Village Friends Of Art

At 8:00 P.M., Friday, April 21st, The Village Friends of Art will be privileged to have Miss Svea Kline as the guest speaker at the meeting to be held at First Methodist Church in Clarkston. The public is most cordially invited to meet Miss Kline and see her priceless film on "The Life and Work of Carl Milles at Cranbrook."

The late Carl Milles is regarded as the greatest decorative sculptor of Sweden. His works include monuments, polychrome statues, portrait busts in bronze and wood, and animal pieces, such as "Playing Bears" group for the Berzelius Park, Stockholm. He received many commissions for fountain sculpture, including the Europa fountain at Halmstad, the Poseidon fountain in front of Göteborg Museum, and sculptures at Rockefeller Center, New York City; St. Louis Railway Terminal, St. Louis, Missouri; the complete court yard and gardens at Chicago Art Institute and much of his work may be seen at Cranbrook Bloomfield Hills.

Miss Kline was privately educated in Sweden and came to United States at the age of twenty. After spending two years studying at the Chicago Art Institute, she returned to Sweden for further art training in Stockholm.

Miss Kline returned to the United States on a scholarship at Cranbrook and was singled out by Carl Milles to be his assistant and to live with his family at Cranbrook. She studied ceramics while assisting this great sculptor in his studio.

In 1949 Miss Kline left Cranbrook to teach at the Institute of Art in Flint, Michigan.

When Carl Milles left Cranbrook in 1950, Miss Kline joined him and his family in Sweden and Italy where she studied and worked with Mr. Milles until his death in 1955.

Among Miss Kline's many, many accomplishments in the field of art is her work in "gemmaux" or fused glass. She began experimenting with the medium about five years ago. At that time there were no guiding rules or instructions and each step toward the beautiful finished products had to be learned mainly through trial and error. Her patience and ingenuity has resulted in breath-taking pictures painted in glass.

Her largest commission to date in the field of "gemmaux" is her recently completed panel for the Hudson Northland store. This glass mural contains 15 sections and covers a 50 foot wall space. This panel took Miss Kline and two collaborators three months of steady work to complete.

Miss Kline is currently teaching at Bloomfield Art Association and at the Flint Institute of Art.

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Final Figures In For March of Dimes

A total of \$100,179.62 was raised in the 1961 March of Dimes drive, George Kuhn, Oakland County March of Dimes campaign chairman, announced today. Kuhn expressed the appreciation of the March of Dimes committee to all of those fine people who assisted on the drive. Kuhn said truly a tremendous amount of hard work had gone into this year's effort was \$16,325.00 less than last year's March of Dimes drive but he felt that the economic situation of our county had an effect on the total amount of money raised.

The Mothers March, which is the largest single event during the campaign, brought over \$62,000.00 into the drive and the March of Dimes mailers another \$16,428.00; the two newer events, Teens Against Polio, which raised \$1,762.00 and the Oakland County Table Toppers Special Events contribution of \$3,264.95, high-lighted the drive.

The Reverend G. Burton Hodgson, Chairman of the Oakland County Chapter of the National Foundation, expressed the thanks of the executive committee to the many volunteers who worked on the drive and to the people of Oakland County for their generosity. Reverend Hodgson stated we must be realistic in realizing that the \$100,000.00 raised during the 1961 March of Dimes drive was approximately \$50,000.00 short of our goal. As a result, our plans and hopes to inaugurate the new program of the National Foundation in birth defects and arthritis, will be on a very limited basis, for the caring for and assisting of the paralytic polio patients of Oakland County has, and always will be, our first and foremost responsibility. Reverend Hodgson went on to state that the needs of the 208 patients currently being assisted in Oakland County are often overlooked by the general public, because of the fewer new cases being reported in our area, yet, once a person has paralytic polio it becomes a life-long struggle which usually requires assistance over the years to follow.

LOCAL STATION GIVES GIRLS OPPORTUNITY FOR TELEVISION CAREERS

The search for "Sally Seven" is on at WXYZ-TV, making a new approach to public service and a stepped-up program of assistance to health and community service agencies.

There will be a different "Sally Seven" each month and the opportunity to become "Sally" is open to all women in the Greater Detroit area between the ages of 18 and 30, inclusive.

To qualify, the girl need only send a recent photograph with her name, age, address and telephone number to "Sally Seven Box 7, Detroit 26, Michigan." Photos will not be returned.

Each month public service agencies having fund-raising campaigns or educational programs at that time, will send representatives to the station where they will meet with finalists selected by preliminary judging. The agency people will select "Sally" for the month and she will then spend a few hours in the studios taping various announcements. She will be paid at the regular performer's rate for her time.

The tapes will run throughout the following month and will boost the activities of the agencies in new and dramatic fashion, with "Sally" as the face and voice of WXYZ-TV's public service.

John F. Pival, president of WXYZ, Inc. said the program has been initiated for two reasons.

Said Pival: "First, the station is always looking for ways in which to increase the effectiveness of its public service. Any new or interesting means of drawing attention to the many fine agencies serving our community helps a great deal. We think, in 'Sally Seven,' we have a most attractive public service instrument."

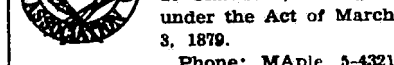
