Open Letter

TO VOTERS OF CLARKSTON Large Crowd COMMUNITY SCHOOL DIST.

The Clarkston Community District has been able to finance and maintain its building program during this period of rapid growth and low valuation because it has been able to favorably market unlimited qualified

bonds. Unlimited qualified bonds were made possible through the constitutional amendement adopted in 1955 for a period of seven years, and it will expire in 1962 unless the electors of the State of Michigan support Proposal I in the November 8, 1960 election.

Because the 1955 amendment was an experiment in financing, the 1955 Legislature decided to put a time limit on the amendment in order to determine over a limited period of time whether it would accomplish the results claimed by its sponsors. The Legislature established July 1, 1962, as the expiration date with the thought in mind that if the method of financing proved successful, it could be renewed by submitting another amendment to the voters of the state.

We now have five years of experience under the 1955 amendment. The results have far surpassed the most optimistic forcasts. Under its provisions, Michigan school districts have been able to finance and build need-\Ron Jyleen. ed classrooms without fear of confiscatary taxation. Schools can now be bought on the same reasonable credit terms that home owners use in buying their homes.
