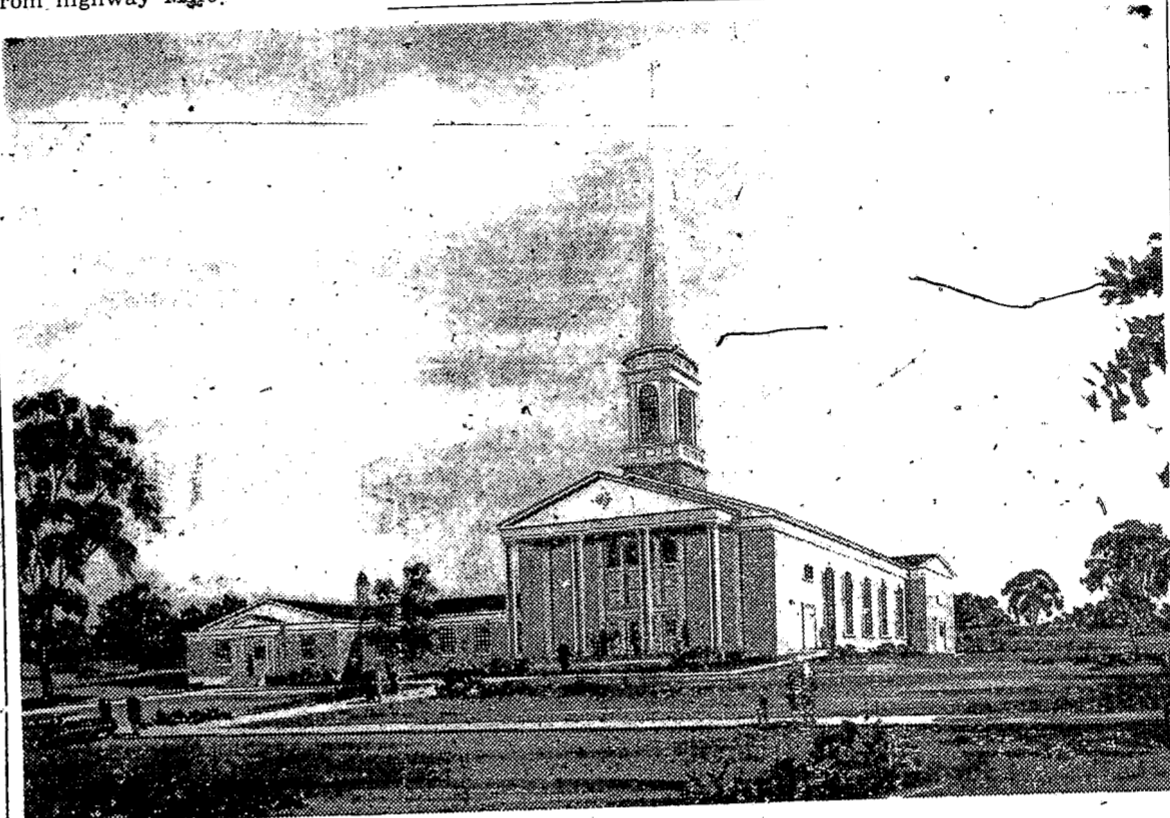

PERSPECTIVE OF CHURCH

Entrance to the narthex is beneath a portico which is supported by four Doric columns expressive of the strength and security offered by the church. The pastor, Reverend William J. Richards, mentioned that this is the first unit in a plan which, when completed, will, in the future, include a Christian education unit and a fellowship hall.

Representing the congregation of 900 members have been five committees composed of 54 people under the leadership of Building Committee Chairman, Howard Huttenlocher who developed the new church building. Their report was approved at a congregational meeting held last March. The financing of the project was done under the leadership of Mr. Philip Smith and Mr. Robert Jones. A loan of \$125,000 was recently acquired from the National Bank of Detroit in cooperation with the Clarkston State Bank. The church, in a period of the last three years acquired a total of over \$250,000 in capital and real assets.

Lay Leader of the church, Everett Butters, is working with the pastor, in setting up the Ground Breaking Services at 10:00 a. m. on Sunday, July 24th when Dr. Chester A. McPheeters, Superintendent of The Flint District of The Methodist Church and member of Bishop Marshall R. Reed's cabinet will officiate. The six choirs of the church under the leadership of Director of Music, William Mansfield, will present special music. The church school will also participate in the service.

## CHILD STUDY CLUB HAS HUSBANDS NIGHT

The Elks' Temple in Pontiac was the scene of the first annual husbands night of The Clarkston Child Study Club. Thirty members and guests were present.

W. H. Bannan, Warden of The State of Michigan Southern Prison at Jackson, was the speaker for the evening. His topic was: "Prisons and the Reasons People Come in Contact With The Law".

After telling the group about the prison, how many are there, what prisoners are taught, of their recreational facilities and of their beliefs, he told the reasons people go to prisons and stated that the majority of them have no conscience whatsoever and feel no pain while doing wrong. He urged the parents to bring their children up knowing and practicing the ten commandments and urged them to discipline their children wisely and well.

Mr. Bannan then told about a Code of Practice drawn up by young people in a neighboring state. This code covers all young people's activities from Junior High on and covered curfew time from different types of dates, activities, appropriate wearing apparel, speed while driving and behavior. 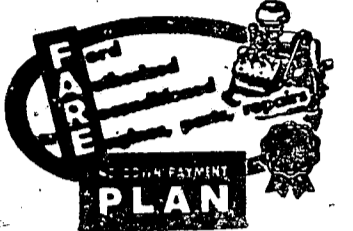

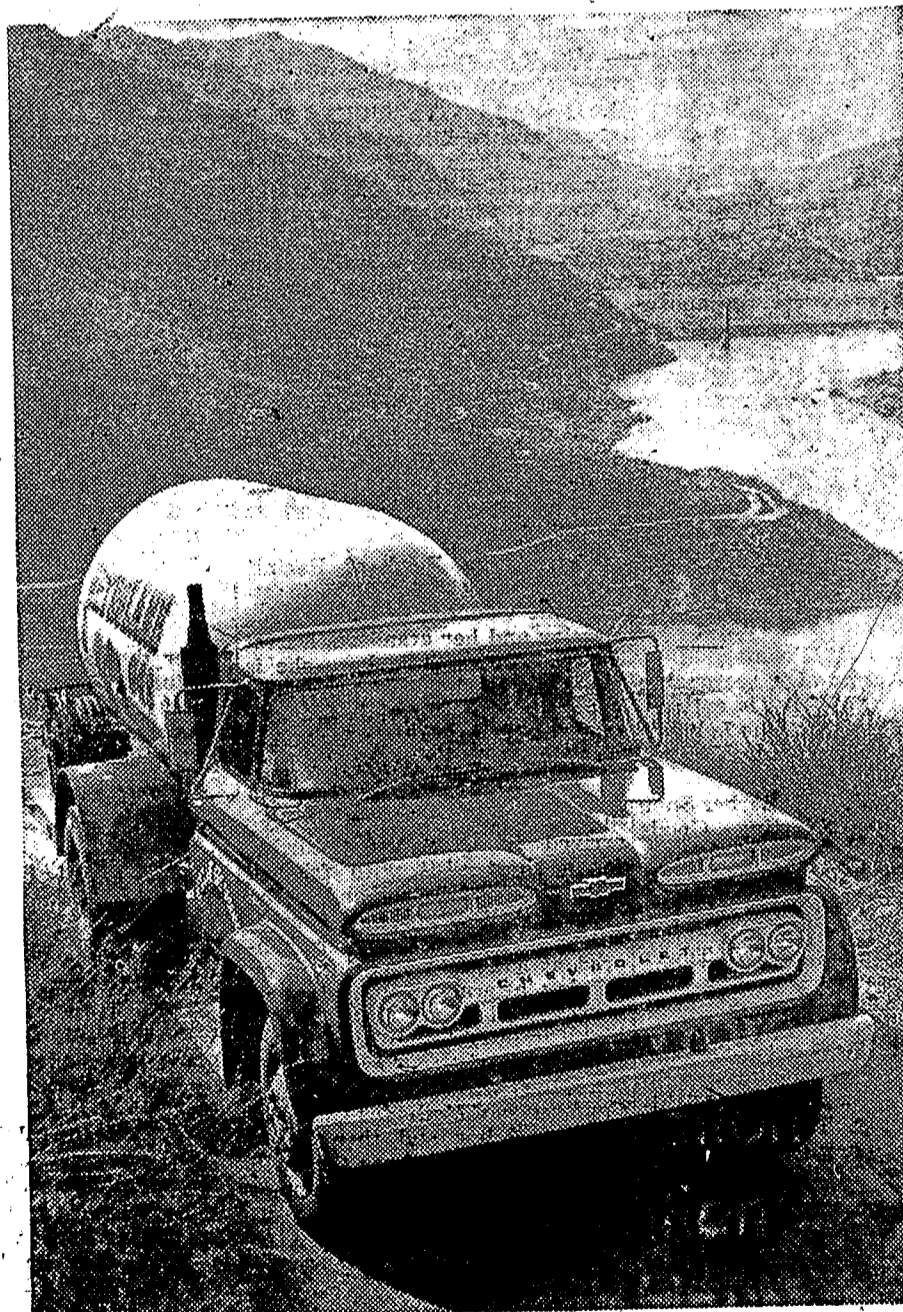

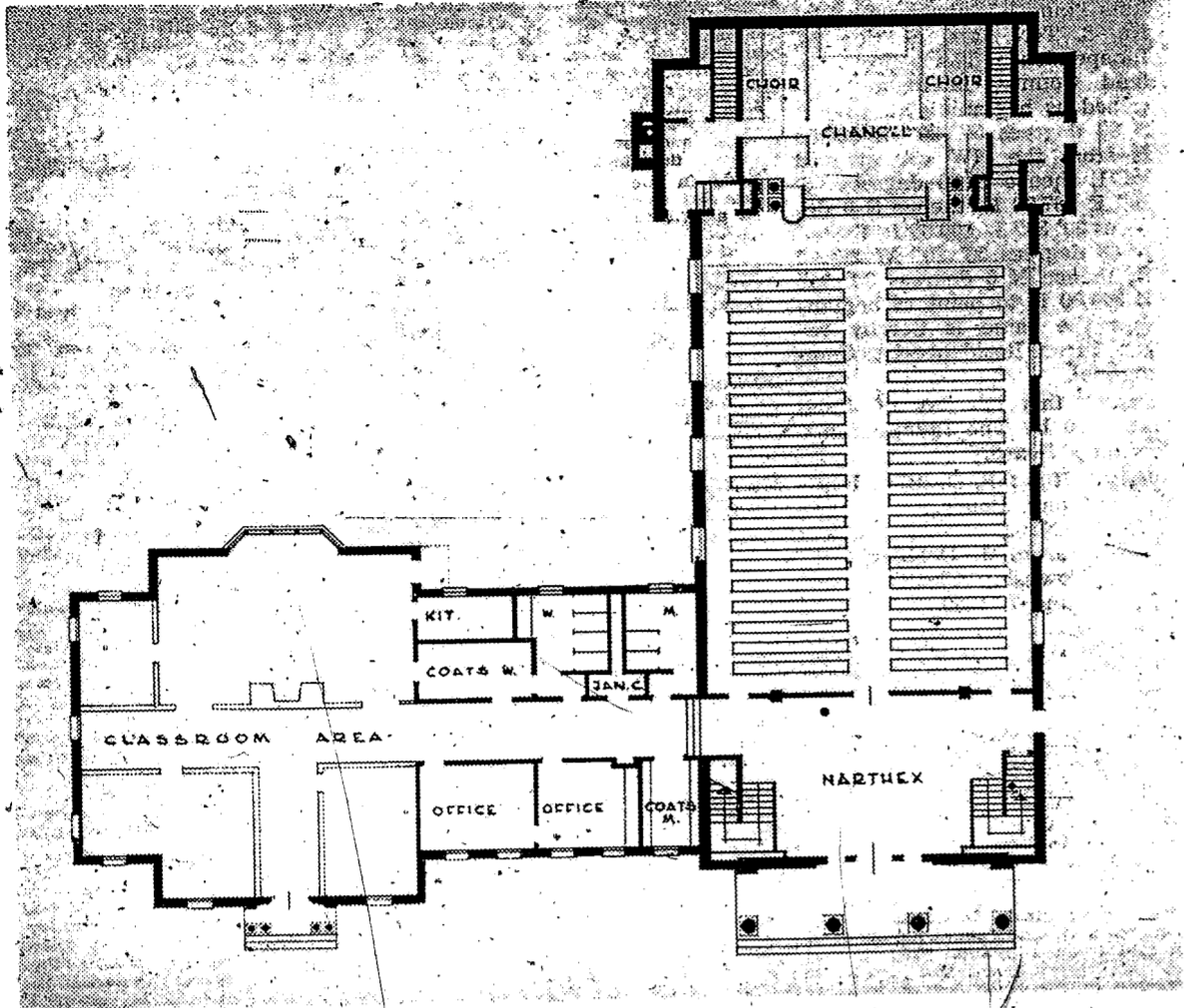

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FLOOR PLAN OF THE CHURCH

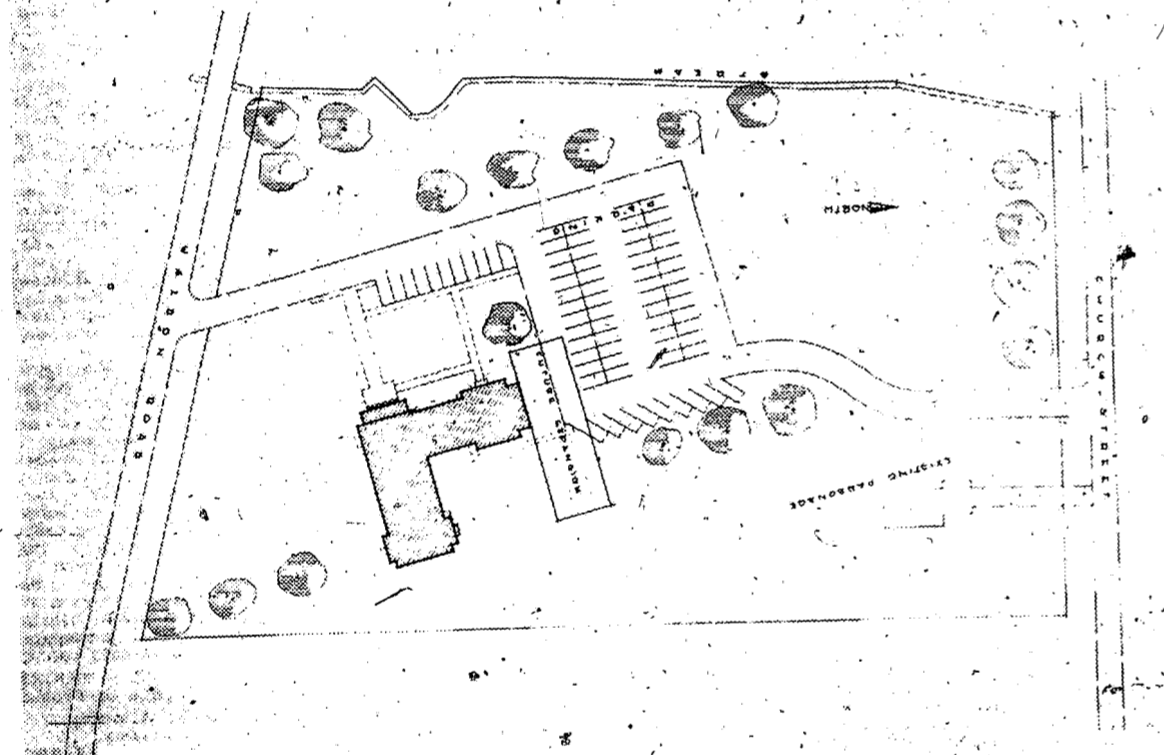


The floor plan of the sanctuary provides for a seating capacity of over 500 worshippers including room in the chancel for 50 choir members. The spacious narthex provides entry into the nave, a second floor balcony, or into the educational wing of the building. A side entrance opens onto a ramp for invalid members or others who cannot use the steps at the front of the church. For the present the wing to the north of the narthex will contain the church offices, coat rooms, kitchen, class room which can be converted into a dining room area.

This will eventually become the church parlor when future construction is completed. A separate entrance to the wing makes possible the convenient usage of the area without entering the sanctuary. The nave with its vaulted ceiling will be done in a combination of painted plaster walls accented by wood paneled wainscot. The high arched windows at either side of the nave will provide ample natural light for the interior of the sanctuary.

Floor of the nave will be vinyl tile with carpet in the aisles and in the chancel. The chancel with slender columns at either side, paneled wainscot, and reredos behind the Altar provide for an attitude of simple worship and solemnity. Colonial chandeliers will grace the ceiling. The central aisle will be six feet wide to provide for funerals. The narthex will provide for overflow seating on special occasions. It is expected that construction will be completed by next spring.

Two and a half years ago The Howard Huttenlocher family of Clarkston presented to the congregation of First Methodist Church the seven acre site on which the new church is to be located. The site is located adjacent to Clarkston High School. A new parsonage of modified colonial design has already been built on the site and was made

SCHOOL EMPLOYEES TO STUDY AT MSU

School custodians and transportation supervisors, men and women responsible for much of the safety and welfare of the child in school, will themselves return to school this summer.

Gone are the days when schools simply hired bus drivers and janitors. Today, these jobs are more complex, and employees must be professionally competent in such areas as child psychology, human relations, economics, heating and ventilating and school bus maintenance.

Subjects relating to these areas will be discussed, along with sessions on carpentry, floorcare and others, at the 27th annual School Maintenance and Transportation Conference June 22-24 at Michigan State University.

Some 1,800 men and women from hundreds of Michigan schools are expected for the three day course.

A conference staff of more than 40 specialists from business and education will lead discussions on more than 30 subjects.

Custodians will receive 15 hours of special credit toward the 300 hours required for a Building Maintenance Course Certificate by the State Office of Vocational Education and the M. S. U. College of Education.

The conference is a continuing education activity of the Michigan Association of School Employees, the Michigan Department of Public Instruction and the M. S. U. College of Education.

FIREWORKS ILLEGAL IN MICHIGAN

Giant sparklers, one of the most hazardous devices appearing in Michigan, are singled out in a warning on illegal fireworks to merchants and residents by the fire marshal division of the State Police.

Reports of unlawful and dangerous fireworks being stocked up by merchants prompted the caution by Captain Glenroy Walker, chief of the division at East Lansing headquarters.

Risks of arrest and personal injury confront those who involve themselves in the sale, possession or use of illegal fireworks. Violation of the law is a misdemeanor or punishable by a fine of \$100 or 90 days in jail, or both.

Virtually all fireworks are illegal in Michigan, regardless of type and size, except that qualified organizations, upon proper application for the issue of a permit, can possess and exhibit fireworks for public display, Walker said.

Legal only for individual use are the caps for cap pistols and the small sparklers containing not more than .0125 of a pound of burning elements. The oversize sparklers burn fiercely, are unpredictable and constitute a definite fire and injury danger.

"THIS IS CINERAMA" MAY RETURN

The Music Hall Theatre has and continues to receive letters asking if "This Is Cinerama," which introduced the new dimensional attractions in 1953, will ever be brought back for reviewing in the Motor City.

Many letters state that senders experienced the initial production from one to four times or that they had never seen it during its record run of two years. The Cinerama management is seriously considering a limited return engagement of the production which patrons identify through reference to the "roller coaster" scene, the Cypress Gardens sequence, "Aida" at La Scala Opera House in Milan and the magnificent airplane journey across the United States.

The production was recently returned to the Cinerama Theatre in Boston. Its attendance has been equal to its initial engagement. "This Is Cinerama" will also return to the Orpheum Theatre in San Francisco on June 28.

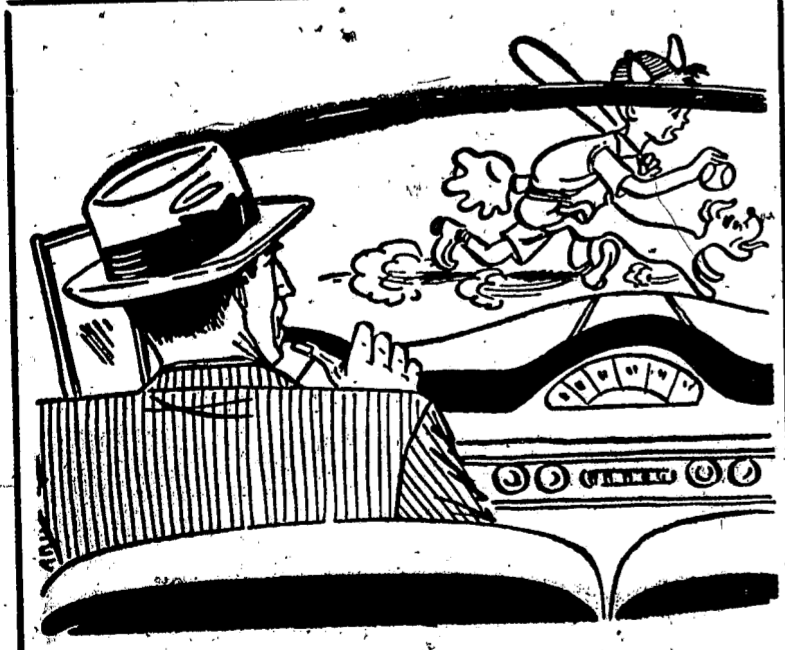

PHONE CO. TO PROVIDE ADDITIONAL FACILITIES

Michigan Bell Telephone Company construction crews are working on two separate projects, totaling \$412,684 to provide additional telephone facilities for subscribers in the north and northeast sections of Pontiac.

Raymond H. Storm, district manager for the company, said the projects also will provide more telephone circuits between Pontiac and Rochester, Drayton Plains, Clarkston.

One project calls for nearly eight miles of underground and aerial cable to be placed along Perry Street from the Pontiac central office on Huron Street to the junction of M-24 and Walton Boulevard.

"This project was largely necessitated by the development of new homes in the areas of Michigan State University-Oakland and construction of the U.S. 40 (Chrysler Expressway) Highway which will provide easy access to this section of Oakland County from the Detroit Metropolitan area," said Storm.

The project also will provide additional facilities between the Pontiac and Rochester central offices. It is scheduled for completion in November.

In another project, more than 12 miles of underground and aerial cable will be placed along Oakland Avenue and J.S. 10 from Pontiac into Drayton Plains, Waterford and Clarkston. This project also includes the construction of underground ducts, burying existing aerial cable in the same trench and the removal of poles on U.S. 10 from Waterford to M-15.

This will enable the company to fill new orders for service for subscribers along the route of the new cable installation and orders for better grades of service. The project also will provide more circuits between the telephone central offices.

Storm said this project is scheduled for completion in December.

This time of year there is no more magical word than "vacation." Will your vacation live up to your expectations? Or will the magic evaporate under too much sun and heat, and the strain that unaccustomed exercise can put on the heart?

There are a number of simple things you can do to keep the magic in your vacation. They will help "beat the heat" and guard your health, according to the Michigan Heart Association.

If you are a desk worker—particularly if you are in the upper age bracket—and suddenly turn athlete on vacation, or summer weekends, you may put too great a burden on your heart. When you plan a vacation that includes moderate or vigorous exercise, like climbing mountains or playing tennis, and have not been exercising regularly, begin

toning up your body beforehand, bit by bit. Or substitute plans for a less-demanding vacation. Best of all acquire the habit of taking exercise week in and week out. Moderate exertion is generally considered good for the heart and circulatory system.

Be especially careful not to over-exert when there is an onset of hot, humid weather. The heart has to work even harder under these conditions. In addition to supplying blood to active muscles, your heart has to provide a great flow of blood to your skin to cool your body on a hot day. Evaporation of perspiration is part of this cooling process. To help this process, drink plenty of water during heat spells and wear light, well-ventilated clothing.

Perspiration also uses up salt from your body. Salt pills help some, but should not be taken except on a physician's advice. Heart patients should be particularly careful to follow the physician's orders in this regard. If you bask in the sun, accustom yourself gradually. Never expose yourself to long periods in the sun when it is very hot.

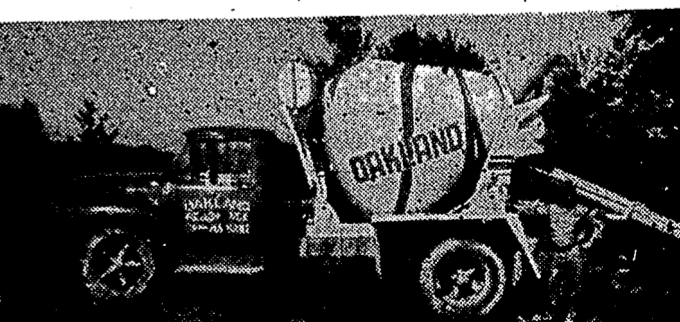

Corbett, one of the FBI's "Ten Most Wanted Fugitives" is wanted for escape from the California Institution for Men, Chino, Calif., where he was serving a 5 years' to life sentence for murdering an Air Force sergeant. A Federal warrant was issued at Los Angeles, Calif., on March 21, 1960, charging him with unlawful interstate flight to avoid confinement for murder.

A white American, born on October 25, 1928, at Seattle, Wash., Corbett is 5 feet 1 inch to 6 feet 2 inches tall and weighs 160 to 170 pounds. He has light brown hair, hazel eyes, a fair complexion, a medium build, and has worked as a clerk-typist, laborer, warehouseman, laboratory technician, and alkyl-test technician.

Corbett, once a premedical student, is interested in scientific matters, avidly reads technical and travel books, and is intensely interested in firearms and target practice. He reportedly has a superior general intelligence and generally lives quietly and neatly but becomes erratic when drinking alcoholic beverages.

**WATER SPORTS CALL FOR SAFETY PRECAUTIONS**

With 64 water accidents claiming 35 lives and injuring 28 so far this year, the State Police are urging extra care as the water sports season gets into full stride.


Of the accidents, 33 were fatalities, 17 involved personal injury and 14 were property damage only. The information is based on reports received through June 9.

The 35 persons drowned included eight boat operators, five boat passengers, one swimmer or wa-

der, one skin diver, four children who strayed from their parents and into water, five suicides, and five who fell through ice, four into rivers, one from a bridge and one from a dredge.

Water sports activity is expected to begin reaching its peak in the three-day July 4 weekend and the State Police urge vigilant attention, to safety precautions.

Under state law, all water accidents involving death, injury or property damage in excess of \$50 must be reported to enforcement agencies which in turn send this information to the State Police.



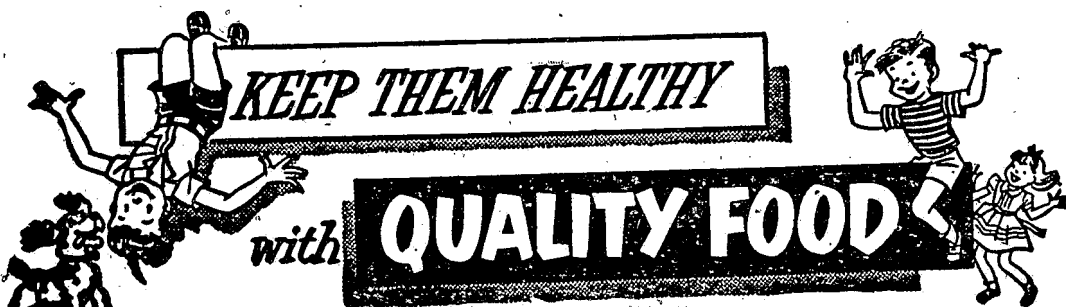
