instruct in the various subjects. This course is open to both men and women, and to young people of senior high school age. It will meet one night a week for 13 weeks, probably, but not definitely, on Wednesday. There will

be no charge. Forty two people enrolled for this course of study last year; none of them dropped out. But many times 42 people trained in Civil Defense techniques would be needed in this populous township in case of an emergency.




