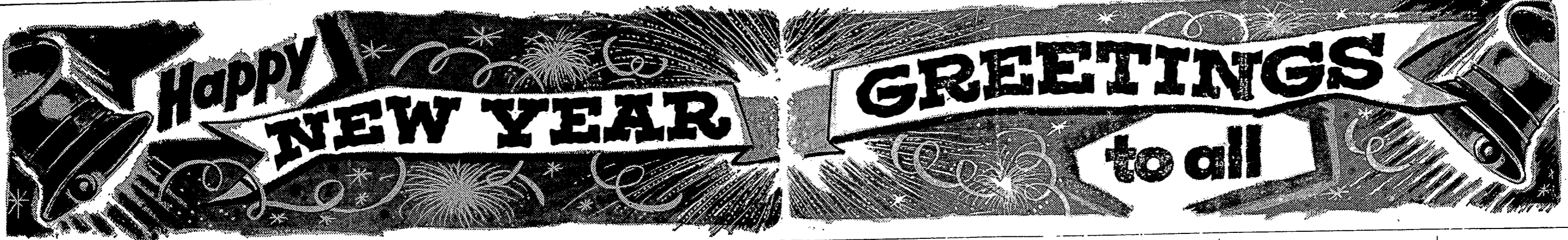

## Summary From State Police

Michigan traffic deaths increas-  
ed — water accident fatalities de-  
creased — department pistol  
marksmen recorded their best  
year — a new annual crime re-  
port appeared — and an experi-  
ment was begun in using a police  
dog for tracking criminals or  
lost persons — these were among  
highlights reported by the State  
Police in their annual summary  
of activities for 1960.

Projected figures put traffic  
deaths at 1,585, an increase of 118  
or eight percent, over 1959. In-  
juries numbered 90,000 and acci-  
dents 210,000, new all time highs  
and respective gains of 39 and  
six percent over the previous  
high records set last year.

Travel mileage gained three  
percent to 31.6 billion and the  
death rate of five per 100 million  
vehicle miles was up four per-  
cent. Registered vehicles now  
total 3,350,000 and licensed drivers  
4,165,000, each increases of  
three percent.

Department officers made 205,  
787 traffic arrests and issued 348,  
943 oral warnings. Non-traffic  
arrests totaled 19,070. There were  
6,108 juvenile traffic offenders  
arrested and 5,276 delinquent  
and wayward minors apprehend-  
ed. Department vehicles travel-  
ed 21,368,918 miles.

In 472 water accidents 244 per-  
sons drowned and 222 were in-  
jured. Drownings totaled 325 last  
year in 457 mishaps.

State police marksmen scored  
major triumphs in the Michigan  
police shoot, the Indiana and Illi-  
nois State Police matches, and  
the Camp Perry, Ohio, and Michi-  
gan Revolver Association meets.  
Tr. Robert E. Steinhurst, East  
Lansing, set a national police  
record with 195 in .45 caliber  
slow fire.

State and local officers co-  
operated in providing data for the  
first annual "Michigan Law En-  
forcement Officials Report on  
Crime," which will provide a  
picture of the crime problem in  
the state.

The department mustered in its  
first police dog, "Jocko," in an  
experiment for tracking criminals  
and lost persons. The dog and  
his handler, Tr. Richard  
H. Abbott, Erie, received training  
at the St. Louis, Mo., police  
department police dog school.

Department enlisted strength  
was 1,106 as the year began and  
1,098 at its close. A recruit school  
begins in January. Promotions  
numbered 72 and retirements, 16.  
Three officers, two retired and  
one active, and a department  
chaplain died.

Six awards for bravery and  
31 citations for meritorious ser-  
vice were granted during the  
year.

## Mothers Help College Sons

Mothers nearly a century ago  
as now — have generally "come  
through" when their sons at col-  
lege sent out an S.O.S., for cash,  
letters in The University of Michi-  
gan Historical Collections indi-  
cate.

On April 7, 1867 Mrs. W. L.  
Alexander of Geneva, N. Y. an-  
swered the plea of her son Byron,  
a sophomore at the U-M thus: "It  
seems that my labors to impress  
upon your infant mind the neces-  
sity of hoisting signals of distress  
before you are 'hull down' have  
been abortive."

"If I understand your letter  
you have gone under to the a-  
mount of \$12. The present avail-  
able funds of the family are re-  
duced to \$22, or thereabouts, 20  
of which we send you, hoping  
the cow will 'come in' in a day  
or two and relieve us from fur-  
ther embarrassment.

"It may be two weeks before  
we can send you any more, so  
if you are contemplating matri-  
mony — as I expect that will  
be your next extravagance —  
please to hold on."

## March Of Dimes Campaign Opens

"The most effective ammu-  
nition any of us can supply for the  
fight to prevent crippling diseases  
is the dollars we give to the 1961  
New March of Dimes," George  
W. Kuhn, Oakland County cam-  
paign director, announced today.

The campaign will begin Janu-  
ary 2 and culminate January  
31 with the traditional Mothers'  
March, he added.

"We ask all residents of Oak-  
land County to please say YES  
to the 1961 New March of Dimes  
so The National Foundation can  
obtain the funds it needs to con-  
tinue the attack against crippling  
birth defects, arthritis and polio,"  
Kuhn explained.

The campaign will be launched  
by different activities in the var-  
ious communities throughout Oak-  
land County, starting in most  
instances with an official Mayor's  
proclamation of January as  
March of Dimes month.

"The National Foundation relies  
on your March of Dimes contribu-  
tions to enlarge its program  
of research, professional educa-  
tion and patient aid," Kuhn de-  
clared.

"These cripples are stubborn  
and dangerous enemies. Here in  
the United States, one out of  
every 16 babies is born with a  
significant birth defect. More  
than 11 million persons are af-  
flicted with crippling arthritis  
or similar rheumatic diseases," he  
pointed out.

"The National Foundation has  
proved through development of  
the Salk vaccine that the Ameri-  
can people could find the means  
of preventing such a dread cripple  
as paralytic polio. Continued  
public support will insure similar  
break-throughs toward the pre-  
vention of birth defects and arth-  
ritis," Kuhn promised.

He also urged that anyone de-  
siring of contributing a few hrs.  
of work toward the March of  
Dimes could volunteer by call-  
ing the chapter office, Federal  
8-0411.

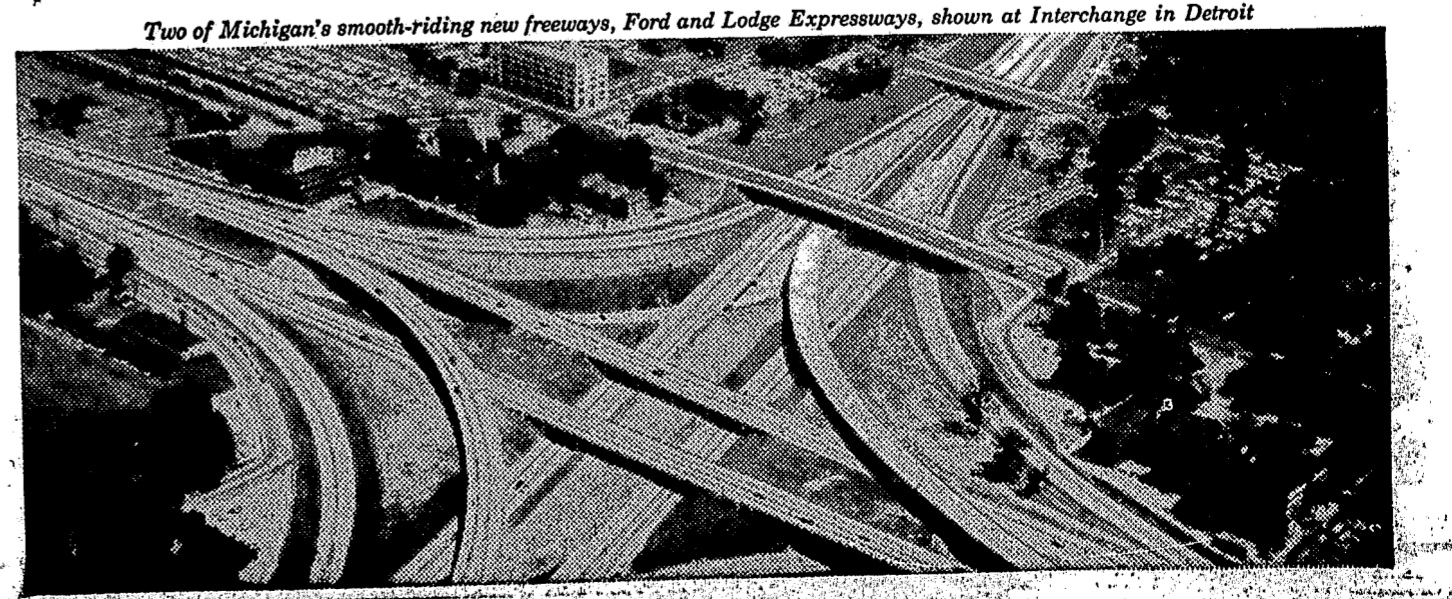
