Rotary To Welcome District Governor

The Rotary Club of Clarkston, on August 7, 1961 will be host to Edward S. Tripp, Governor of the 638th District of Rotary International, who is making his annual official visit to each of the 48 Rotary clubs in southeastern Michigan and southwestern Ontario. He will address the local club and confer with President Fred Warrick and Secretary Charles Robinson, and committee chairmen on Rotary administration and service activities.

Mr. Tripp, an attorney, is a partner in the firm of Lawrence, Ulrich Tripp and Barense in Ypsilanti, Michigan and is a member and past president of the Rotary Club of Ypsilanti. He is a graduate of the University of Michigan and served in the Federal Bureau of Investigation from 1941 to 1946. Having served on several committees of the American Bar Association and the State Bar of Michigan, Mr. Tripp is now a member of a State Bar committee to co-ordinate its activities with the forthcoming Michigan Constitutional Convention. His civic activities include the Ypsilanti Community Chest, The Portage Trails Council, Boy Scouts of America, Ypsilanti Housing Commission, Ypsilanti Board of Commerce and Citizens Advisory Committee on Urban Renewal. He is a member and former warden of St. Luke's Episcopal Church, Ypsilanti. Married to the former Mary Hanchey of Little Rock, Arkansas, they have 4 children. He was elected as a district governor of Rotary International for 1961-62 at Rotary's 52nd annual convention in Tokyo, Japan, last May. He is one of 269 district governors supervising the activities of more than 11,000 Rotary clubs which have a membership of 509,000 business and professional executives in 123 countries throughout the world.

Wherever Rotary clubs are located, President Warrick asserted in discussing the governor's visit, their activities are similar to those of the Rotary Club of Clarkston because they are based on the same general objectives: developing better understanding and fellowship among business and professional men, promoting community-betterment undertakings, raising the standards of business and professions, and fostering the advancement of understanding, good will and peace among all the peoples of the world.

Each year, this world-wide service organization continues to grow in number and in strength, President Warrick added. During the past fiscal year, more than 300 new Rotary clubs were organized in 43 countries and four geographical regions were added to Rotary's membership roster: Gabon, Nigeria, Reunion and Somalia.

BACK TO SCHOOL

More than 200 Michigan teachers and school administrators are going back to school this summer to learn about conservation education and how it can fit in with the three R's and other subjects in their own classrooms.

Their campus will be the Higgins Lake conservation school where the first of four week-long sessions begins July 16. A record 244 teachers and their administrators are enrolled to attend the 15th annual scholarship school.

Scholarship teachers again represent all grade levels and areas of study, pointing up the broad field of interest that conservation is drawing throughout many school systems. More enrollments among administrators also indicates there is increased interest in bringing conservation education into schools where it is now lacking.

As in past years, these "pupils" of conservation will be guided on field trips, listen to lectures, and take part in group discussions conducted by Conservation Department personnel and resource and curriculum specialists from colleges and universities.

In one change from other years, each of the week-long schools will devote a half day to boating and water safety, archery and firearm safety, forest fire safety, and other skills which are becoming increasingly important with more and more youngsters using the out-of-doors.

The new course is designed to help teachers train their students on how to enjoy the out-of-doors in a wide variety of ways within the bounds of wise use. A salient feature of the course is that these out-door skills will give students years of fun and recreation long after their participation in organized sports has ended.

The Federated Garden Clubs of Michigan, the Woman's National Farm and Garden Association, Michigan United Conservation Clubs, and Daughters of the American Revolution are again major sponsors of the scholarship school. Encouraging to Department officials is the fact that more miscellaneous groups joined the ranks of sponsoring organizations.
