First class letter mail which annot be delivered because of nsufficient address, or which fails for other reasons to reach its intended destination, is carefully scrutinized at the address office by experienced distributors before it is returned. This does not mean, however, that city and telephone directories are searched in an effort to effect delivery.

Prior to the abolition of directory service, mailers were often not aware that they were addressing their mail improperly, as the post office was, in most cases, able to locate the addressee through the use of directories. As a result, patrons continued to address mail improperly and the post office continued to give expensive supplemental assistance. Now, however, mail addressed to carrier delivery offices which does not bear a complete street address or post office box number is usually marked "Insufficient Address' and returned. "The only exceptions," are those instances where the addressee is so well known that directory service is unnecessary.

Present regulations restrict dir ectory service to perishable matter, parcels of obvious value, special services mail, mail from armed forces overseas, and international mail.

"If guess work is used in addressing mail intended for carried delivery, it stands very little chance of accomplishing its mission, On the other hand, mail showing the full name of the addressee, the correct street address or box number, and, of course, the city and state, has most of the basic equipment for

In April, each day or so, small shipments of Lake Superior trout arrive in Flint from the shores of the Upper Peninsula All winter long the fisherman has been getting ready for the "first day". They've repaired motors. All gear has to be in top shape to battle the ice fields. It's treacherous business guiding the small boats through the ice pack. Sometimes the lighter boats slide up on top of large cakes of ice. They really are stuck! Even the Coast Guard boats make slow progress through the ice when coming to the rescue.

The fishermen go out into the ake a long ways—one or two "hours" they call it. They drop their gill nets in water that may be three or four hundred feet deep, The nets ride about four feet off the botom of the lake. The net of the "lucky" fisherman crosses the "swimways" or feeding grounds of the trout, says Josephine Lawyer, Consumer Marketing Information Agent for Oakland County.
