The campaign will be launched by different activities in the various communities throughout Oakland County, starting in most instances with an official Mayor's proclamation of January as March of Dimes month.

"The National Foundation remony — as I expect that will lies on your March of Dimes con be your next extravagence — tributions to enlarge its program of research, professional education and patient aid," Kuhn declared.

"These cripplers are stubborn and dangerous enemies. Here in the United States, one out of every 16 bahies is born with a significant birth defect. More than 11 million persons are afflicted with crippling arthritis or similar rheumatic diseases," he pointed out.

"The National Foundation has proved through development of the Salk vaccine that the American people could find the means of preventing such a dread crippler as paralytic polio. Continued public support will insure similar break-throughs toward the prevention of birth defects and arthritis," Kuhn promised.



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
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
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
