ROTARY ANNS TO HOLD RUMMAGE SALE

Spring, in all its glory, is just around the corner-look out your window and see the youngsters ruffling bare headed in the sun-shine with the breeze just brisk enough to add to the excitement of the day-some of the youngsters are playing ball, dashing madly around improvised bases, arguing loudly in their own defence as to whether or not they are out (always, there's an argument-it is never a clear cut case!) Others are playing marbles, hop scotch, pushing doll buggies, shooting baskets in a driveway, some are out just for the pure, simple joy of being out, and using up the energy pulsing through their young bodies.

But there's another side of Spring. There's the side of Spring that beckons to children who gaze wistfully out the window to watch the other children at play, children who are in wheel chairs or in bed-crippled children who have all the desires and longings that Spring brings forth, but who are unable to answer her call.

Now picture these children at the Grace Bently Summer Camp at beautiful Lake Huron. Ramps are provided to wheel these youngsters down to the lake. They have two weeks, in a meticulously appointed camp, 4 or 5 in a cabin, so that they are with youngsters their own age and on the same physical level. Days on the lakeshore, that wonderful lake breeze ruffling their hair, and bringing a sparkle to their eyes, a glow to their cheeks. This is the sole purpose of the annual Rummage Sale, held by the Rotary Anns.

Last year they were able to send six children to the camp from the proceeds of their sale-this year they hope to send eight. This year's sale will be held April 7 and 8, in the building back of the Community Center. On Friday, their doors will be open from 9:00 A.M. to 9:00 P.M. On Saturday, from 9:00 to 12:00. A truck will tour the residential area on Thursday, April 6, to pick up donations for their sale. Just set a box out on the porch and it will be picked up. If you hesitate to leave things outside, call Mrs. Harold Goyette, who will see that a driver is notified to stop at your address. It is surprising how some one can always find a use for a thing, no matter how useless it may be to someone else. No matter what you have, send it on over to the Rotary Ann rummage sale, then go on over on Friday or Saturday, and just see if there isn't some little thing there that you've been needing for a long time! All the giving and buying adds up to a little crippled child on the lakeshore, instead of one at home crying "Mommy, what is there to do?"

Easter Services At First Methodist

Easter Sunday at First Methodist Church, Clarkston, will be marked by five Sunday morning worship services on Easter Sunday, April 2nd when the Methodist Youth Fellowship will begin the Easter celebration with the Sunrise Service at 6:30 A. M.

Reverend William J. Richards, pastor of First Church, will preach on the subject, "Something to Live For", at the 8 a. m. and 9:15 Services. Reverend Mr. Jesse R. DeWitt, Director Church Extension of The Board of Missions of The Methodist Church will preach at the 10:30 and 11:15 A. M. Services. Over 1200 worshipped at the church last year, and facilities have been arranged to accommodate everyone this year. This will be the final Easter Service in the old church this year in as much as the congregation is moving into new facilities on Waldon Road this summer.

Under the direction of Mr. William Mansfield, Director of Music, Easter Anthems will be sung by the six choirs with Mrs. Norton Redwood and Mrs. Bert Mercer presenting the solo parts in the service. Boy Scout officials and the Clarkston police will direct traffic and parking to and from the church.

As has been customary there will be no Church School sessions on Easter Sunday so that children may worship with their parents. The nursery will be open for the convenience of parents with children.

Maundy Thursday will be observed at the church on Thursday, March 30th, in commemoration of the time of The Last Supper from 7:30 to 8:30 P. M.

Communicants may come at any time during the hour and receive Holy Communion. There will be organ meditations, choral singing, and short meditations presented by Reverend Richards. The sanctuary will be decorated by flowers amid the soft glow of candlelight.

On Good Friday the congregation will unite with the other congregations of the community by attending the Good Friday Service at the Clarkston High School at 1:00 P. M.

Township Voting Ratio Way Down

The date for the election, April 3, is drawing inevitably closer. The date which will affect the future of the many candidates seeking office in our community, and will, likewise, affect the future of our community.

It is very interesting to note that in spite of the importance of this election, and in spite of how very much said election can influence the trend for progress in our community living, a great number of us feel that it is too much trouble to vote, and will let someone else decide our future for us.

In 1958 there were between 3200 and 3300 registered voters but there weren't that many who voted — there weren't even half that number of ballots cast! Just over 1200 people voted in 1958—out of a possible 32 or 33 hundred!

What, then, are we saving our precious privilege of voting for? The national election is overwhelmingly important it's true, and more of us turn out for it than the above figures indicate we do for a biennial election but voting for the President of our United States et cetera is not the sum and substance of our civic duties and privileges. Our township officials carry a weight of importance comparable to that of our national officials and should be chosen with just as much care, evaluation, and number of votes!

There are about 4600 qualified voters for the election to be held on Monday. Let's not 2000 of us sit back and let someone else cast our ballot for us. What if that person voted for someone other than we would?

LAKELAND PLAYERS HOLD TRY OUTS FOR "BAD SEED."

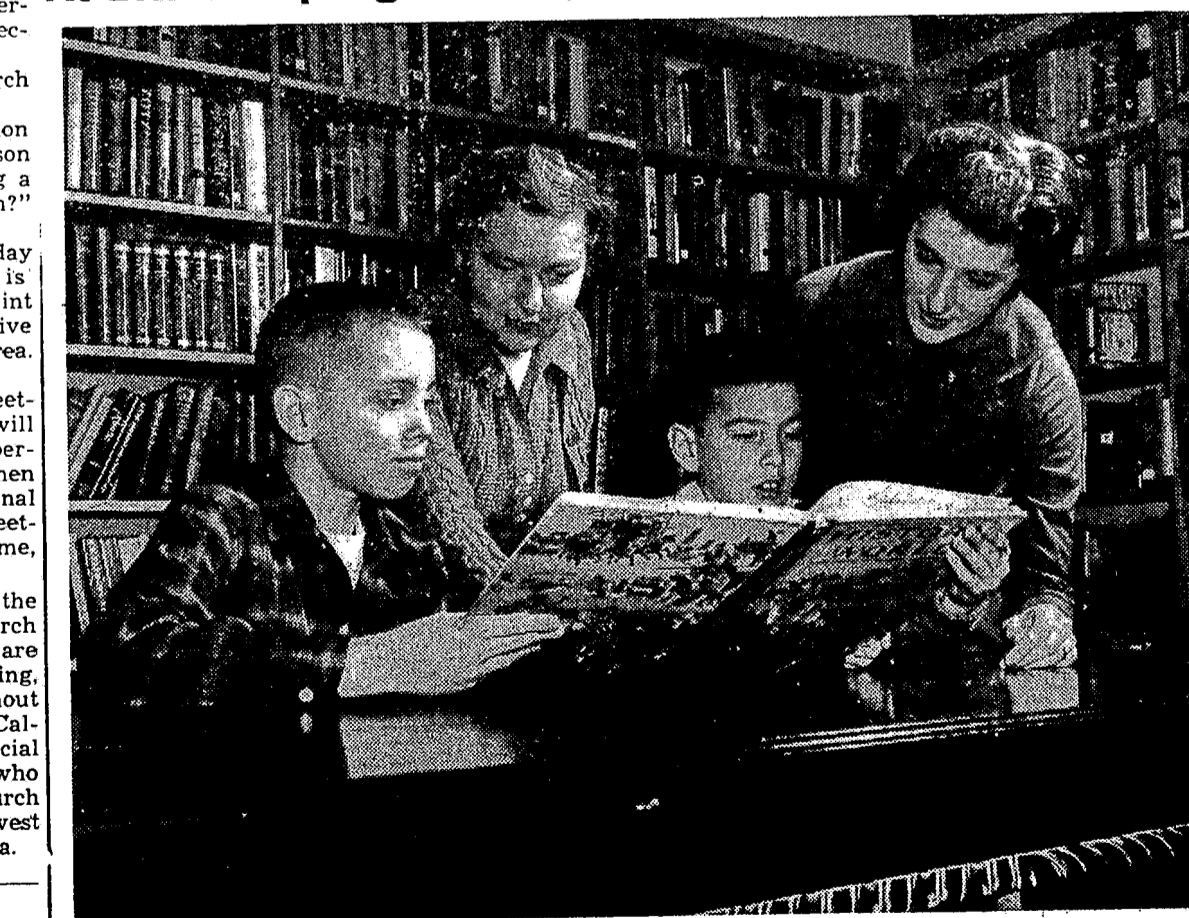

Township Library Fate To Be Decided By Voters At Biennial Spring Election, Monday, April 3



Will the current Independence Township Library on North Main achieve a permanent position in the community?

This question will be answered next Monday, April 3, at the Township Elections when eligible voters record their preference for a one-half mill library appropriation.

Passage of the proposal, according to library supporters, would

re-establish the present institution on a permanent public basis at a cost of an average of two dollars per household per year.

Advocates cite the following advantages to be derived from a public Independence Township Library: free library cards; a convenient library schedule making books available at least

40 hours per week; the addition of more books and films as well as new materials such as periodicals, magazines and records; assistance of a qualified full time librarian; and continued availability of some 10,000 books under the North Oakland Library Cooperative and free usage of its affiliated facilities including the new Pontiac City Library.

BAD CHECK PASSING PROSPEROUS BUSINESS

Bogus check passing in Michigan is a million dollar a month operation which so far this year gives little indication of falling away from the high levels of activity reached in 1959 and 1960, according to Det. Sgt. Fred E. Kelly of the fraudulent check section at East Lansing State Police headquarters.

In the first two and a half months this year 356 bogus

checks were submitted to the section for examination three less than in the same period in 1960. Only about one per cent of the bad checks passed in Michigan are submitted to the State Police, the remainder are handled locally.

Last year 1,657 checks, averaging \$77.26 and having a total value of \$129,010.74, were processed by the State Police. The peak year in volume since the section was established in 1948

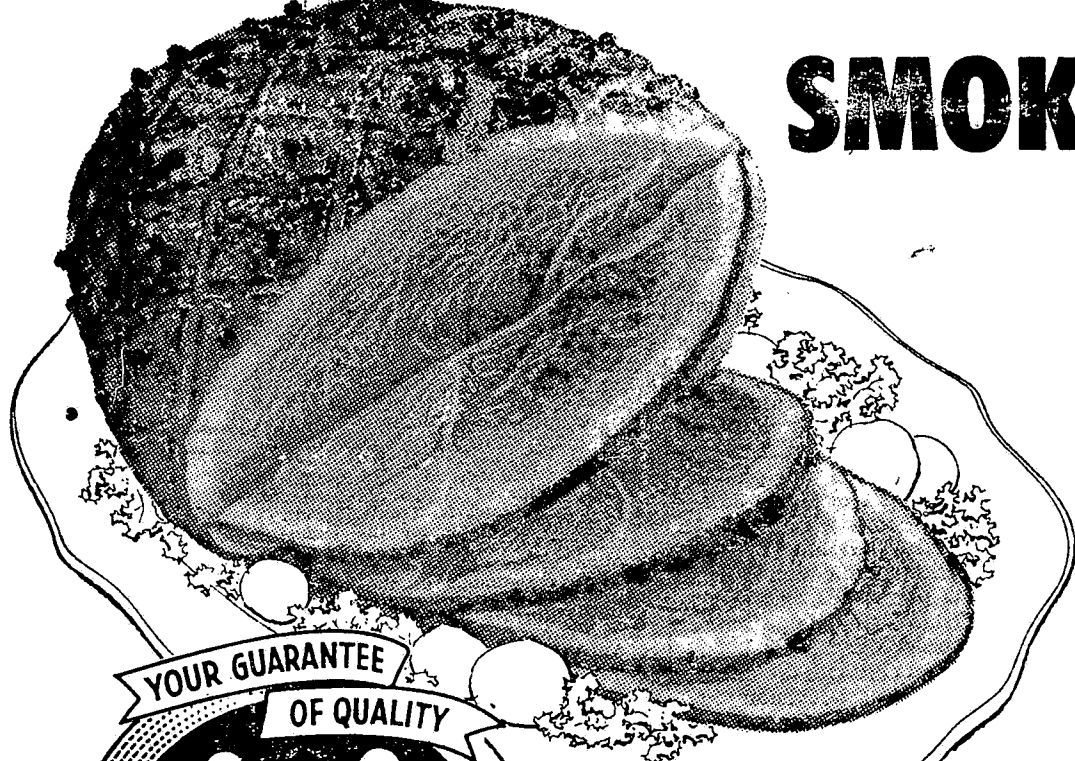
was in 1959 with 1,898 averaging \$74.38 and totalling \$126,263.33. Known passers of previous forgery or fraud specimens are identified in about 60 per cent of the cases studied by the State Police.

High months for check fraud are usually January, July and August while April is generally the lowest. An analysis of the record indicates that, when the economy flourishes, so does bad check activity. According to Kelly's advice is this:

Treat every check with the same caution you would use in making an unsecured loan to a stranger.

To prevent opportunity for theft which can lead to forgery and fraud, check supplies and bank statements should be securely locked up when not in use.

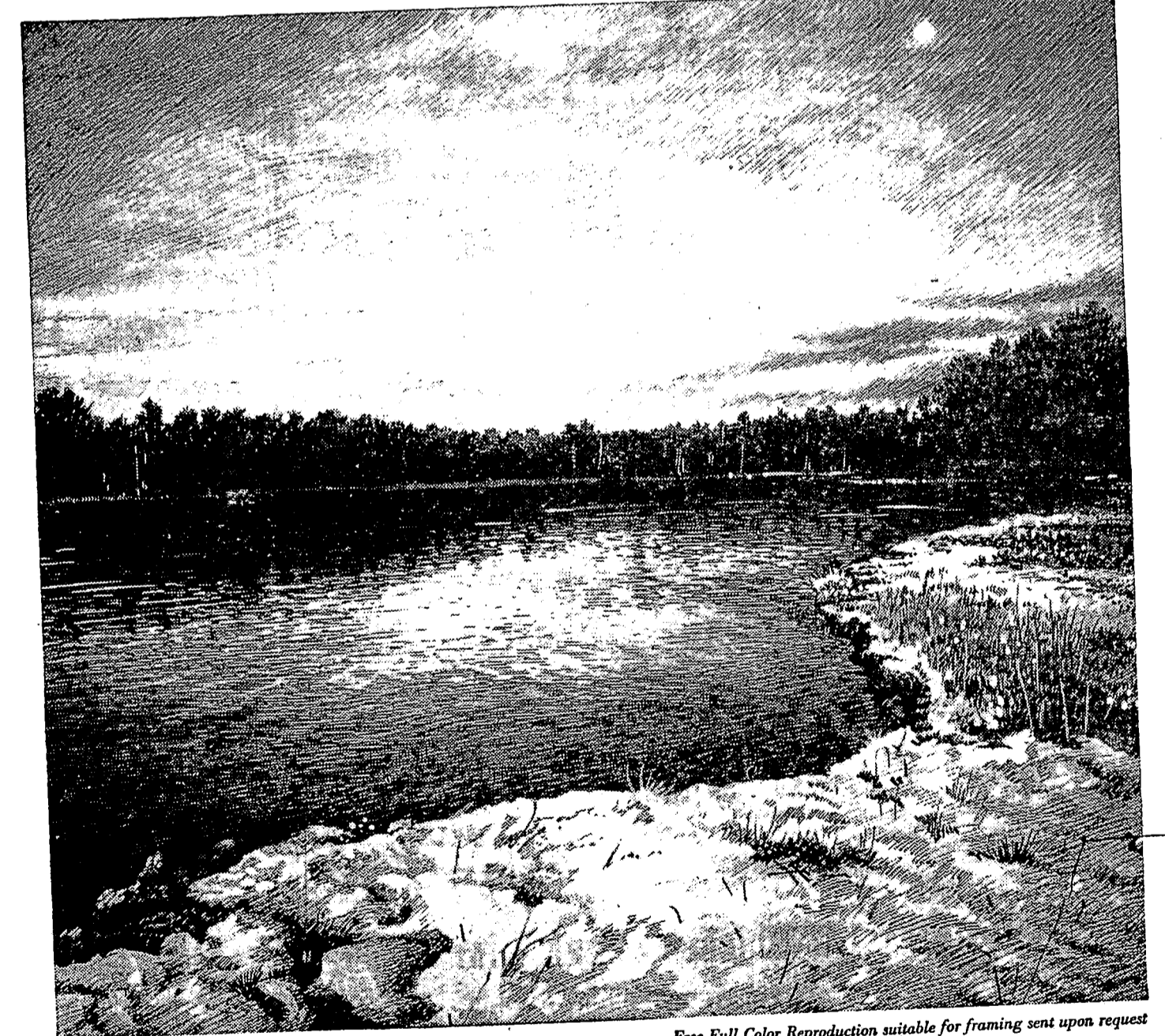
