Wolves Rally; Beat Clarenceville

Willie Knox's 12-yard run with less than three minutes remaining in the game, gained Clarkston a 13-13 tie against Clarenceville on a cool crisp evening. Clarkston's failure to convert the extra point on the touchdown however, cost them the triumph and dropped the Wolves to second place in the WOCL standings behind league leading West Bloomfield. Clarkston's comeback came after the brilliant Tony Giacabazzi, Clarenceville's end had all but stolen the show with his sensational pass catching. His 35-yard catch from Ron Blovet deep in Wolves' territory, set up the Trojan's first touchdown and gave them a lead that they held for three quarters. The Trojans completely dominated the play, both on offense and defensive, during the first half. Their offensive unit featured by a strong passing attack, had numerous touchdowns disqualified, because of penalties and their defensive unit held the Wolves to 25-yards rushing and completely stopped the passing of quarterback Mike Applegate. Clarkston showed signs of coming out of their deliriousness in the second half when halfback Bill White crashed through the Trojan defense on a 45-yard pass from Mike Applegate setting up Clarkston's first touchdown. Willie Knox scored sometime after on a 15-yard run with Jim Gunter converting and the Wolves were in the lead for the first time, during the night 7-6. Moments later, Clarenceville marched 60-yards inside Clarkston's 10, but had trouble moving the ball any further as the Wolves' defense tightened. Clarkston trying to hold their slim one point lead, put on a good defensive show, as they stopped three successive Trojan bids for a touchdown but hopes of a goal line stand were wiped out as Ron Blovet swept around end for the touchdown and Tony Giacabazzi converted for Clarenceville's final tally.

Clarkston quickly got a drive of its own going right after the ensuing kickoff. Bill White's 55-yard pass run from Mike Applegate was the key play in Clarkston's attempt to pull the game out of the fire. Three plays after Willie Knox raced 12-yards around end to tie the Trojan's at 13 all.

The tension mounted, as Jim Gunter who had kicked 4-straight conversions, prepared to kick number 5 but his chance never came as the center in his anxiety to snap the ball snapped it low-making it impossible to be placed on the tee, and Clarkston's hope of squeaking by Clarenceville ended. Halfback Willie Knox was Clarkston's big gainer on the ground with 60-yards in 12 carries. Clarkston totaled 190-yards total offense for the game, featuring 133-yards rushing and 57-yards passing. The Wolves will have to put on a better showing if they intend to stay up in the standings. From here on, their schedule really gets tough. They play the high-flying Bronco's of Holly tomorrow, then Brighton and Northville thereafter.

WOMEN'S CLUB MEET

The opening fall meeting of the Clarkston Community Women's Club was held September 28 at the Community Center, Mrs. Jack Frost, President presided over the business meeting.

The principal speaker was Mr. Walter Reynolds, a director of the Oakland Citizens League, assisted by Mr. John Parker, Executive Director of the League. As Chairman of the Issues Committee, Mr. Reynolds had made a thorough study of the three State issues which are to be voted on in the November election.

The speaker presented the arguments for and against the proposal on a constitutional convention, stressing that the question the voters will be deciding in November is not whether constitutional convention should be called, but whether or not the proposal to call such a convention should appear on the April ballot. It is at that time that the electorate will decide if there is to be a constitutional convention.

Mr. Reynolds also explained and reported varying views on the Sales Tax issue. This proposal is to increase the limit on Sales Tax from 3% to 4%. If passed, the legislature would be empowered to vote a 4% tax.

The bonding issue was also covered by Mr. Reynolds, who explained that this proposal provides for a continuation of the existing provision for an emergency fund for distressed school districts. There is no increase in taxes involved.

Members and guests of the Woman's Club then directed questions on these issues to both Mr. Reynolds and Mr. Parker. The group also received information on the Oakland Citizens League itself, and those interested in non-partisan study and participation in governmental and civic activities were invited to join the League.

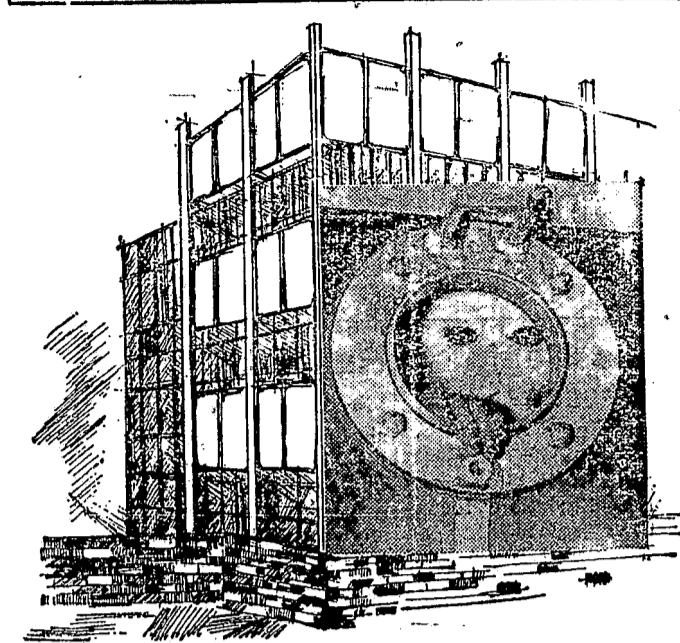

Drive Carefully

Monkeys and New Building Aid Wayne State Researchers

DETROIT — Thanks to a building recently completed on Wayne State University's medical campus and to monkeys housed within it, major advances are being made toward understanding man's respiratory diseases. The new \$1,000,000 Industrial Medicine and Hygiene Building recently received two types of occupants: those wearing the laboratory coats of Wayne researchers and the dozens of furry creatures who, in air-conditioned chambers, are the center of research interest. These creatures — monkeys and other animals commonly used in medical research — breathe air pollutants of varying types and in controlled amounts, to help doctors study the toxic or non-toxic effects of such air elements as exhaust fumes, and other chemical by-products. Two of the four floors of the modern structure have been designed for research in the radiobiological sciences. The work is under the direction of Dr. Arthur J. Vorwald, nationally known for his contributions to industrial medicine. He has been a professor at Wayne since 1954.

The application for transfer shall be filed with the Township, City or Village Clerk who shall transfer such elector's registration in accordance with the application. When the name of any street in a Township, City or Village has been changed, it shall be the duty of the Township, City or Village Clerk to make the change to show the proper name of street in the registration records, and it shall not be necessary for the elector to change his registration with respect thereto in order to be eligible to vote.

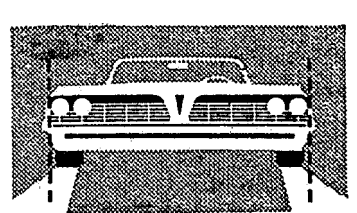

The F.H.A. welcomes any girl who has taken one year of homemaking to join this organization.

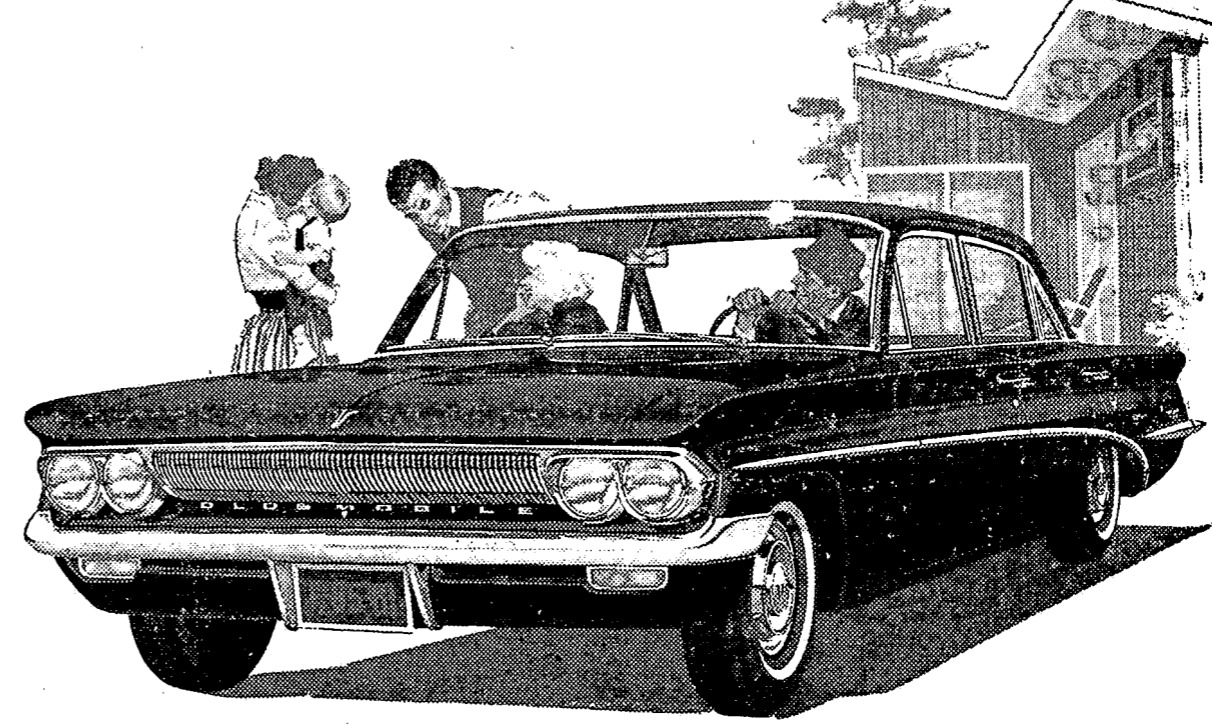
