It is recommended that children of the ages in kindergarten, most new teeth have erupted. The teeth are cleansed, dried, and then the sodium fluoride is applied to the surfaces. Four applications of the solution applied at intervals are essential. Other methods of applying sodium fluoride to the teeth, such as by lozenges, mouth washes, or tooth paste, have not proven ef-

The clinic is planned for the latter part of April and in May to enable children who might not be able to come for their treatments in the summer months to come. All parents of children in these grades (Kindergarten, second, fifth, and eighth) are urged to take advantage of this fluoride application clinic. The cost of the complete series of four applications is \$4.00 which is \$1.00 per application.

Remember, teeth are the only part of the body which cannot heal or repair themselves after the damage has been done.




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QUARANTINE ON PLANTS SET UP

Unless by an acceptable inspection certificate from the state of origin no plants of tomato, pepper, onion, cabbage, broccoli, cauliflower or sweet potato may enter Michigan after April 1.

This is the result of a plant quarantine recently signed by G.S. McIntyre, director of the Michigan Department of Agriculture. The purpose is to prevent the spread of plant diseases and pests in Michigan from other states. Included are viruses,
