as experiences and practical application of teaching techniques." Mr. Strong said that at least 70,000 persons were in attendance Sunday afternoon at Yankee Stadium when N.H. Knorr, Watchtower president, spoke on the subject: "When All Nations Unite Under God's Kingdom."

A NEW STUDY SKILLS COURSE FOR COLLEGE-BOUND YOUTH

"The large numbers of students displaying difficulties in college study and the distressing rate of college failures indicates that a great many students enter college without adequate grounding in effective study practices," said Dr. Lowell Eklund, Michigan State University Oakland, Associate Dean for Continuing Education.

"This works a hardship on both students and universities; but, even more important," Eklund said, "it represents an almost tragic waste in the vital development of brain power for our nation.

"Since universities and colleges have a responsibility to take the lead in attacking this problem, MSUO, Continuing Education office has launched its first annual Study Skills Program for college-bound high school graduates of the Oakland Macomb community."

The program will be held on the MSUO campus from August 14 to September 1. Students will spend each weekday morning during this period concentrating on improving reading and comprehension rate, developing more efficient study practices, and building larger and more adequate vocabularies. Private conferences between students and staff specialists will explore individual problems. Enrollment will be limited to 36 students.

The entire program was planned by William E. Rhode, assistant director of Continuing Education; Dr. Robert Hopkins, head of MSUO's Counseling Department, and Harold Abrams, consultant for Special Education for the Oakland County Board of Education. They were advised, during planning, by study skills specialists and high school counselors in the area. The staff of specialists for the program will be headed by Abrams.

CALIFORNIA MINISTER TO SPEAK AT STATE FAIR SUNRISE SERVICE

Dr. Raymond Lindquist, minister of the First Presbyterian Church of Hollywood, California, will be the main speaker for the Michigan State Fair eleventh annual Sunrise Service to be held Sunday, September 3, at the State Fairgrounds in Detroit.

Dr. Lindquist, president of the Board of National Missions of the United Presbyterian Church in the United States, is minister of one of the largest congregations in the country.

The State Fair Service, held outdoors in the Music Shell on the first Sunday of the 10 day event, annually attracts from 8,000 to 10,000 worshippers.

The Service is co-sponsored by the Detroit Council of Churches and is one of the greatest religious mass meetings in the country.

ICE CREAM MORE SLENDERIZING NOW

People on slenderizing diets who also have a taste for ice cream are going to appreciate the reduced butterfat in ice cream permitted under amendments to Michigan's ice cream law by the 1961 legislature.

The legal butterfat content of Michigan ice cream has been reduced from 12 percent to 10 percent. This is to bring state requirements into line with federal standards. The law also was changed to permit use of yellow color in vanilla ice cream, which has been prohibited for the past 30 years in the state.

Another change is a tightening of sanitary standards which reduced by half what was formerly permitted. The lower butterfat content will not be apparent to the consumer since the weight of ice cream will remain at 4.5 pounds per gallon because the total weight of food solids will remain the same.

A product under a new name will be ice milk, which also will be popular with the calorie conscious. Ingredients are the same as for ice cream except butterfat content will be only 2 to 7 percent, usually 4 percent. The product according to Agricultural Director G. S. McIntyre, is now widely sold in the state as sherbet in frozen form and also as "soft frozen" products at drive-in stands.

Under the amended law fudgesicles, popsicles and similar products on a stick will be called frozen confections.

The statute will permit free movement of ice cream across state lines, but will require inspection and approval by the Michigan Department of Agriculture's dairy division, headed by F.M. Skiver.

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

Now hear this, boaters: All hands on deck for a few simple, basic Rules of the Road in addition to those shown above. When overtaking another boat you must keep clear of the craft you're passing. Boats coming out of slips into open water, or leaving berths at piers and wharves, have no rights until they are entirely clear. 


