## FLINT COMMUNITY J. C. HAS NURSING COURSE

The Flint Community Junior College Nursing Department takes a more academic approach to nurses' training than the usual School of Nursing, according to Dolores Keyser, head of the department. Students spend a little more than half of their time in the classroom, taking both general and science courses, and the rest in hospitals for practical experience. The Nursing Department is supervised like other departments and enjoys the same academic freedom. Students go to McLaren Genesee Memorial Hospital and to Pontiac State Hospital for practice in nursing, including Pediatric, Maternity, and Psychiatric Nursing.

The Nursing Department has increased from a Charter Class of 13 in 1958 to an enrollment of 96 in the 1960-61 year.

The newly-formed "Clarkston Student Aid Fund" will be available to qualified graduates of C. H. S. who plan to enter college or other educational programs such as beauty schools, barbering colleges and business training courses.

This fund includes receipts from the Clarkston Community Schools Talent Show, gifts from high school classes and donations from several adults in our community.

## PARK PERMITS MAY ADD TO IMPROVEMENTS

Michigan's state park system stands closer to gaining needed lands and improvements under the new permit-bonding program as a result of last week's action by the Conservation Commission.

After approving a resolution amended by the legislature which outlines \$5,000,000 in lands purchases and parks construction work for the current fiscal year, the Commission voted to issue the first series of bonds to finance a \$2,000,000 segment of the program. Additional bonds will be issued serially as funds are needed to carry out plans.

The Commission promptly directed where part of the first bond sale revenues will go when it stamped approval on lands purchase options which will form the core of three new state parks.

Lands to be acquired as new parks when these revenues become available include 136 acres on Lake Michigan in Ottawa and Muskegon counties to be named P. J. Hoffmaster state park for the Department's late parks chief and director; 175 acres on Little Traverse Bay, Emmet county, to be known as Petoskey state park; and 123 acres at St. Vital Point on Lake Huron, Chippewa county, named as DeTour state park.

Also approved for purchase were 101 acres at Cheboygan state park, 71 acres at Indian Lake state park, and 42 acres at Pontiac Lake recreation area.

**WRAP FROZEN FOODS TO THAW QUICKLY**

Consider thawing time when you put foods in the freezer. Anita Dean, foods and nutrition specialist at Michigan State University, says large blocks of frozen foods require extra thawing or cooking time and this eliminates them from quick meal menus.

To freeze ground meat, steaks or chops, Mrs. Dean suggests removing store wrappings and cartons. These are not moisture-vapor-proof. Shape hamburgers into patties or individual meat loaves, and separate the chops and steaks. Wrap the meat in individual packages or separate the pieces with two thicknesses of moisture-vapor-proof paper and wrap in family-size portions. Individual portions of meat can also be placed on a cooky sheet and frozen, then wrapped for storage.

Casseroles thaw more quickly when frozen in shallow layers. To save on containers, freeze the casserole unwrapped. Unmold the food like a gelatin mold, then store. When needed, remove the wrap, return the casserole to the original container, and bake.




