"If you are a disabled worker under age 65" Mr. LaRock urges, "consult your social security office right away to see if you are eligible for monthly benefits."

Persons who are so severely disabled that they cannot work and who have no immediate hopes of recovery, and who have worked under social security for at least 5 out of the 10 years just before becoming disabled should apply immediately.

Disability benefits for disabled families were first payable for the Pennsylvania. month of November 1960.
