CONSUMERS POWER EXTENDS GAS SERVICE

More than \$15,000,000 will be invested by Consumers Power Company to expand and improve its natural gas services in its Southeast Division, headquartered at Royal Oak, in 1960.

The division has district headquarters in Royal Oak, Pontiac, East Detroit and Plymouth, with more than 240,000 gas customers. The area encompasses Detroit metropolitan communities in Oakland and Macomb and western Wayne counties.

Division Manager David H. Gerhard said major expansion of gas service facilities is made possible by the recent acquisition of a new supply of natural gas through the facilities of the Trunkline Gas Co., of Houston, Texas. The new supply is being brought to a new Consumers compressor station at Northville via a 120 mile long 26-inch pipeline extending to the Indiana border at White Pigeon. It will amount to 100,000,000 cubic feet a day, augmenting supplies totaling more than 200,000,000 cubic feet a day from the Panhandle Eastern Pipe Line Co., up to this year Consumers' only out-of-state supplier.

Mr. Gerhard said more than 275 miles of new gas mains will be installed to bring gas service to some 21,000 new customers. In addition, many miles of older main will be replaced or refurbished to improve gas service.

In this project, extensive replacement of smaller main with 16-inch and 20-inch mains will take place in various localities.

Construction of a 24-inch main from Northville to Clarkston Junction, in Rose Township, Oakland County, to provide a new link with other company facilities, will also be completed during the year, he said.

To control the flow of gas through division areas, new gas regulator stations will be constructed at various strategic locations.

In addition to gas department projects, the company will expand its electric service facilities in Pontiac, where it provides electricity as well as gas service. He said numerous substitution and distribution system improvements are to be completed there to meet the growing demands of power users.

The southeast division projects are part of Consumers Power Company's 1960 general construction and improvement program in which it will invest more than \$106,000,000 in its Outstate Michigan service area, Mr. Gerhard said. The area includes 64 of the 68 counties of Michigan's lower peninsula.

The fortunate pair will be flown to New York, thence by Scandinavian Airlines System to any of these picturesque cities. While in New York, they will be the overnight guests of The Waldorf Astoria Hotel.

Essays will be judged on the basis of neatness and originality. Contest rules will be given over station CKLW TV daily for the next four weeks.

Mr. Upton said the idea for the contest was inspired by the many scenes filmed in Scandinavia in the new Cinerama, "Windjammer."

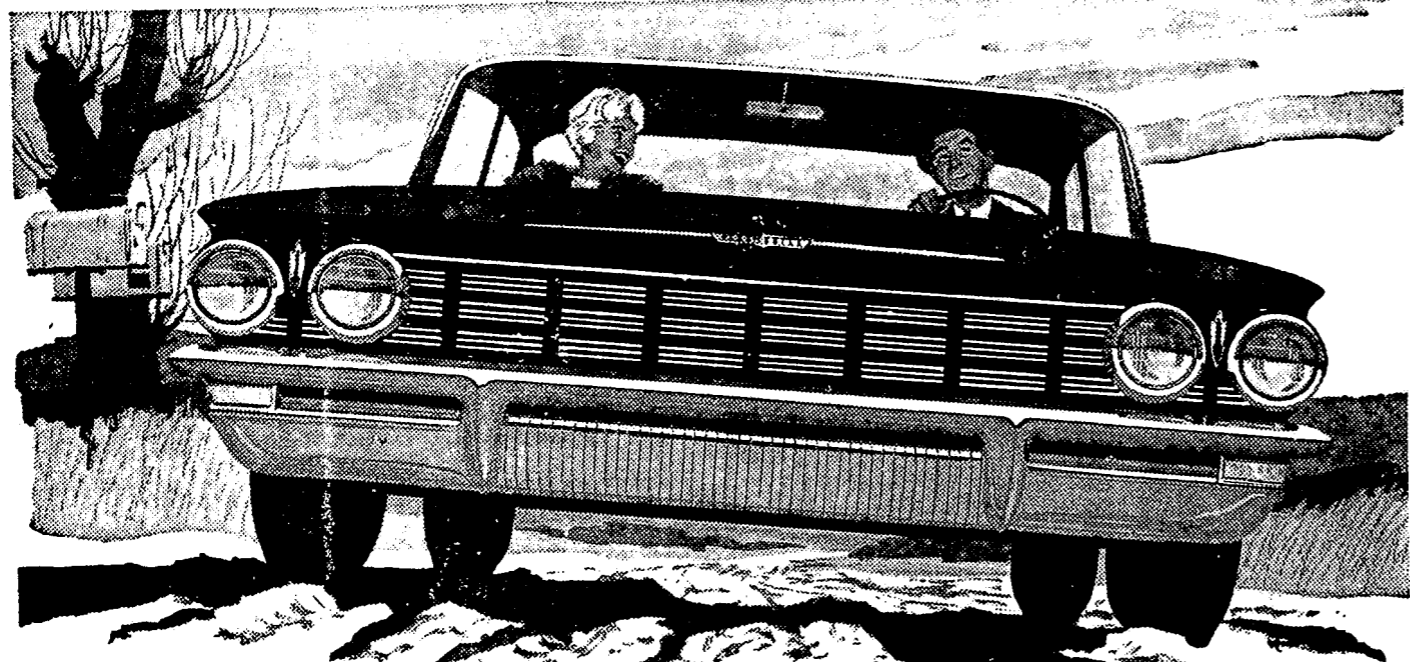

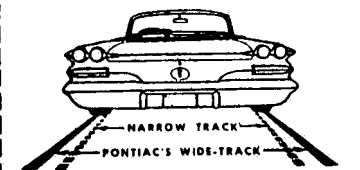

**AMERICANS NEED TO GROW UP, NOW, SAYS U-M WRITER**

Easy living has seriously softened educational discipline, a University of Michigan graduate writes in the current Michigan Alumnus Quarterly Review.

Discussing "Public Schools—50 Years Ago and Now" Ray C. Sackett, a former Birmingham resident now living in Port Charlotte, Fla., blames parents for much of the laxity in classwork and child rearing practices. He writes: "The easing-up process has been so gradual in both school and home life that in our headlong rush to make more money and live the life of Riley, we just have not stopped to observe what has transpired—until a serious juvenile delinquency problem is now upon us, followed by the rude awakening of the educational propaganda of our chief competitor, Russia. That makes the problem of putting on the brakes and arresting the momentum of laxity and 'frill' curricula much tougher.

"After generations of high-standard family and school regulations, suddenly the accumulation of 20th century mechanical progress has burst on us like

Christmas morning with a room full of toys. And we adults have just kept right on playing with our toy-like appliances and gadgets like 10 year olds. We seem to think it's a never-ending Christmas—with our childish enthusiasm for this new-found electrical world—with the result that our children are suffering from lack of parental attention.

"If the newest of our toys—TV would serve its purpose fully, it would relieve the schools by taking over many of the frills and foibles of the curriculum. Courses could be offered on TV in such things as safe driving,

cooking, sewing, home economics, dancing, and other non-academic subjects. Probably the cost to cities and states for TV sponsorship would be less than the cost of the new buildings, equipment, and teaching staff which are now required to do the same thing.

"Greater concentration on academic subjects all through grammar and high school, higher passing grades, and stiffer final examinations would soon weed out those who cannot absorb knowledge sufficiently to be entitled to a college education.

"Thus, colleges and universities would be relieved of having to provide an undergraduate 'country club' life for thousands who are not really interested in a serious education. The deserving student in need of assistance would still be able to find a way either with the help of a scholarship or by working his way, just as he did 50 years ago."

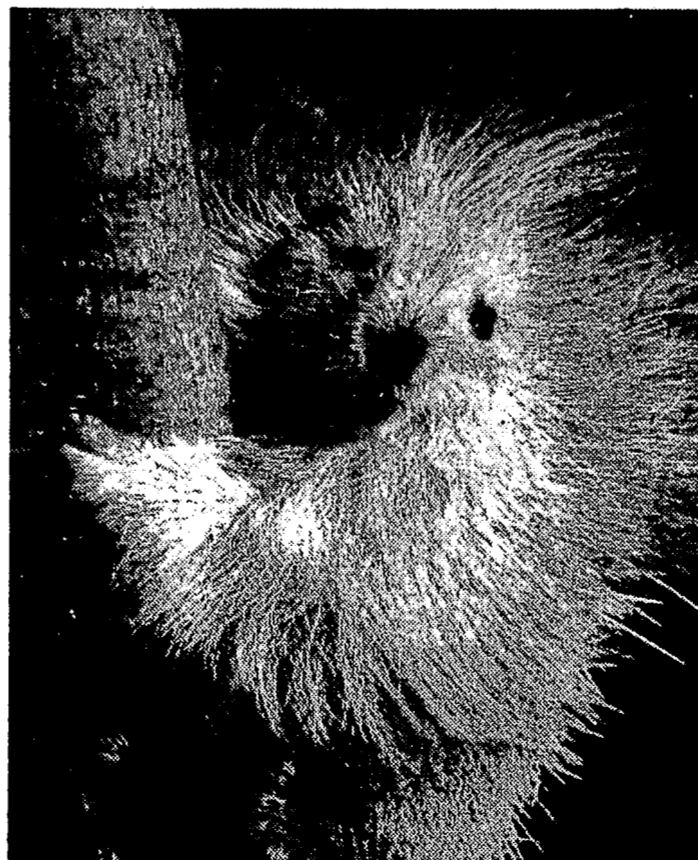

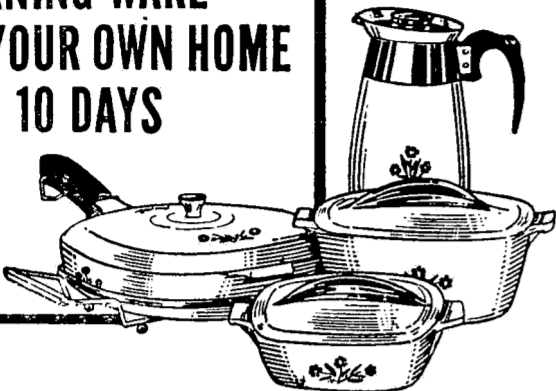
