KITE FLYING CAN BE SAFE FUN March winds remind us that today's space-age youngsters still have at least one thing in common with the children of yesterday—the love of watching the graceful antics of an airborne kite. For many generations kite flying has been recognized as a sure sign of spring right along with the gusty winds of March, the first robin, roller skating and marble shooting. And, already many of our young residents have abandoned their favorite winter pastimes and have begun rigging and flying their first kites of 1961. But before the season gets into full swing here are a few simple rules for keeping the fun in and the danger out of kite-flying: 1. Always fly kites in open fields — away from overhead wires and away from streets and roads where traffic is an additional hazard. 2. If you're building your own kite use a wooden frame. Wood is a non-conductor of electricity. 3. Use "plain" kite-string; avoid all tinsel wire or cord that has any appearance of being metallic. Metallic cord can carry electricity to your hand and cause painful injury or fatal shock. 4. If your kite does catch on a pole or tree, leave it there. It's too bad to lose it but making a

new kite is fun — and climbing for the old one might result in a fall or electric shock. 5. Never fly your kite during an electrical storm. Ben Franklin used a kite in his experiment with electricity, but he was lucky not to have been killed. 6. When you're running to raise your kite or keep it in the air, watch your step rather than your kite — it may save you a bad bump or tumble. Kite-flying is a great sport for young or old, for beginner or veteran of many springs, it can be safe if you keep in mind these rules.

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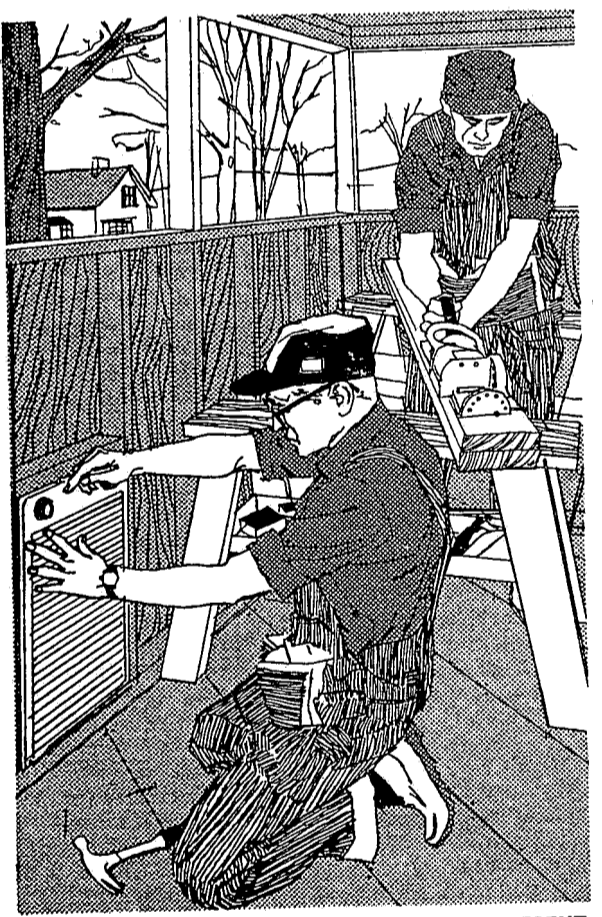
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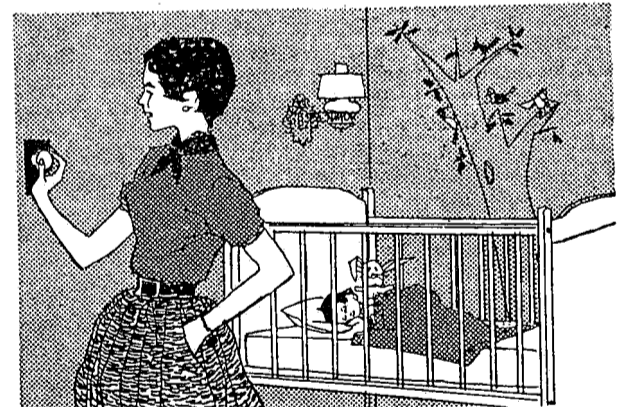

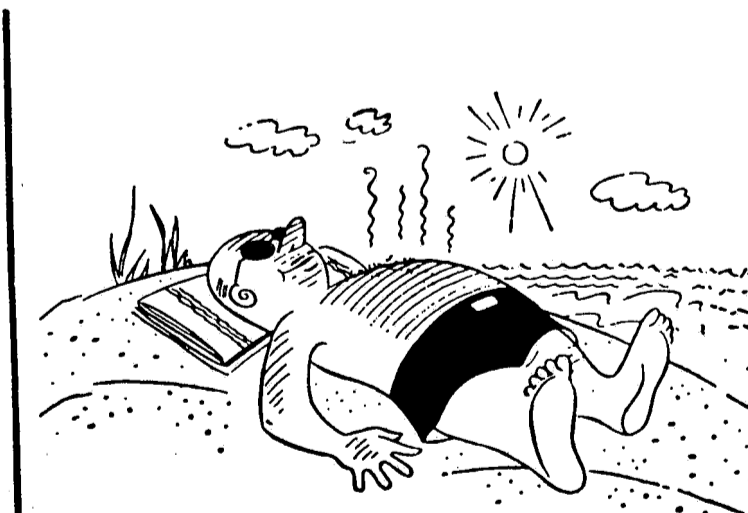
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URGENT BUSINESS

Moved by Waters, "That the salaries of the elected Village Officials for the year 1961-62 be set as follows: Trustees to receive \$2 for regular meetings attended with no compensation for special meetings; President to receive \$10.00 for each regular meeting attended with no compensation for special meetings; Clerk to receive \$300.00 annually; Treasurer to receive \$300.00 annually; Assessor to receive \$200.00 annually". Motion seconded by Oakley. Roll: Huttenlocher, yea; Oakley, yea; Terry, yea; Waters, yea; Wilford, yea. Yeas, 5; Nays, 0. Motion carried.

Trustee Terry introduced Ordinance No. 47.

AN ORDINANCE promulgated pursuant to the provisions of Act 62, Public Acts of 1956, Michigan, to regulate and control the operation of motor vehicles upon the streets and public places of the Village of Clarkston; to provide for signs, signals and other devices for the control and direction of traffic in said Village; to repeal certain ordinances and parts of ordinances, in conflict herewith and, to provide penalties for the violations of this ordinance, and the rules and regulations of the Commissioner of State Police adopted by reference by this ordinance.

THE VILLAGE OF CLARKSTON ORDAINS:

Section 1: That this Ordinance shall be known and may be cited as the "Uniform Traffic Code of the Village of Clarkston".

Section 2: That from and after the First day May A. D. 1961, the effective date hereof, this Ordinance be, and shall consist of all the terms, rules, conditions and regulations of the Uniform Traffic Code of cities, townships and villages, compiled under the supervision of the Secretary of State, and promulgated by the Commissioner of State Police, commonly known as Michigan State Police, Uniform Traffic Code for cities, townships and villages, which Code was filed with the Michigan Secretary of State, November 14, 1957, and which code is hereby adopted by reference in its entirety, pursuant to and by authority of Act 62, Public Acts of Michigan, 1956.

Section 3: That a copy of said code hereby adopted, shall at all times be on file with the Village Clerk, and also available for public examination at the headquarters of the Chief of Police of the Village.

Section 4: Every person convicted of a violation of any provision of this ordinance, including any provision of said code, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and thereupon may be punished by a fine not exceeding One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars, or by imprisonment not exceeding ninety (90) days, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Section 5: That this Ordinance repeals all ordinances heretofore adopted, by the Village of

Clarkston, which shall be in conflict with any valid provision hereof, including said Uniform Traffic Code as adopted by reference.

Motion seconded by Terry. Roll: Huttenlocher, yea; Oakley, yea; Terry, yea; Waters, yea; Wilford, yea. Yeas, 5; Nays, 0. Motion carried.

Moved by Huttenlocher, "That Earl and Marian Terry be reimbursed the sum of Three Hundred (\$300.00) Dollars which a-

mount represents an overpayment of One Hundred (\$100.00) on Sewer Tax for each of the years 1958, 1959, and 1960". Roll: Huttenlocher, yea; Oakley, yea; Waters, yea; Wilford, yea. Yeas, 4; Nays, 0. Terry abstained. Motion carried.

Trustee Terry offered the following resolution and moved its adoption.

Whereas, Section 13 (e) of Act 51, Public Acts of 1951 provides that each incorporated city and Village to which funds are re-

turned under the provisions of this section, that "the responsibility for all street improvement, maintenance and traffic operation work shall be coordinated by a single administrator to be designated by the governing body who shall be responsible for and shall represent the municipality in all transactions with the State Highway Commissioner pursuant to the provisions of this Act." Therefore, be it resolved, that this Honorable Body designate Ralph Thayer, Village Clerk,

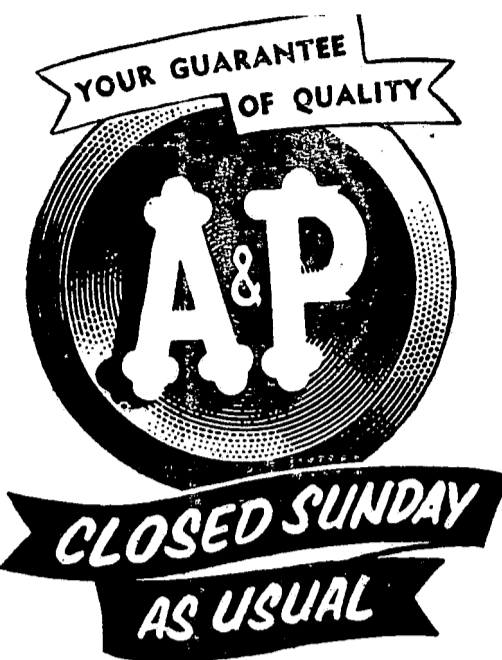
as the single administrator for the Village of Clarkston in all transactions with the State Highway Commissioner as provided in Section 13 of the Act. Yeas, 5; Nays, 0. Motion carried.

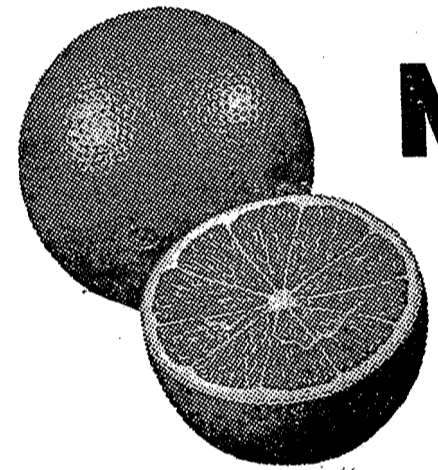

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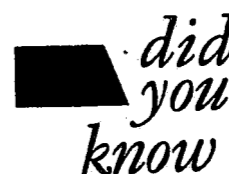
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
