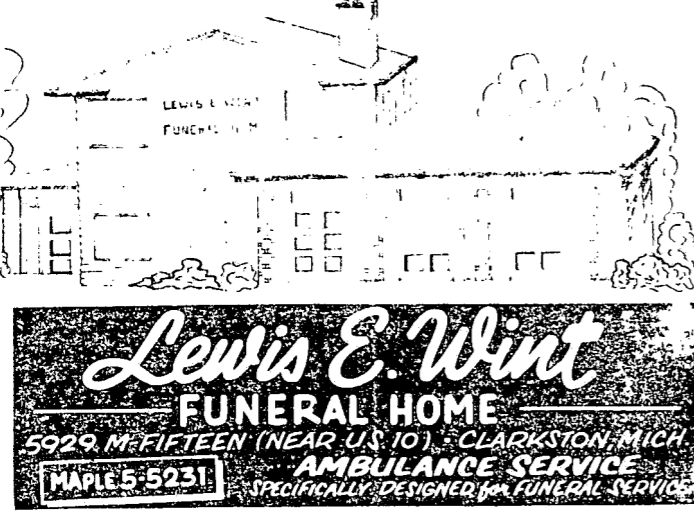

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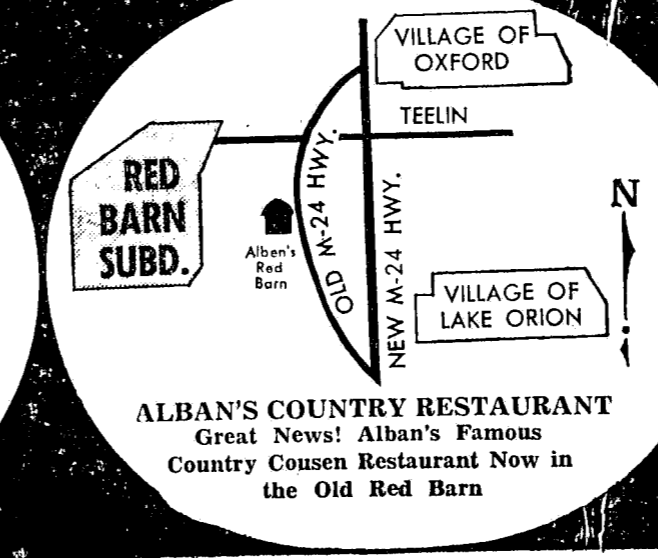
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BEEF SUGAR INDUSTRY OFFERS SCHOLARSHIPS

Two choice scholarships at Michigan State University will be available again this year because of action taken by the beet sugar industry of Michigan.

Six years ago the beet sugar industry decided to award two \$1,000 scholarships to encourage studies in the fields of agriculture and home economics. The program has worked so well that a continuance was approved again this year.

The scholarships will go to a young man and a young woman who meet these qualifications, in addition to high scholastic standing and excellent citizenship. They must be eligible for admission as freshmen at Michigan State University and they must be a resident of the Lower Peninsula of Michigan.

John McGill, public relations director for the industry stated that the deadline for applications will be April 15 and an announcement of winners will be made about May 15. He said that the industry is pleased once again to be able to offer the scholarships. "The beet sugar industry is highly cognizant of the importance of agriculture and home economics to our general economic welfare. Those young people who choose these fields are not only bettering themselves substantially, but will find that they have materially aided the overall economic and social levels."

The awards are made on a point basis with scholastic ability, need, activities and citizenship included in the determination.

Unlike most scholarships, the sugar beet awards are spread out over the freshman, sophomore and junior years at school.

Applications will be screened by scholarship committees of the College of Agriculture and the College of Home Economics at Michigan State University and five candidates selected from each of the two fields. Then a special joint committee including personnel of the sugar beet industry and the University will make the final selection.

Applications for the scholarships should be made to the Dean of the College of Agriculture in the case of young men or to the Dean of the College of

Home Economics in the case of young women, Michigan State University, East Lansing, Michigan.

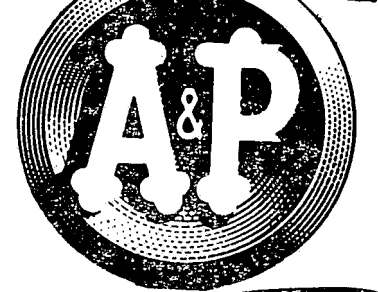

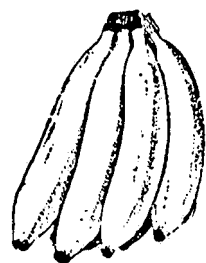

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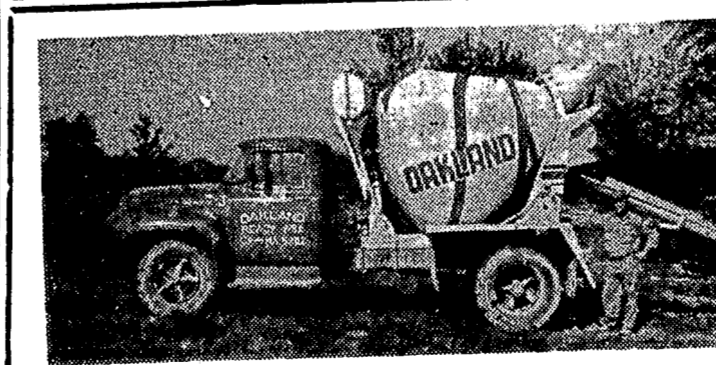
