### Mrs. George Miskin Leads "March"

Next Sunday afternoon, scores of local volunteer mothers will conduct their annual house-to-house pilgrimage on behalf of the Oakland County March of Dimes. When one of your neighbors comes to your door, will you please say Yes to the New March of Dimes?"

This plea was made today by Mrs. George Miskin of 6212 Cramlane Independence area Mothers' March chairman for the Oakland County Chapter, who reports that the local group will be joined by approximately 8,000 sister volunteers throughout the county, and in our area, by the Independence Township Volunteer Firemen, who will be dressed in full uniform.

The annual Mothers' March provides about 65 per cent of all March of Dimes funds voluntarily contributed by Oakland County residents. Other sources are the mail cards, dime boards and coin canisters and other special events planned and carried out in each community.

"Last year, our volunteer group collected about \$75,000 of the \$116,000 contributed in the county but unfortunately this sum was not adequate to the needs of the 208 polio victims currently on the patient aid rolls of the county chapter of the National Foundation.

"Our chapter ended 1960 approximately \$25,000 in the red because we did not collect enough funds last year to pay the cost of aid to the polio victims from past years," the local chairman said.

"In addition to the \$25,000 we owe area hospitals for patient care, we still owe The National Foundation approximately \$250,000 we had to borrow for county use during the polio epidemic years in the past. The Oakland County chapter spends an average of \$7,000 per month on area polio victims, and much of this aid will continue indefinitely," she reported.






