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Advanced Circus Ticket Sales Benefit Local Fire Dept.

Lewis E. Wint, Chairman, announced today that tickets are now on sale for the Famous Cole Circus which will highlight the 4th of July activities in Independence Township. The circus is being sponsored by the Township Fire Fighters Association. Tickets may be purchased from any Township Fireman or from ticket headquarters at Tink Ronk's Barber Shop. Tickets are good for either the afternoon performance at 2:00 P.M. or the evening show at 7:30 P.M. Mr. Wint announced that 40% of the proceeds of all advance sales will go to the Fire Fighters Association. This money will go to help defray the cost of the Fireworks next year. This year the Firework Display is being sponsored by the merchants of the Township. Firemen have expressed hopes that everyone will join in and purchase their tickets early so that money can be raised from the advance sales to help with next year's program.

Emrich, Bishop of Michigan will confer the Apostolic Rite of the Laying on of Hands upon the first class of confirmands presented by the Church of the Resurrection.

The Apostolic Rite of Confirmation has been ministered in the Church from the days of the Apostles, as is abundantly testified in the Acts of the Apostles and the Epistle of St. Paul. Confirmation is not joining the church; it is the bestowal of a spiritual gift on those who by their baptism have already been made members of Christ's Body, which is His Church. In Confirmation, man must by the renewal of his baptismal vows, make a solemn declaration of Repentance, Faith and Obedience and a promise of loyalty to Jesus Christ as Lord and Master. Then, through the Laying on of Hands, with prayers, God confers the gift of the Holy Spirit to strengthen us with divine power and to enable us to wage a successful warfare against sin and evil.

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Reverend Richards Begins Sixth Year At First Methodist

Bishop Marshall R. Reed, Resident Bishop of The Michigan Area of The Methodist Church, announced at the closing session of The Detroit Annual Conference at Adrian College last Saturday, the appointment of The Reverend Mr. William J. Richards as pastor of The First Methodist Church of Clarkston. Reverend Richards will begin his sixth year as pastor of the Clarkston church next Sunday when he will preach on the subject, "The Silence of God." He will be speaking at both the 9:00 A.M. and 11:15 A.M. Services.

Many significant achievements have been attained at First Methodist Church during the last year, one of which is that the congregation now serves over one-quarter of the people living in Independence Township. Participating in the Worship Services, Church School, Boy Scouts, Young Adults, Youth Fellowships, Methodist Men, and The Woman's Society are nearly 3,000 people.

Six hundred forty-seven children and adults are now enrolled in the Church School with over 100 in the youth program of the church. On Sunday morning at 10:00 A.M. and 11:15 A.M. four buildings are used to house nearly 30 classes under the leadership of Mrs. William Richards, Mrs. Edgar Collick, Chmn. and Messrs William Kratt nad Royce Hyatt, Superintendents. Nearly all of the 85 officers and teachers have been accredited in Methodist Leadership Training Schools.

Under the leadership of the laymen, and with the help of Reverend Richards, a new Georgian Colonial Church costing \$330,000.00 is being completed on Waldon Road near the Clarkston School property. The new church is planned to be one of the outstanding beauty spots in northern Oakland County, and not only has received much commendation from authorities all over the state. National church leaders consider it a model of colonial architecture. The new church will be consecrated on Sunday, September 17th by Bishop Reed. It will seat 500 communicants.

The church will be on a summer schedule beginning this week with the office just open in the mornings.

The Waterford Township Recreation Department has finalized its 1961 summer programming, announced recreation director, Robert J. Lawyer today. "It is expected that some 5,000 persons will participate in our summer activities," said Mr. Lawyer.

The Programs are as follows: PLAYGROUNDS: Registration beginning week of June 26.

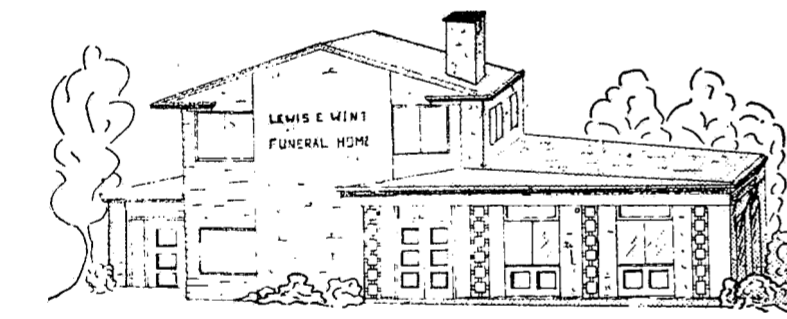
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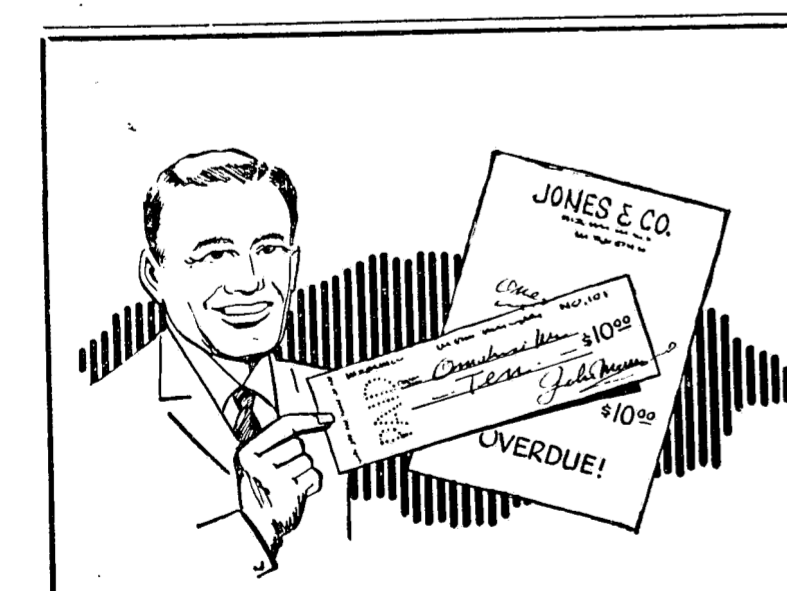

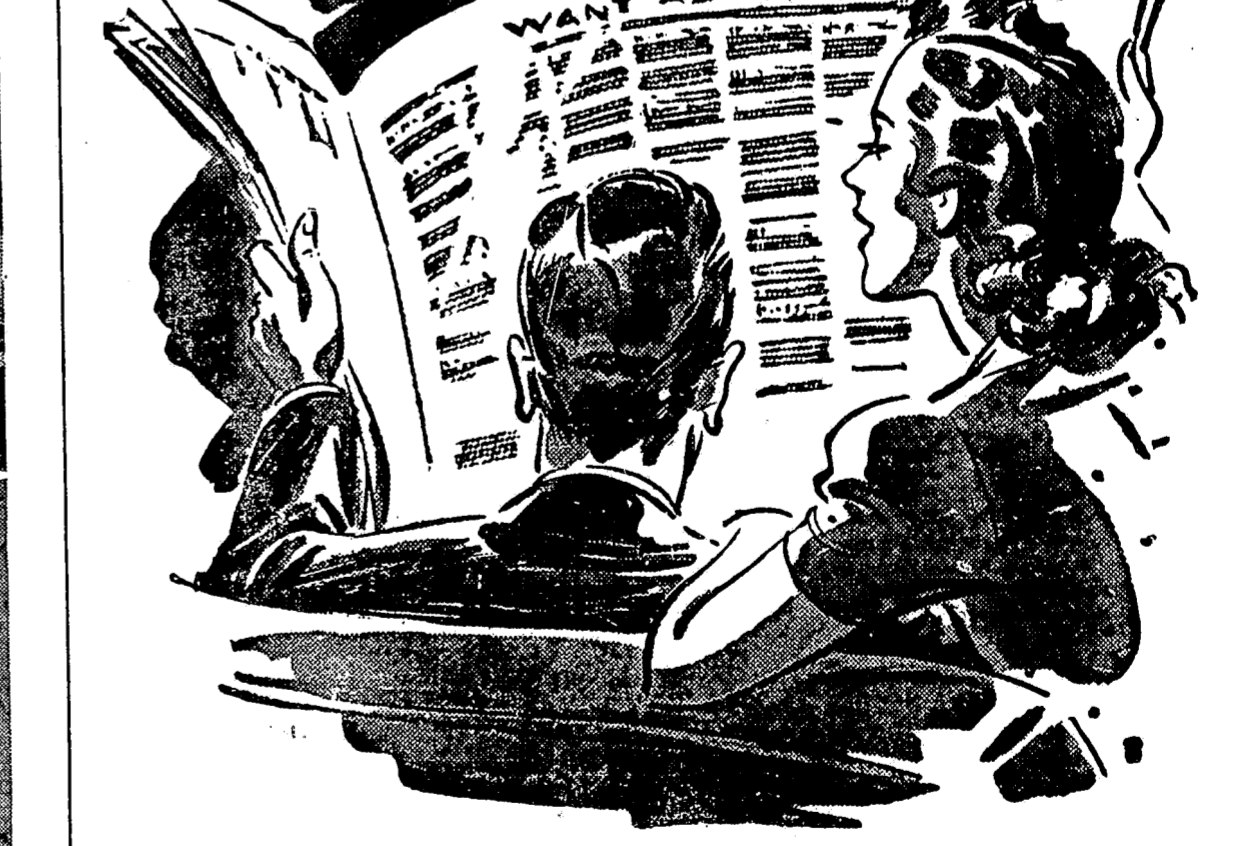

Treat Your Lakes to Better Fishing



Now is the time for all good communities to come to the aid of their lakes. If fishermen in their areas are complaining about catching too many little panfish and too few "keepers." Complaints could well be turned into kudos by chemically treating overcrowded lakes, a method used by the Conservation Department to remove stunted bluegills and other panfish so lakes can support more keeper-size catches. There are some 500-1000 lakes in Michigan which could use this type of cure. Department fisheries men stand ready, willing, and able to help in the job at hand, but they lack funds to do very much of the actual work alone. Communities can pick up the slack by footing the bill for chemicals and helping in removal of undesirable fish. There are a number of other ways in which communities can help themselves by improving their fishing. They can learn what needs to be done and start the ball rolling by seeing their Department district fisheries supervisors or writing to their regional or district conservation headquarters, Mich. STATE POLICE EMPHASIZE WATER SAFETY

Seventy-five water accidents have already caused 51 deaths and injured 29 persons in Michigan this year, the State Police report, and the toll has emphasized the need for increased safety precautions as the water sports season heads toward its point of high activity.

Of the accidents, 43 were fatalities, 16 personal injury and 16 property damage only. The information is based on reports received from all police agencies through June 14.

The drownings include 21 who fell into water from bridges, banks, docks or piers, eight boat passengers, seven who fell through ice, five boat operators, eight swimmers or waders, one skin or scuba diver, and one who lost his life while trying to rescue another.

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POTATO PROMOTION LAW IN EFFECT

A law designed to increase sales of Michigan potatoes through improvement of quality levels and various forms of promotion has become effective, and it is expected a Potato Industry Council will be named in the near future to implement the statute.

It results from a five-year effort by the state's potato industry to increase the acceptance of the Michigan product and to stimulate sales.
