Three mothers attended the session and luncheon, Mrs. Caspar Anderson of Clarkston, Mrs. Lester Oles of Avon Township and Mrs. Maxwell Shadley of Pontiac. Mrs. O'Laughlin was chapter chairman of the Good Citizen committee and greeted the girls in Flint. Each girl received a certificate from the National Society D. A. R. and the Michigan winner received from the National Society a \$100.00 United States Savings Bond.

Speakers were Chief Justice of the Supreme Court in Michigan, The Honorable John R. Dethmers, Mr. John N. Noble a native of Detroit who spent nine and a half years in prisons and prison camps in Germany and Russia and Dr. Alexander St. Ivanyi a minister in a church near Boston, formerly from Hungary who was a bishop there and active in resisting the Communist invasion of Hungarian government.

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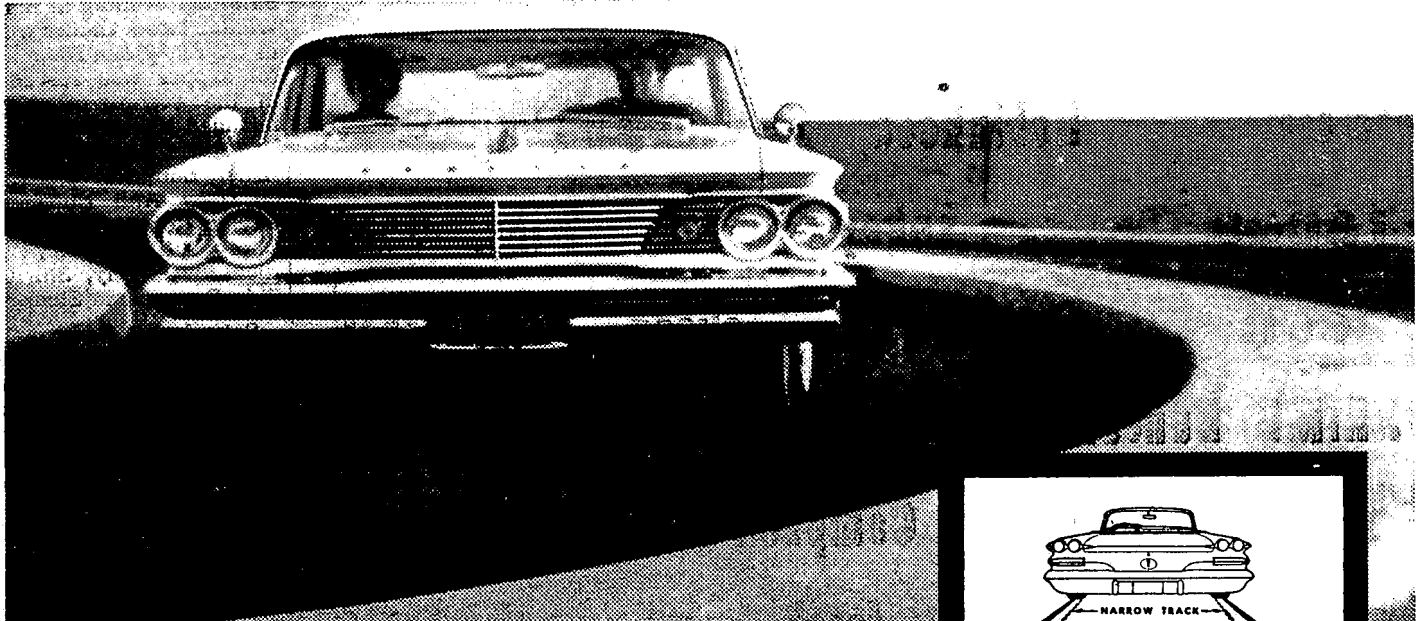
