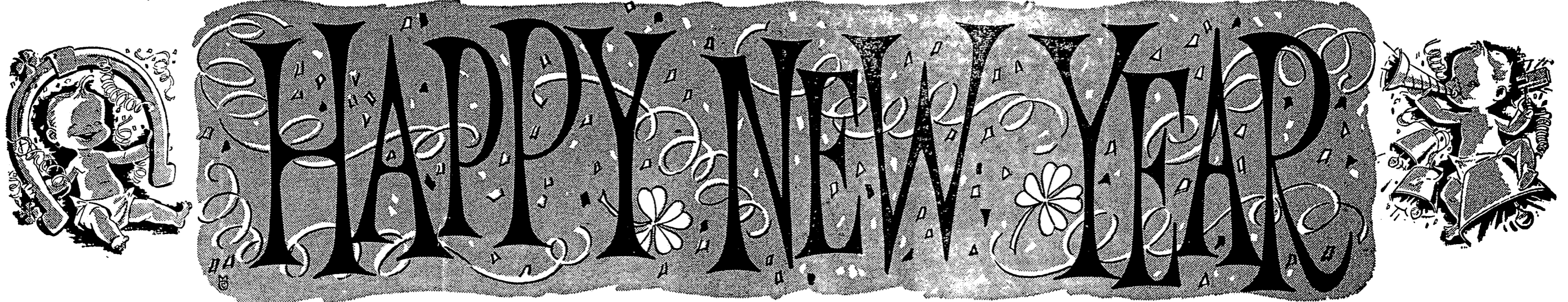

March Of Dimes Opens January 2

Bobbie Lu McClure, almost 5, is the first "Poster Girl" ever selected to symbolize Oakland County's volunteer efforts for the March of Dimes.

Bobbie Lu's parents are Mr. and Mrs. Jack J. McClure of 1518 Millard, Royal Oak. She has a sister, Joan, 7, and a brindle boxer, Sam, 2.

Bobbie rides Sam occasionally and, of course, Joan and her parents help her move around when she has to have help but mostly she gets around pretty good all by herself now.

It wasn't always this way because Bobbie was immobilized for the year and a half after she was paralyzed by polio at the age of five months. She still wears a brace on each leg and they are carefully locked and her crutches handed to her before she walks by herself.

The progress is slow but it is progress and Bobbie's mother is pleased and grateful. Things are so much better now than they were when polio struck the young family in 1955.

Mrs. McClure remembers: "Jack got out of the Air Force in May and we were living with my folks. He had just started with the telephone company as a repair man and were planning to buy the house we have now."

"Then, in July, Bobbie got sick. Then at St. Joseph's Hospital in Pontiac, we found out it was polio and we thought it meant the end of all our plans and dreams but in less than a week we heard from the National Foundation. The foundation's help was immediate and has gone on ever since.

"Thanks to the March of Dimes we have our home and our children and the doctors tell us now that Bobbie will have to have an operation when she is nine but after that she should be able to walk without braces. What a wonderful day that will be for all of us!"

Bobbie is about as normal as a youngster with her affliction can be. She's even a bit mischievous, her mother says, and dad is quite proud of her lively imagination.

Next year she will be going with Joan to the Mark Twain school in Royal Oak and as long as somebody delivers her and picks her up, she'll be able to get along in school just fine.

Right now, Bobbie has about the same chance for a good life as any almost-five-year-old. And, along with her parents, she thinks the March of Dimes had a lot to do with that.

That's why she is very happy to be a "Poster Girl."

EXPECTANT PARENT CLASSES OFFERED IN COUNTY

Expectant Parent Classes are again being offered in Oakland County for future fathers and mothers. The series of classes are taught by public health nurses and are sponsored by the Oakland County Medical Society, the Oakland County Department of Health and various Adult Education Departments.

These classes have become increasingly popular throughout the County. In 1954, two series of six classes each were offered. From September 9, through May 19, twenty one series, eight classes in a series, are being conducted at the four offices of the Oakland County Department of Health.

Attendance is limited to a maximum of twenty-six people, to provide ample opportunity for discussion. Classes begin at 7:30 p. m. and end at 9:30 p. m. Topics covered during the series include the mental health of the family unit; growth and development of the baby prior to and immediately after birth; labor and delivery and care and feeding of the infant.

HAVE YOU CHECKED YOUR LICENSE LATELY?

Three out of every ten people who renew their drivers license do so after the expiration date of their old license has gone by.

A special audit ordered by James M. Hare, Secretary of State, showed that 323 drivers out of 1,100 had failed to renew their license on or before the expiration date.

The audit showed that many had let their license renewal lag for one or more months. The breakdown on these tardy motorists showed that they had missed their birthday renewal dates by:

3 days or less	28
3 days only	25
2 weeks	75
1 month only	34
1 month or over	161
Total	323

"One solution," Hare said, "to this tardy-driver problem would be for us to mail motorists a reminder that their renewal date was coming up and suggest that they apply for a re-examination. However, this would be costly and out of the question as long as we are on a bare-bones budget. Even in the best of times it would be considered by many to be an unnecessary special service.

"There is no reason why the citizen shouldn't bear this responsibility, just as he now must fill in his own application for license plates. Citizens should automatically check their license as their birthday approaches to make sure that it will not expire on their upcoming natal anniversary."

Aliens Report To Government

Mr. Walter A. Sahli of the United States Immigration and Naturalization Service stated that the period within which aliens must report their address is almost at hand.

The Month of January has been set for the address reporting period. All aliens in the United States, with few exceptions, must report their address to the Government during that period.

Mr. Sahli said that forms with which to make the report will be available to all post offices and offices of the Immigration and Naturalization Service during the month of January.

Mr. Sahli urges all aliens to comply with the reporting requirements, as willful failure to do so may lead to serious consequences.

Cranberries, Cars And Chickens

Recently a mild case of national hysteria was created by the announcement that certain portions of the American cranberry crop had been contaminated by a weed killer containing an ingredient which caused cancer in mice. Only after irreparable damage had been done the industry did cooler heads calculate that one would have to consume approximately five tons of the tainted berries before one might be affected.

This fact remained obscure while many decided that they could better enjoy Thanksgiving dinners sans cranberries. At the same time, few seemed concerned with the facts (in which case they possessed) of a much greater menace than the weed killer—the killer on the highway. Last year 1,537 persons in Michigan alone were extracted from cars and hauled to the cemetery. Another 60,007 Michiganites required hospitalization due to injuries.

The time has arrived, it seems, when we should attack the highway safety problem with the same concern given a potential epidemic. This social problem will be well on its way to being licked when citizens show an interest in it equal to the attention recently given cranberries, and now being given chickens.

Now Linda Can Wear Pretty Yuletide Shoes

Six-year-old Linda Breesse of Columbus, Ohio, has been crippled from birth. She suffered from a birth defect, a disorder which seriously affects one out of every 18 babies born in the United States.

When Linda was old enough to walk, she could get around only with the aid of steel braces on her legs. That meant wearing heavy, ankle-high shoes which were not very pretty for a little girl who was otherwise developing into a real beauty.

Children with significant birth defects, known medically as congenital malformations, often face a lifetime of crippling. But there was hope in Linda's case. In her hometown, at the Columbus Children's Hospital, a new center especially designed to treat birth defects was set up with the support of New March of Dimes funds. It is probably the world's first birth defects

treatment and study center. Linda began a series of surgical operations, treatments and exercises to strengthen the muscles she still had in her legs. Today she no longer needs the braces and can even ride a tricycle. Though she still uses crutches, the doctors at the Columbus center hope that she may soon be able to abandon them. Meanwhile, what delights Linda most is that, like other little girls, she can now wear pretty shoes.

The New March of Dimes campaign in January, 1960, is aimed at three major crippling diseases, including arthritis and polio in addition to birth defects. It is estimated that one out of every four American families is affected by these disorders. Linda's progress toward a healthy, normal life symbolizes the hope held out by the New March of Dimes for millions of sufferers from crippling diseases.

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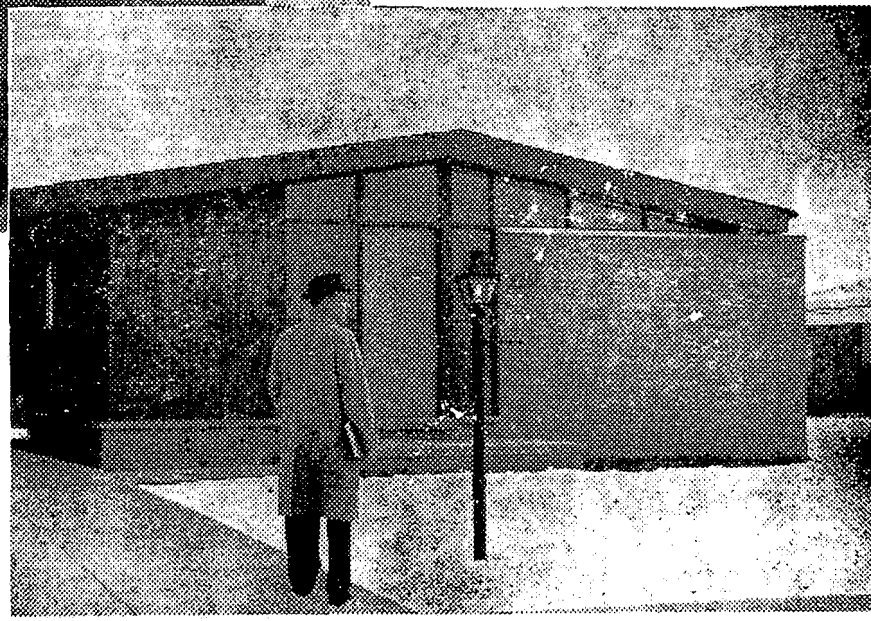

NEWS LINERS BRING RESULTS

RESOLVE TO BUY YOUR AUTO LICENSE

Secretary of State, James M. Hare, suggests that Michigan motorists who have not already purchased their 1960 license tabs should resolve to do so early in January.

"If they don't," Hare said, "they may find themselves waiting in long lines as the deadline approaches."

The sale of 1960 tabs is running more than 30 percent behind that of a year ago. About 110,000 less people purchased tabs by Christmas day this year compared to last year's plate sales.

"People who resolve to buy tabs early in January and keep their resolution will be a lot better off than those who will stand in cold lines in February," Hare reminded. "We hope that sales will pick up soon. The pressure of work puts extra hardships on the Lansing and filed staffs and puts a burden on our employees as well as the latecoming plate customers."
