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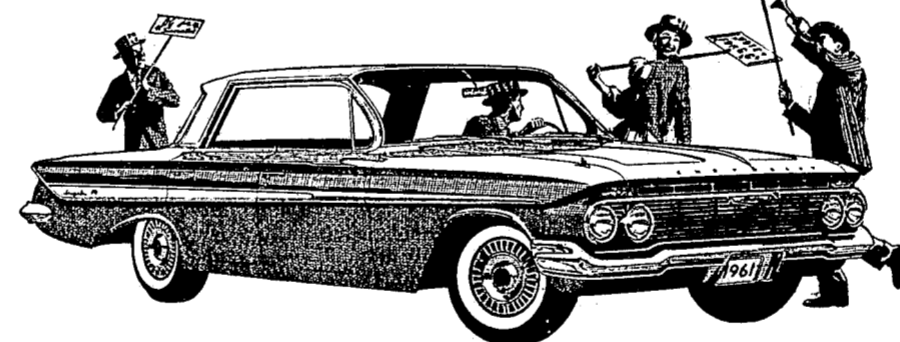
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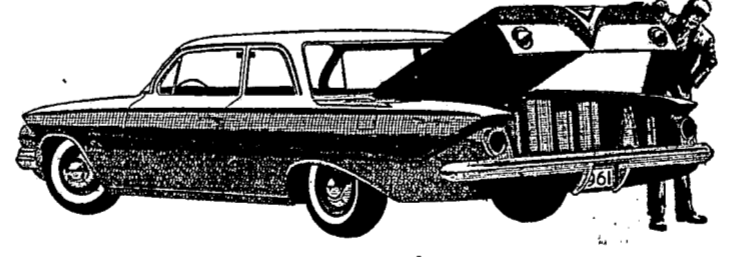
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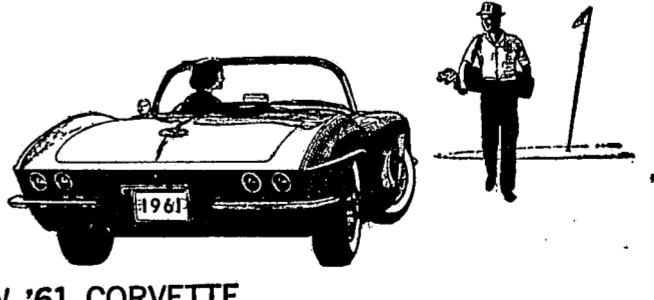

The Clarkston Wolves lost their first game of the season, taking a 14-7 defeat on the chin at hands of the Broncos of Holly. Riding a three-game undefeated streak, the Wolves were beaten by their own mistakes, interceptions, and by the versatile Bob Ennis. Holly's sensational halfback. The brawny back scored both of Holly's touchdowns and added both conversions to end Clarkston's streak which dropped the Wolves to the second division in the league standings. Utilizing a sweep around end play, Holly opened the scoring in the second quarter as halfback Ennis pilfered through the Wolves' defense from 44 yards out. Clarkston immediately tied the score as quarterback Mike Applegate plunged into the endzone from the 1-yard line with Jim Gunter adding the extra point with a boot through the up-rights. The half ended with both teams tied at 7 points. Clarkston couldn't get much of an attack going in the second half as the Wolves failed to hang on to the ball long enough to do any threatening. As a result, Holly dominated the play during the rest of the night. In the third quarter, the Broncos cracked through the Wolves stonewall defense as Ennis again scored the TD scoring. Statistics showed that Clarkston gained 16-yards passing, 158-yards rushing, featuring 90-yards by speedster Willie Knox for 174-yards total offense. Donnie Miller, Clarkston's defensive end, did an outstanding job on defensive. Jim Johnson, Richard Valentine, David Gulligan and the rest of the defensive crew all did a fine job in keeping the score as low as they did and were the one bright spot on a dismal evening. The Wolves tackle Brighton Bulldogs at Brighton next, tomorrow. Here's hoping the Wolves will get back into contention with a victory.

Precision marching by the Clarkston and Holly marching bands highlighted the Clarkston-Holly half-time program, Friday night, October 7. The Holly High School Band began the half time program with a display of marching ability. A salute to the Clarkston team was made with the formation of a 'C', and also to the Holly team with the formation of an 'H'.

After this entertaining exhibition the Clarkston-High Marching Band high-stepped onto the brightly lighted field, led by their five majorettes, Judy Fife, Sue Jackson, Faye Jenks, Emily Harris and Shirley Beach, and strutting Drum Major, David Pileman. Under the direction of Mr. Barton Connors, the band played a fanfare from Karl L. Kings famed march. True Blue and did a file countermarch. Stepping high they continued down the field and made a pin-wheel turn at the fifty yard line. After this outstanding maneuver, the band did a "kick-step" routine before playing the Iowa Band Law, and marching back into a block formation. The University of Michigan Band Day is an annual affair and along with approximately 12,500 other bandsman, Clarkston High was fortunate enough to take part. Band day officially began when 188 bands from across the state assembled behind the U. of M. football stadium at 8:30 A.M. Saturday morning and began rehearsing for the days pre-game and half time program.

Mr. Karl L. King was guest conductor of the afternoon. Mr. King is a famed composer from the State of Iowa, and his name is well known in the field of marches and serenades. He conducted at the rehearsals and half-time, the following pieces: Drake Relays, True Blue, Iowa Band Law, Stars and Stripes Forever, and A Night in June. The day itself was a beautiful one, not only for the assemblage of the world's largest mass band, but also for the game between U. of M. and Duke University. The stadium literally roared with the cheering of over 98,000 fans, and with the beating of drums from each of the 188 bands, the teams had plenty of encouragement.

All in all it was an exciting and colorful day, and even when the stadium had cleared of bands, and instruments, and the regular spectators who come every week, the memory of Band Day will not be soon forgotten, but eagerly looked-forward to next year.

bond issues in six to nine years, and several other problems developed which led to the development of the amendment adopted by the people in 1955. This amendment, Article X, Section 27, was generally known as the Thirteen Mill Amendment. The 1955 amendment expires July 1, 1962. After that date, if a new amendment is not adopted, all Michigan school bonds will automatically be restricted by the laws governing taxes and debt limits that existed prior to May 4, 1955. If nothing is done all new bonds issued after July 1, 1962, will be payable only from limited taxes. There will be no state loan fund to relieve the tax burden at the local level. Long-term financing of school buildings will be impossible. To do nothing would set the stage for higher annual service charges and a serious delay in our school building program.

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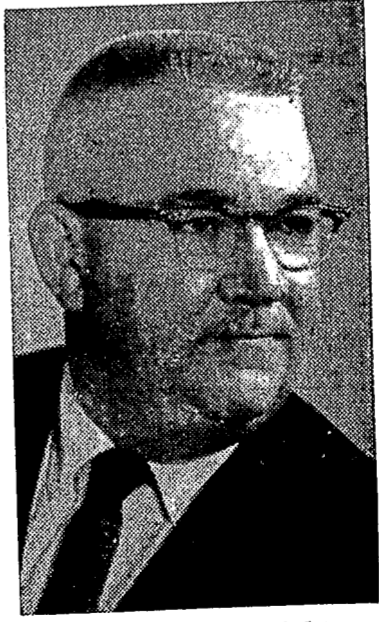
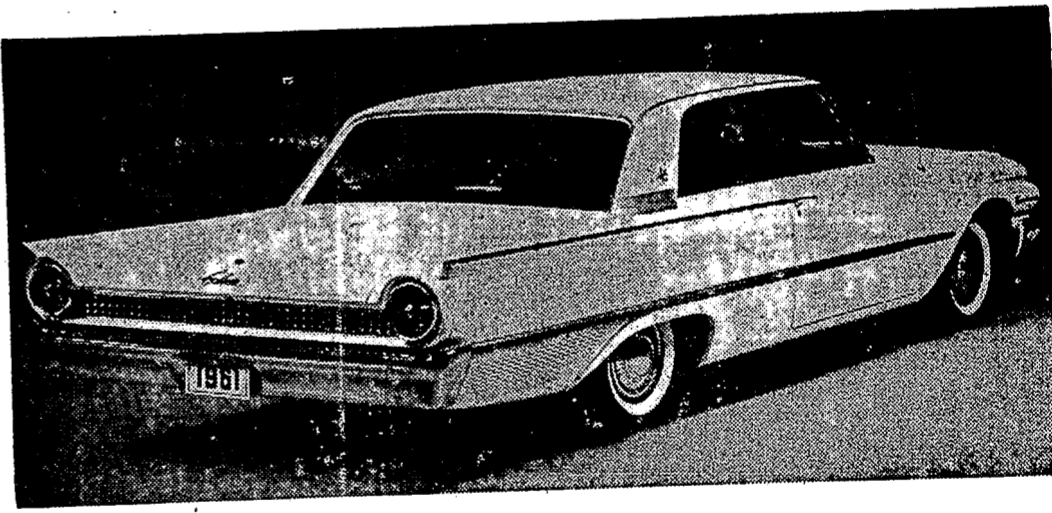
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
