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## MEMORIAL DAY SERVICES

The parade will start at the Methodist Church at 10:00 a. m. and terminate at the veterans plot in Lakeview cemetery. Participating in the parade will be the Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Cubs, and Brownies. The colorful High School Band will furnish the music, followed by cars provided for WWI veterans and WWI widows. Anyone wishing to ride with that group should contact John Ronk at the Post Office. Cars are being provided by local car dealers. The Campbell-Richmond Post will lead the parade with uniformed color guards and flag bearers, and rifle squad following them. Frank Green is the parade marshal.

Memorial Day originated at the close of the Civil War, and therefore Posts of the American Legion and all veterans give due recognition on this day to veterans of earlier wars. It is on this day that we honor those who gave their lives in the service of our country.

## CAMP AND RESORT WORK PLENTIFUL FOR STUDENTS

Summer jobs for college stu-dents in camps and resorts in the U. S. will be improved over

1959, a University of Michigan placement officer reports.

"So far, there are more jobs than people," says Ward D. Peter-son, assistant to the director of the U-M Bureau of Appointments and Occupational Information.

The Bureau's summer place-ment office lists 6,500 camp and 1,800 resort jobs throughout the country.

Over 3,900 students have reg-istered with the office for sum-mer jobs since it opened in De-cember.

Over 50 camps in Michigan, New Hampshire, Massachusetts, Minnesota, New York and other states already have interviewed students, he adds. The greatest demand has come from eastern states.

By the end of the semester, Peterson predicts, camps repre-sented by interviewers should pass the 117 figure of 1959.

Personnel sought varies with each camp. A small one may need only three students for po-sitions, while larger ones some-times seek as many as 20, the placement official says.

Salaries for camp jobs are the same as last year, averaging \$200 monthly in Michigan, \$350 to \$450 in eastern private camps.

Peterson indicates there are numerous camps interested in international and married stu-dent personnel.

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


