The Clarkston Evening Extenion Group held its February meeting in the Community Center last Wednesday.

Mrs. Randall DeLong presented a very interesting lesson on "Selection of Curtains and Draperies". She brought out several points to be followed before purchasing ready-made curtains or draperies, or before purchasing the material to make your own.

As an example, how many of us put the rods up before purchasing or measuring for draperies? How many of us have purchased or made curtains and draperies; then called upon our husband to put up the rods? Can our rods always be adjusted to hold our curtains just where we want them? The idea is to put

In case we have more than one window the same size, we most likely measure one window and multiply this by windows for the amount of material. Again we find we should measure each window. Seems over years windows possibly shift a fraction of an inch as the house settles. or it is possible they can be off slightly when installed. When using more than one panel of curtain or drapery per side of window, loosely stitch panels together. They hang better and look neater. Take thread out to disconnect the panels before cleaning.
