Overtime Fatal For Holly

For his outstanding achievement in the first overtime period in the game with Holly last week, and for the glorification bestowed upon Clarkston High School as a result of his dead accuracy at the foul line, I hereby proclaim February 17, to be observed as "Ron Walter" day in honor of Ron Walter, Clarkston's inspiring star forward.

Although this proclamation is just fictitious, many who attended the Clarkston-Holly clash Friday, will agree that this attribution would have been in due order.

For those of you who unfortunately were not able to attend this history-making conflict, you missed a night of spine-tingling, nerve-wracking or otherwise exciting basketball, but more than that you missed calm, cool and collected Ron Walter bag six of six charity tosses on one and one combination, mind you, in the final three minutes of play, to sink the fifth ranked Holly Broncos to their second defeat in twelve games, 67-66. How close can you get!

To refresh your basketball memory, a one and one combination is a particular basketball shot taken at the free-throw line, whereby the person shooting has an opportunity of scoring two points on two successive throws, only and if the first throw attempted is made good. This is, if the first shot is made, a second shot is entitled, but nothing if it is not made. In Ron's case, deadly Ron was fortunate enough to bag the three bonus throws after sinking the first throw in three different occasions to give him 6-6 in the overtime period and 9-10 for the night.

Nerve wracking as the contest Friday certainly was, the final outcome proved one thing very decisively — the Clarkston crew has finally realized themselves that they've got the team despite their record, that could have risen to great heights and which still can, once the tournaments begin, if they had only made up their minds just a little bit sooner. There's no question about it the "pack" simply decided that they could take Holly on any terms and they did — the hard way — beating Holly when the Broncos were at their best.

Giving at least a good two inches man for man in the back court Clarkston spurred to a 28-26 intermission lured.

At the start of the third quarter Holly displayed some tremendous outside shooting and rolled to a 22 point quarter. They held a constant lead from that very point but with Hal Weston and Mike Applegate directing the attack the Clarkston chargers were never far behind. This backcourt twosome was largely responsible for keeping the scoring gap so close. On numerous occasions Holly's one-two punch of Morlan and McKenzie threatened to run away with it all but Weston and Applegate realizing what would happen if the Broncos were given too big of a lead set up their plays well — at times outfoxing and even outsmarting their bigger and formidable opponents while driving in for tallies that always kept Clarkston a basket or two from equalizing the score.

Up until the one minute mark of the fourth quarter Holly still sustained the lead. Then with hardly 15 seconds of game time remaining and the Wolves trailing by two points Clarkston got one last chance to pull for a tie. The ball was worked close into Bill Powell who, while being directly under the basket missed a shot as the ball rimmed off the hoop, but leaping with that spring-board ability he possesses the big guy tossed the rebound right back in just before the buzzer sounded and the Clarkston fans went frantically wild.

In opening moments of the first overtime period of the season for Clarkston, Ron Walter popped in two free throws as the amazing Wolves recaptured the lead for the first time since the second quarter. Holly countered immediately thereafter, with guard Bob Ennis dropping in a field goal from ten feet out. Walter again was fouled once Clarkston got possession of the ball and the Senior forward responded once more in the clutch with two

LOCAL CLEANERS CALLS FOR PROPER APPAREL FOR YOUNGER SET

Parents who insist that their sons and daughters dress properly render a service to society. So says Jess Berg of Berg Cleaners, who reports that the type of clothing brought in to his plant for school and holiday cleaning this season shows there is a healthy respect for proper attire in Clarkston.

Juvenile authorities say clothing and conduct are closely related. Mr. Berg pointed out, "They have found that conventionally accepted clothing is conducive to conventionally accepted behavior. In Boston a probation officer is quoted as saying that the general run of delinquents wear dungarees and jackets, especially black leather jackets. He said they are like a badge and tend to brand the youngsters."

Since studying reports on this, Mr. Berg paid special attention to the kind of clothing sent to his plant for holiday and school-time cleaning and freshening. He found little that could be called eccentric. "Nobody wants our children to dress unimaginatively," Berg said "but there is evidence that those who dress normally act and those who wear unusual clothes are more likely to become trouble makers and delinquents. I am sure our local school officials will welcome any effort by parents to see that their youngsters wear clean, well cared for clothing of appropriate style when they go to a party or go to class."

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
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
