New Parks Sticker



Come January 1, park users will need annual or daily stickers on windshields of their vehicles to enter 55 of Michigan's 62 parks. Annual stickers will go on sale late in December at hunting and fishing license dealers in areas covering these 55 parks. They also will be available at all parks. The annual sticker (above) will cost \$2 at parks and an additional 15 cents at dealers to cover their handling expenses. Aside from this handling charge by dealers only, all permit money will go directly toward retiring a bond issue which will finance a proposed \$3,000,000 parks improvement and lands acquisition program during the current fiscal year. Daily 50-cent stickers will be sold only at parks where they are required.

"THOU SHALT NOT KILL" — ON HIGHWAYS

Motorists do have a moral obligation, apart from the physical risk or punishment in traffic courts — to drive safely. Religious leaders are the authority for this belief. To paraphrase a Biblical quotation they say, in effect, what doth it profit a man if, to gain a minute, he sacrifices by his carelessness a life, probably his own?

Foy Valentine, Nashville, Tenn., executive secretary of the Christian Life Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention, "As bad driving is a sin against God and against man, made in God's image, so good driving honors God and dignifies man."

Prayers for motorists are not uncommon within each of various denominations. Most Reverend Ralph L. Hayes, Davenport, Iowa, endorsing that state's "Safety Sabbath", said "There is a moral obligation for every automobile driver to observe the rules of safety on the roads." Leaders of Protestant, Catholic, and Jewish faiths in Michigan likewise have endorsed this moral obligation tenet in endorsing "Safety Sabbath". This year it was observed November 19-20, but instead of an isolated weekend, clergymen, meeting recently in Lansing, decided to expand the observance to the whole year.

In essence, they believe that Christian character is revealed not only in the church house on Sabbath morning, but also behind the steering wheel throughout the week.

The National Safety Council has a striking multi-colored poster which it will distribute nationally. Shown are 2 cars which have come together in violent collision. Inscribed in large red letters above this scene are the words "Thou Shalt Not Kill." That is the theme of the spiritual campaign coming up in Michigan churches of most faiths — drive with moral responsibility to protect the lives of others.
