## DRAYTON PLAINS BOY RECEIVES CASSOCK

Ronald F. Nacarato, a graduate of St. Frederick's High School in Pontiac, received his black Jesuit cassock last Thursday, September 8, at Colombiere College on Big Lake Road. Ronald, the son of Mr. and Mrs. James V. Nacarato, of Drayton Plains, Michigan, was one of twenty-six new novices to receive their cassocks this year at the college. The new students, coming from various parts of Michigan and Ohio, comprised the second class to enter the new seminary since its opening a year and a half ago.

These twenty-six novices, from seventeen to twenty-five years of age, will spend the next two years at Colombiere undergoing a training program preparatory to taking vows as Jesuits in September of 1962.

The program consists chiefly in spiritual exercises, various studies, manual labor, and seasonal sports. They will attend classes in Latin, Greek, public speaking, and various other subjects which acquaint them with the apostolic work and rules of the Society.

Ronald had his first opportunity last Thursday, to observe the ceremony of taking vows in the Society of Jesus. At morning Mass in the college chapel overlooking Highway U. S. 10, Ronald saw and heard nine young men pronounce their vows of perpetual poverty, chastity, and obedience before the assembled community of 120 fellow-Jesuits. These new vow-men then began their two years Juniorate of the study of the humanities.

After four years at Colombiere, Ronald and his fellow seminarians will spend seven years studying philosophy and theology at West Baden, Indiana, where they will be ordained priests. They will then be assigned to teach in one of the four Jesuit schools in Michigan or Ohio. Some of his companions may be sent instead to teach in some foreign mission, if this latter type of work is preferred. One such student was David J. Leonard, of Cleveland, who pronounced his vows last Thursday and left the following day for Oregon where he will study in preparation for work in Alaska.

Ronald's application for entry at Colombiere College was accepted last spring by the president of the College, the Reverend Ara F. Walker, S. J. when Ronald visited the seminary with his class from St. Frederick's High School.

## Oakland County Youth For Christ Plans Program

Glyn Stone, president of the Oakland Youth Fellowship Clubs, announces an expansion of their program in this area. The board has secured the services of Norman Clothier, a former High School teacher from Lapeer, Michigan, as full time Rally director. He will be in charge of organizing the work in this area.

A rally will be held once a month and the director will aid the young people with their Bible Club program in the schools. There are several clubs now in the county and assistance to start others has been requested.

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**CLARKSTON AND INDEPENDENCE TOWNSHIP AMERICAN CANCER SOCIETY**

Cancer is said to be the second major cause of death in the United States. According to the U.S. Public Health services, deaths from cancer in 1958 totaled 352,320.

Among the major needs to effect control of the disease are research; education of the medi-

cal profession in diagnosis, particularly in the early stages; employment of the latest medical knowledge as to treatment; and education of the public to INSURE early diagnosis.

During the last twelve months period, out of the 275 patients served by the North Oakland County Unit office of the Michigan Cancer Foundation, 10 were in the Independence township area alone. There were 52,807

dressings distributed to cancer patients, and out of this amount, 1,553 were distributed in this area. Using an average of 15c per dressing, this would have cost the families of those served a total of \$232.95. Because no other agency in the Pontiac area provides dressings for incontinent patients, the Michigan Cancer Foundation has included this in its services. In addition to dressings, the unit office also provides loan closet items such as hospital beds, wheel chairs, commodes, and numerous expendable items, such as vaseline, adhesive tape, rubbing alcohol, and talcum powder. Particularly in the Clarkston and Independence Township area, receiving loan closet items was a total of 28 patients.

In some instances the Michigan Cancer Foundation was not able to provide services requested by cancer patients and their families. In these instances, intelligent referrals were made by volunteers to agencies rendering the services requested.

Among other things, the Michigan Cancer Foundation has fur-

nished film programs and speakers in the Independence Township and Clarkston area in the past year. The purpose of this program is to save lives by teaching the public the 7 DANGER SIGNALS, and by urging them to get a check-up by their family doctor once a year.

**SENIOR CITIZENS PLAN PICNIC**

Senior citizens from all parts of Oakland County will gather at Oakland Park in Pontiac on Tuesday, September 20 from 11 A.M. to 3 P.M., the Oakland County Senior Citizens Council announced today.

"This is going to be more than a picnic," disclosed Peter Cristiano, president of the Oakland County Senior Citizens Council. "We will not only lunch together and get acquainted, but we will also talk over some common prob-

lems and have some real fun" added Mr. Cristiano.

Recreation activities will include dancing, games and bingo.

After lunch the program will get started with a short talk on the purposes and aims of the Oakland County Senior Citizens Council.

Senior citizens who attend the picnic should bring their lunch. Coffee will be provided, but those who wish other beverages will need to bring them.

This is the first county-wide project undertaken by the council and "I believe this will become an annual affair," asserted Mr. Cristiano.

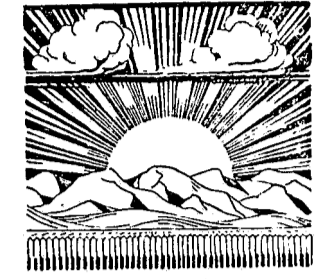
