#### James D. Cooper

James D. Cooper, 60 passed away suddenly at his home at 11387 Big Lake Road in Davisburg, on October 12, 1960. Mr. Cooper was born in Robertsdale, Alabama on November 9, 1899 to Joseph and Georgia Ann Cooper. On March 27, 1923 he was married to Gertrude Feld Mausch in Jackson, Michigan. The family came to this county seven years ago from Southbend, Indiana, and at the time of his death, he was employed as a Millwright at Pontiac Motors.

He was discharged from the U.S. Navy as Seaman, 2nd Class, of World War I, on March 22, 1919, having enlisted September 5, 1917.

Mr. Cooper is survived by his wife; three children, William Marshall Cooper of Lansing, Michigan, Mrs. Robert Phelps of Southbend, Indiana and Sharon Cooper, at home. His mother is living, also, two brothers, Joseph P. ### HERE'S HOW IT'S DONE

Many of the donors at every visit of the Red Cross Bloodmobile to Independence Township are "repeaters." They've given before and know how much it means.

But they alone cannot donate enough blood to fill the ever-growing demand. New donors are needed.

The first time is the hardest, any experienced donor will agree, because the only difficult part is worrying beforehand.

Any healthy person between 18 and 59, and weighing over 110 pounds is eligible to give. When he registers at a bloodmobile, a card is filled out giving his name, address, occupation, age and sex. Temperature is then taken, followed by a nourishing drink of orange juice. Then blood pressure and pulse rate are taken, and hemoglobin content of the blood, which would show up an anemic condition. The history of the donor's past illnesses and present condition is then taken and reviewed by

A list of the participating colleges may be obtained from the principal's office. Selection of award winners under the College Plan is made by the respective colleges and universities. Students wishing to be considered under this plan should apply directly to the college of their choice. Awards under both plans range from \$200 to \$2,000 per year depending on the student's needs.



### Resolution Adopted By The Board of Education of the Clarkston Community School District October 10, 1960.

Re: State Proposal No. 1 (School Amendment which will appear on the ballot November 8, 1960)

**Resolution**  
By Ronald Weber, seconded by Walton Robbins.

WHEREAS, Section 27 of Article X of the State Constitution expires on July 1, 1962, and

WHEREAS, the provisions of this Section also make it possible to issue bonds for longer periods of time than would otherwise be possible, thereby making annual current taxes for debt service sufficiently low so as to permit the construction of needed school facilities, and

WHEREAS, unless the expiration date of July 1, 1962 is extended there may well be a large amount of Michigan school bonds issued before that date resulting in a disorganized market for such bonds, and

WHEREAS, the Legislature of the State of Michigan has in the light of these circumstances and by large majorities in both houses placed on the November, 1960 ballot a proposal to add another Section to Article X of the Constitution extending the provisions of the existing Section 27 of Article X and which proposal will appear as Proposal No. 1 on the state ballot.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Clarkston Board of Education does express its conviction that the enactment of said Proposal No. 1 is desirable for the progress of public education in the State of Michigan, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Clarkston Board of Education does recommend to the citizens that they vote "yes" on the said proposal at the election in November, 1960.

 the doctor who is required to be present constantly at every blood collection.  
 If any of these tests show any reason for not drawing blood,

the physician informs the donor of the reason and suggests he see his family doctor for a further check-up. Less than 5 per cent of the people who offer to donate are rejected or postponed. Many keep coming back

in the hope that this time they will be accepted. They will be if the condition for which they were turned down has cleared up.  
 After the donor gets the physician's o.k., he lies on an individual cot and his blood is taken through a small needle in the arm by a registered nurse specially trained for this work, experienced and competent. She watches continually while the blood is drawn. The process takes 10 to 15 minutes.

The donor then is required to rest on the cot a few minutes, after which he is escorted to a refreshment table where he sits down and eats cookies and drinks coffee or milk. This further rest and refreshment gives the body more chance to adjust to the loss of blood.

Most people can easily give a pint of blood three or four times a year. Under Red Cross policy five times a year is the maximum.

Any township resident who requires blood at any time may have it released to him without charge by contacting the local Blood Bank chairman, Mrs. Arthur L. Rose, Jr.

The Townships Bloodmobile visit is sponsored each year by the Clarkston Community Women's Club. All prospective donors are asked to contact, Mrs. John Jadwin, donation chairman, at MAple 5-1249.

Members of other blood banks may, if they wish, donate here and have their donation credited to their own blood banks.


