when he tags the runner with the glove. The ball does not come in contact with the runner. RULINGS:

1. The time element has some influence but, in case of doubt, the umpire will rule the runner safe. Attempts to regain balance after receiving the ball are usually considered a part of the act of catching and, if the basemandoes not come up with the ball in his possession, it is not considered a catch. In all such cases, there is a judgment factor. If the ball is clearly in possession and if some other new movement, not related to the catch, is then made and if the ball is fumbled during such new movement, the umpire will usually declare it a catch followed by a fumble. About the same judgment is used as in the case of determining whether a fielder has caught a fly ball

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

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
