


The Bell Telephone System has offered to build and pay for experimental satellites. It is willing to pay for their launching and for the ground stations in the U. S. (Foreign ground stations would be owned by foreign communications agencies.) There would be no cost to the taxpayer.

Bell seeks no monopoly and does not wish to exclude other international carriers either from establishing satellite communications systems or from sharing use of the system it proposes. 

CINERAMA FILMING "STORY LINE" PRODUCTIONS

Cinerama camera crews have started filming "How the West Was Won", first of the new dimensional "story line" productions at Paducah, Kentucky. It will be produced by MGM and Cinerama in the exclusive, three camera process.

A formidable cast, which approaches the hazy days of the past in Hollywood, has been lined up to star in the six segments of the 2 1/2 hour production which will follow one family over three generations from 1840 to 1890. The epic will trace the historical and geographical development of the West. Present casting includes Carroll Baker, Gregory Peck, George Peppard, Debbie Reynolds, James Stewart, John Wayne, Spencer Tracy, Russ Tamblyn, Walter Brennan and Agnes Moorehead.

The production will be directed by an impressive array of noted directors headed by Henry Hathaway, who will direct four of the six separate segments. Academy Award winner John Ford will helm the Civil War portion, and George Marshall will direct that portion which deals with the building of the Union Pacific Railroad. The screen play was written by Bernard Smith and James Webb.

The first portion of the production deals with the settling of the Ohio River Valley, early days gateway to the West. James Stewart and Debbie Reynolds, as a mountain man and his wife, are featured in the first segment along with Carroll Baker.

The second section, portraying the movement of wagon trains across the plains states and concluding with the California Gold Rush of 1849, will feature Gregory Peck as a gambler.

Part three will be devoted to the Civil War and will be filmed at the National Battlefield at Shiloh in Southern Tennessee. Spencer Tracy will portray General U.S. Grant, Union General William Tecumseh Sherman will be played by John Wayne. Detroit George Peppard and Russ Tamblyn as sons of Stewart and Reynolds, will also appear in this segment.

The fourth part will feature the coming of the railroad to

the West, Buffalo Bill and other plainsmen who supplied the railroad builders with buffalo meat, and will be filmed in South Dakota in mid-August. Following this section will be a segment depicting the cattle drives of the early southwest and the outlaw era, and will be filmed entirely in Texas.

Every big motion picture produced these days announces a multimillion dollar cost and in many of these instances they are much exaggerated. But MGM and Cinerama sources conservatively estimate at this point "How the West Was Won" will cost between \$7 and \$8 million dollars.

MGM will also begin shooting in July on another Cinerama production, "The Wonderful World of the Brothers Grimm," to be produced by George Pal. It will be filmed in the home area of the Grimms (Bavaria) with Laurence Harvey and Carl Boehm co-starred as the famous story tellers.

In addition to recounting the story of the brothers, the production will also highlight three of their stories: "The Fisherman and His Wife", "The Dancing Princess", and "The Singing Bone".

Pal has signed Yvette Mimieux

and Russ Tamblyn to topline "The Dancing Princess".

There is belief in some studio quarters that the production of the "Brothers Grimm" will be ready for release first and may precede "How The West Was Won" in release next Spring.

Thus the long awaited step by Cinerama into production with a story line is about to become fact. When they are released, they will make Hollywood history.

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

DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION (DAR) NEWS




