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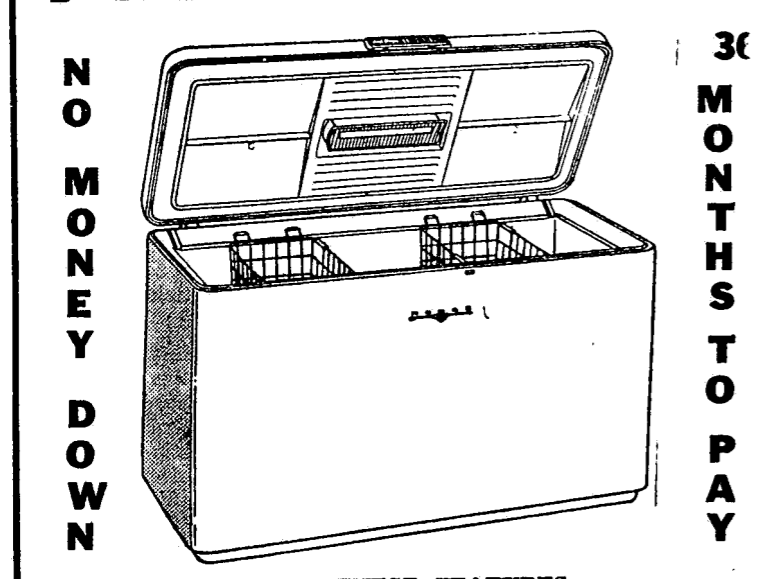

west points with equal lengths of day and night.

"As the sun goes higher and higher above the equator, its rising and setting points will lie farther and farther to the north with the consequent lengthening of the daylight hours at the expense of the nighttime.

"Not only will we have longer days as the sun heads north," she points out, "but we also will have warmer days as the sun shines more over the northern hemisphere.

"On the day of the equinox, the sun will shine vertically over

the earth's equator—thus equally over both poles." After the equinox date, the sun will shine more over the northern hemisphere with resulting higher temperatures over that part of the earth and cooler weather, or fall, beginning in the southern hemisphere," she concludes.

**Ike Picks Head Of Group To Set Goals For U.S.**

WASHINGTON — President Eisenhower has named Dr. Henry M. Wriston, former president of Brown University in Providence, R.I. to head a commission to develop a broad outline of national goals for the next decade. Before going to Brown, Dr. Wriston headed Lawrence College, Appleton, Wisconsin.

Mr. Eisenhower first disclosed his plans for the National Goals Commission in his State of the Union Message in January 1959.

Frank Pace, former Army secretary and now chairman of General Dynamics Corp., will serve as vice chairman.

Wriston is president of the American Assembly, an adjunct of Columbia University. The assembly consists of a group of leading Americans who meet under the sponsorship of Columbia to conduct studies of problems of broad national interest. It will operate through the American Assembly.

Mr. Eisenhower indicated in a White House announcement that, while he was hopeful that the goals commission could report to him early in January, 1961, before he leaves office he was "far more concerned about the breadth and accuracy of the report than in the exact timing of its submission."

Other members of the commission will be named later. It will be financed by private foundations rather than government funds.

the normal waistline and the jacket fastens without strain.

Test the sleeve length by touching the lobe of your ear. The sleeve that fits, just reaches your wristbone.

Lengthening or shortening sleeves is not difficult. But alterations at neckline, bust or shoulder are major ones and are best avoided.

Skirts present less difficulty in the alteration room. If the skirt fits, the waist band is snug enough to hold the skirt in place. The straight skirt has at least two inches of ease at the hipline. This is "sitting" room to keep the skirt from pulling up too short when you sit down. It prevents strain on the seams and keeps the skirt from "cupping" under. Lining in the skirt reaches past the fullest part of the hipline to help keep the skirt in shape.

Mrs. Mullikin notes that proportioned suits are an aid to the shopper who is shorter or taller than average. The lady with a figure problem may find the boxy-type jacket eliminates major alterations. Best solution for the difficult figure problem is the custom-made suit. This is

more expensive, but more satisfactory than altering a ready-made suit.

**SPRING HERE SUNDAY**

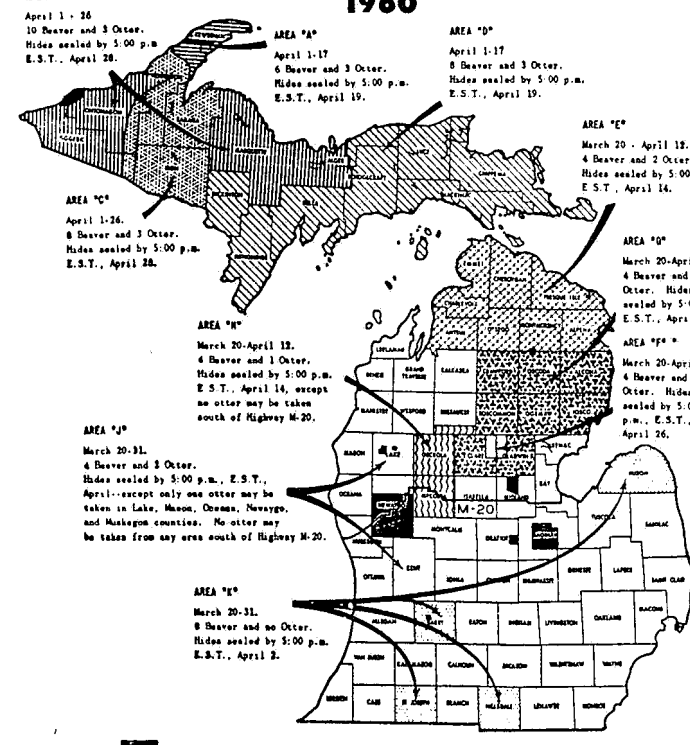
"The flowers that bloom in the spring, tra la!" are almost here, says Hazel M. Losh (Ph.D.), University of Michigan associate professor of astronomy.

Spring officially arrives at 9:43 a.m. Sunday (March 20) Professor Losh explains. "At that time the sun will arrive at vernal equinox, or in other words will cross the equator on its way north."

The beginning of spring this year will be 18 hours earlier than last year because the earth's swing around the sun requires an uneven number of days—365.2422—and this year's leap year calendar has 366, she explains.

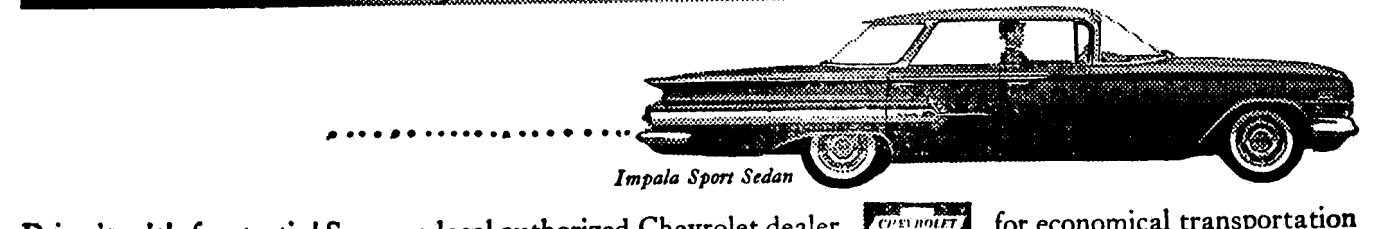
"The sun started its long trek northward on December 22, and has been steadily climbing at the rate of about one degree per day since then," the astronomer says. "For about six months its rising and setting have been south of the east and west points of the horizon, but on the day of the equinox it will rise and set almost exactly at the east and

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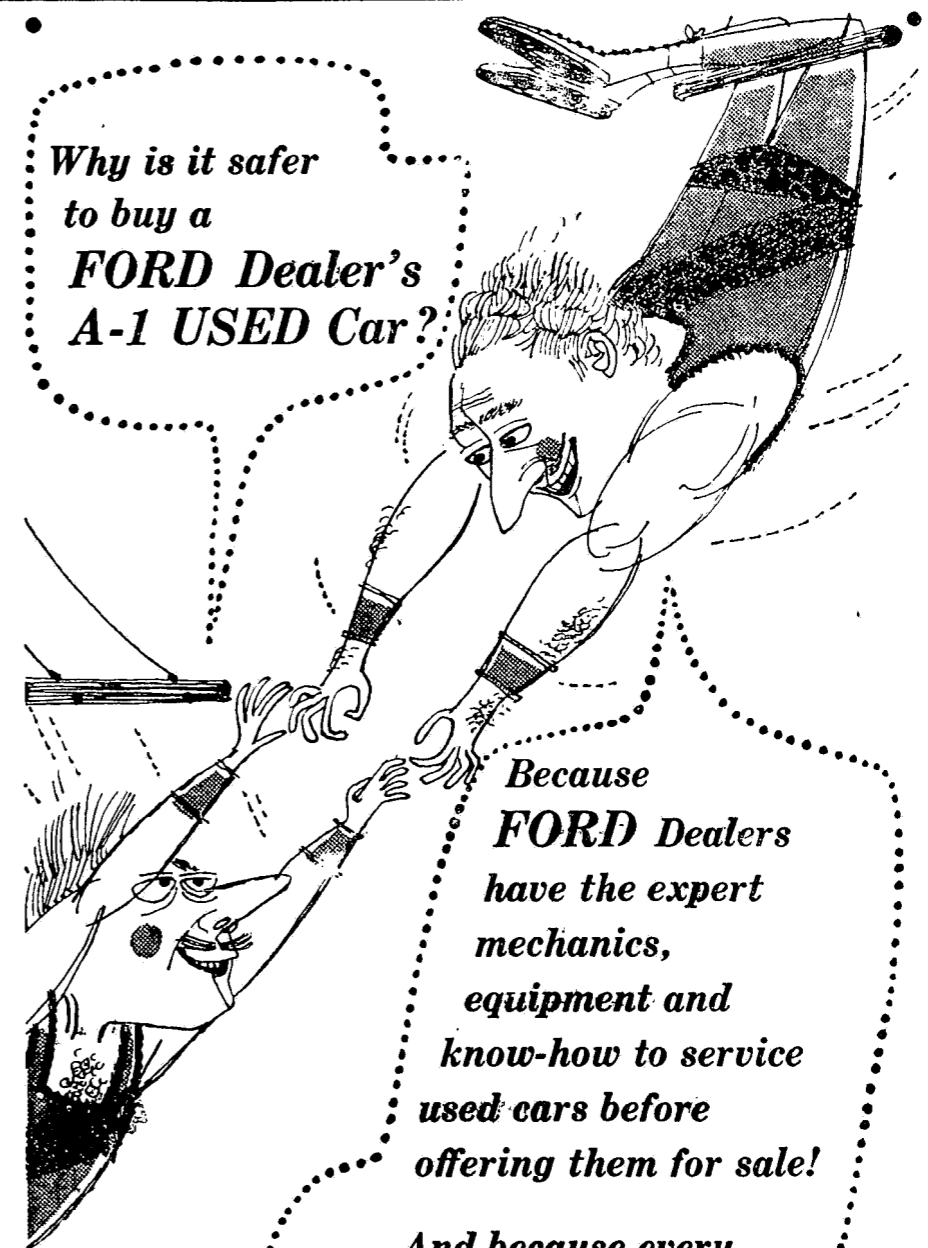

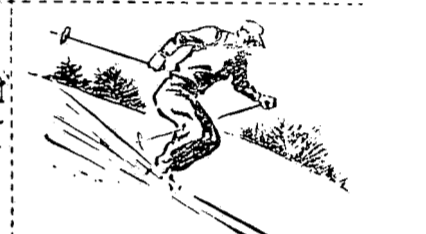

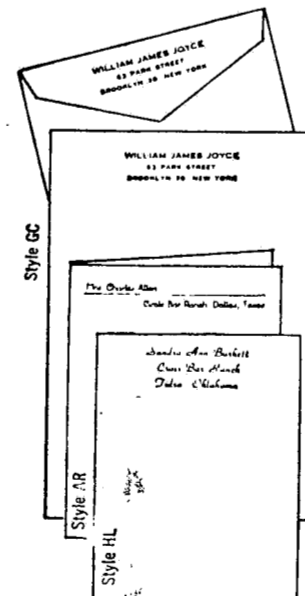
