With his third meeting as president of the Clarkston Rotary Club, Frank (Tink) Ronk had a very busy meeting. Not only was a new member introduced into Rotary but he had to entertain the District Governor for this district.

The new member was Fred F. Yeager. He was presented with the lapel pin by George Mantyla. His dinner badge was received from Keith Hallman while the object of Rotary (a plaque) was delivered by Former Governor Lloyd (Slip) Megee.

Monday's meeting was held at the Community Building. The evening opened with the singing of "God Save The Queen", accompanied by a toast to the Queen, because the Governor is a Canadian. This was followed by the singing of "America" and a toast to the President.

The District Governor was introduced by Rotarian Megee. The governor John R. MacPherson, was from High Gate, Ontario. He is a charter member and past president of the Rotary Club of Ridgetown, Ontario.

GET APPLICATIONS IN FOR ADMISSION TO WAYNE STATE UNIVERSITY

Wayne State University's Office of Admissions is urging all students who plan to enroll at the University for the first time this fall to get their records to the office of Admissions before Monday, August 1.

The August 1 deadline has been established to prevent a flood of last minute applications. The University will attempt to process all records received after August 1, but will not guarantee a decision in time for registration for the fall semester which begins on Monday, Sept. 28.

Admission applications are up 25 per cent for the same period a year ago while the number of students admitted to date is up 20 per cent.

Records that must be in the hands of the Admissions Office include an application fully and carefully prepared. An autobiography of at least 200 words must be included along with a transcript from the high school or each college or university attended by the prospective student.

The transcript must be mailed directly to the Wayne State Office of Admissions from the high school or the registrar of the institution previously attended.

Students currently enrolled in summer sessions at other colleges and planning to attend Wayne State this fall are asked to submit their application, autobiography and transcripts before the August 1 deadline. They are also asked to request the registrar of the institution that they are now attending to send their transcript or grades earned to date and a statement listing their current selections to the Wayne Office of Admissions. They are also asked to arrange with their registrar to have a complete transcript forwarded as soon as final grades are available.

High school students can secure applications from their high school or at the Wayne State University Admissions Office, Room 164, Old Main.

OCSC ANNOUNCES WINNER OF JUNE BLUEGILL CONTEST

First winner of Oakland County Sportsmen's Club 1960 Bluegill Contest is Richard A. Bloom, 35 of 610 Hartner Drive, Holly, Michigan. His 20 ounce bluegill earns Mr. Bloom a \$25 merchandise certificate from OCSC which can be redeemed at Dart Sportsmen's Center in Holly.

Explaining how he caught the 'gill, Mr. Bloom says: "I was fishing in Deep Lake near Rose Center on the evening of June 20 when I ran into a school of bluegill. I tied on a yellow feather popping bug which is one of my favorite lures for bluegill fishing. I was using a light flyrod and this school gave me plenty of action. I took 15 fish out of that school. All together they weighed 11 pounds. The fish I entered in the contest was the heaviest, but there were several more that weighed right around a pound."

Second heaviest fish entered in the contest weighed 15 ounces. It was caught on worms by Grace Westfall, 102 John Street, Holly, Michigan. Mrs. Westfall caught her fish in a private lake on June 19.

Warren Neuenschwander, OCSC president, reminds Michigan residents that the bluegill contest still has three months to run. Victor M. Lindquist Now At M.S.U.O.

Chancellor D.B. Varner of Michigan State University Oakland today announced the appointment of Victor M. Lindquist, assistant principal of Pontiac Northern High School to the new post of Director of Scholarships and Assistant Registrar.

Mr. Varner said that MSUO was "very fortunate to have obtained a man of Victor Lindquist's abilities for this important post."

Philip Proud, assistant superintendent of Pontiac schools, said that Lindquist "is ideally equipped for this new job. He has already provided excellent leadership in the building of a new school, Pontiac Northern. There he has demonstrated unusual ability in working with youths, parents and teachers. He will make a strong professional contribution to the development of MSUO, I feel sure. And we here can console ourselves with the

thought that he will be making a real contribution to the community from another vantage point."

Mr. Lindquist, a native of Iowa, is 36 years old. He graduated from Augustana College in Rock Island, Ill. and received his master's degree from Wayne State University.

He served during World War II as a navy pilot from 1942-45. He came to Pontiac Central High School in 1948 and in ten years there was a teacher of biology, tennis coach, head of the science department, and a counselor. While there he wrote the science courses for the Pontiac Junior High Schools and also served on a state committee which put the findings of nuclear science into the classrooms.

Since 1958, he has been at Pontiac Northern as assistant principal where he has been instrumental in developing a new integrated English and social studies course which will be inaugurated in September.

Mr. Lindquist will assume his duties at MSUO August 15. His first task will be to acquaint secondary schools in Oakland, Macomb and Lapeer Counties with the considerable amount of scholarship and other assistance available at MSUO. He will be a liaison between MSUO and area high schools. He will also review and act on all applications for admission to MSUO.

Mr. Lindquist and his wife are well-known singing team. Mr. Lindquist is a tenor soloist at All Saint's Episcopal Church and his wife is the soprano soloist. They formerly sang at Christ Church Cranbrook and the Central Methodist Church in Pontiac. The Lindquists do many oratorios and duets for various functions in the area.

They have three children, Kirk Lars, 11; Kristin Louise, 7; and Erik Henri, 4.
