## Wolves Stun Oxford Newlyweds Visit Blue Ridge Mts.

Clarkston High School opened its season on a successful note last Friday night when they defeated Oxford 14-0 on the home field.

During the first half of the game, defense and mistakes predominated the play on both sides. Clarkston put together two sustained drives during the first half however, both of them were stymied by mistakes. In the first quarter Clarkston fumbled on the five and late in the second quarter an intercepted pass by Mike Dodge of Oxford, broke up the second scoring drive of the wolves.

Following the intermission, the Wolves offense started to jell and with Galligan, Johnson and Bates tearing huge holes in Oxford's forward wall, the wolves put together an 80 yard drive in the third quarter. Sparking the drive was a 60 yard sprint by Willie Knox to the Oxford 12. Four plays later Ron Applegate plunged over from the four. The point after was added by Jim Gunter. Following an Oxford punt which Charlie Houston returned 65 yds. only to have the play called back because of a clipping penalty, the Wolves drove 70 yards to their second score of the evening. Bill White went over from the 8 behind the blocking of Weston and Marsh. Again the PAT was added by Gunter. As the game ended Clarkston was again threatening to score.

The game statistics show that Clarkston held a wide margin over Oxford. Clarkstons offense totaled 301 yards for the evening while Oxford could only manage 86 yards. Coach Braun of Oxford was very impressed by the work of Clarkstons defense which allowed Oxford only 3 first downs.

Especially impressive was the defensive work of Clarkstons forward wall led by Valentine and Marsh. Also shining on defensive work was Charlie Houston, who is one of the most improved Wolves this season.

Clarkston offense was led by Willie Knox who carried for 148 yards on a 11.4 average yards per carry. Also impressive was Bill White who amassed 43 yards in only 8 carries and the work of Gar Wilson indicated the end spot was in very capable hands.

Tomorrow night the Wolves will travel to Milford where they will attempt to wreck Milford's home opener. Milford's formation attack is highlighted by Gary Anderson, a 215 pound fullback who also shines on defense. Clarkston is taking this game serious as they know Milford will be out to avenge a 19-6 beating they took from the Wolves last year. Also Clarkstons scouts were very impressed by the Redskins backfield speed. A large Clarkston following is anticipated to help cheer the Wolves on to victory number two.
