CHARCOAL TIPS

When you choose to cook outdoors, which charcoal do you use? asks the Marketing Information Agent, Mrs. Josephine Lawyer.

Charcoal is available mainly in two different forms. Lump charcoal comes in odd-sized pieces. Charcoal Briquettes are made from lump charcoal that has been ground, mixed with a binder and pressed into uniform-sized blocks. Did you know that the best charcoal is made from slow growing hardwoods from Northern Michigan?

Charcoal Briquettes cost more than regular charcoal, but they have advantages. They take a shorter time to reach the grey-cooking stage. They produce an even heat and do not burn out as quickly.

How do you build the fire in your grill? Experts recommend use of some gravel or sand in the bottom of the grill. This provides insulation, protects the metal of the grill, and absorbs fat drippings.

Two pounds of briquettes should be enough for one use, and will last about two hours. First, heap the briquettes in a pile. Soak them with charcoal.

Attending a meeting held Wednesday morning in the home of Mrs. Lawrence Stuart, Women's Division Chairman of this year's United Fund Campaign Drive for Independence Township, were Mr. Fred Yeager, General Campaign Chairman; Mr. Merle Bennett, Advance Gifts Chairman; Mr. Floyd Vincent, Educational Chairman; Mrs. Charles G. In getting off to an early start, Mrs. Stuart hopes to complete the appointments of her Area Chairmen within the next few weeks and Mr. Yeager his General Campaign plans.

DETROIT SOAP BOX DERBY SATURDAY, JULY 29

More than 400 boy-built racing cars are expected to rip down Derby Hill at this year's Soap Box Derby, Saturday, July 29.

The boys, from 11 to 15 years of age, will be aiming for scores of trophies and awards including a trip to Akron to compete for \$15,000 in scholarships in the All American Soap Box Derby.

The Detroit Derby, held in Gus Dorais Park at E. Outer Drive and Mound Road, will open at 9 a.m. with marching bands, majorettes and the U.S. Marine Color Guard, to celebrate this 24th annual Derby. Sponsored by The Detroit News, Greater Detroit Chevrolet Dealers and the Detroit Department of Parks and Recreation, the Soap Box Derby is considered Michigan's greatest amateur racing event.

Featured at 1 p.m., intermission time, will be the celebrated "Oil Can Derby." Doc Greene, author of The Detroit News sports column, "Press Box," will race against Detroit Lions backfield star Nick Pietrosante and WWJ-TV weathercaster Sonny Elliot.
