METHODIST CHURCH TO MOVE SUNDAY

Consecration Week Schedule of Events

The celebration of Consecration Week at First Methodist Church Clarkston will begin on Tuesday evening, September 19th at 6:30 p.m. when Youth Night will be celebrated with dinner to be served in the north wing of the new church. Dinner is \$1.00 and is open to all youth who wish to attend. Dr. John Dawson, president of Adrian College, will be the speaker. Dr. Dawson at one time was a star fullback and returned to become president of his Alma Mater after having served as pastor of the largest Methodist Church in Pittsburg, Pennsylvania. Under his leadership, Adrian College has become one of the fastest growing and dynamic private colleges in the Midwest with a modern building program, running into millions of dollars, which has extended and completely changed the campus. He is nationally known for his work among youth. Richard Sheldon, Roger Richley, co-presidents, and John Koskela,

Vice President of First Church's Methodist Youth Fellowship will preside over the program.

Men's Night of Consecration Week will be celebrated on Wednesday night when Bill Glass, star linebacker of The Detroit Lions Football Team, will speak for The Methodist Mens Club of the church. Bill Glass is a seminary student at Southwestern University in Dallas, Texas, in the off season. He is better known as the former All American at Baylor University. He will be hosted by Mr. Gus Birtsas and Mr. Ed Guntor of the church's athletic board. Master of Ceremonies is Mr. Clark Souby, president of the club. Leading in devotions is the Lay Leader, Mr. Everett Butters. The Methodist Men of First Church will also be presented with their charter by District Lay Leader, Donald Tews of Pontiac, and will become one of 15,000 Methodist Mens Clubs counting nearly 750,000 members. Dinner is \$2.00, and is open to all men of the church.

New Building to be Consecrated Sunday, September 17th

Climaxing four years of intensive planning The First Methodist Church of Clarkston, Michigan will climax its building program with the consecration of its new \$350,000.00 Georgian Colonial Church with duplicate Consecration Services to be held this Sunday, September 17th, at 3:00 p.m. and 4:30 p.m. at its location on Waldon Road just off of Highway M-15.

Bishop Marshall R. Reed, Resident Bishop of the Michigan Area will officiate in the Service, preaching on the subject, "From the Old House to the New." A dramatic moment in the service will be reached when Mr. Howard Huttenlocher, Building Committee Chairman, and Mr. Everett Butters, Lay Leader, present Bishop Reed with the key to the church, symbolical of the opening of the building as a House of Christian Worship. Bishop Reed will be assisted in the service by The Reverend Mr. Leslie Williams, Superintendent of the Flint District, Dr. Benjamin F. Holme, Executive Secretary of The Methodist Union of Greater Detroit, and The Reverend Mr. William J. Richards, pastor of the church. The massed choirs of the church numbering some 150 voices will sing under the direction of Mr. William Mansfield, Director of Music at the church. The service will be broadcasted over Radio Stations WPON, 1460 Kilocycles, Pontiac, in a delayed broadcast at 12 Noon on Sunday September 24th, and will be broadcasted live at 9:00 p.m. on the 17th from Radio Station WMRP, Flint, 1570 kilocycles. Nearly 100 laymen have worked in the planning of the service.

The day's festivities will begin at 9:00 a.m. when The Reverend Mr. Williams will preach at the closing service in the old church near downtown Clarkston. The children of the Church School will meet at this hour in lieu of their regular time and join the congregational procession when, with reverent ceremony, Rev. Williams, joined by Rev. Richards and Mr. Butters, will remove the cross and candles from the Altar of the old church and head the procession to the new church to place on the new Altar these sacred symbols of The Christian Faith. Prior to the procession, Mrs. Elizabeth Lambert, of one of the historical families of Clarkston will relate the

occasion of the Dedication Service of the old church in 1873 from letters found in the attic of her home.

The new church, of authentic colonial design, is dramatized by a stately spire rising 114 feet from the ground, topped by a ten foot slender cross. The interior of the church, molded in the atmosphere of old Williamsburg, with the ample white woodwork and colonial blue balls, will seat 600 worshippers. Clergy and friends from around the Flint and Pontiac area will be attending the services which will begin a week of celebration.

The church is located on a seven acre site providing ample parking for over 100 cars. Augmenting the beauty is the Clinton River which flows along the western edge of the property. Dominating the hillside is the church itself. Formal gardens and a lagoon are planned in the further development of the site. This is the first unit of an extensive building program. The architecture is in keeping with the village itself which has been called one of the outstanding reproductions of early American homes, and is often called a "transplanted New England village."

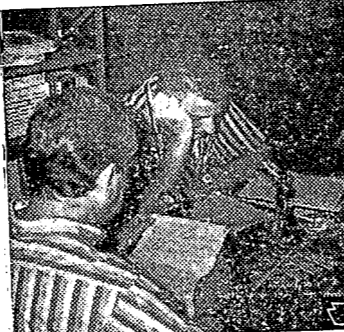

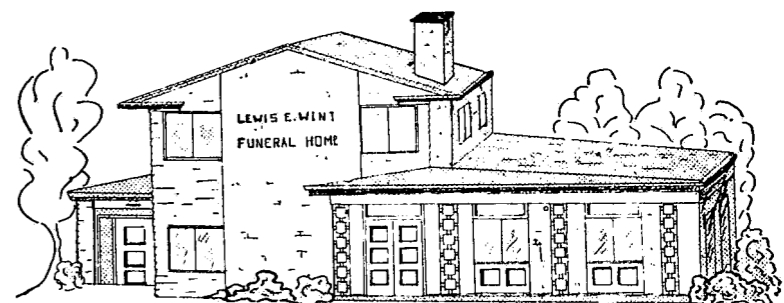

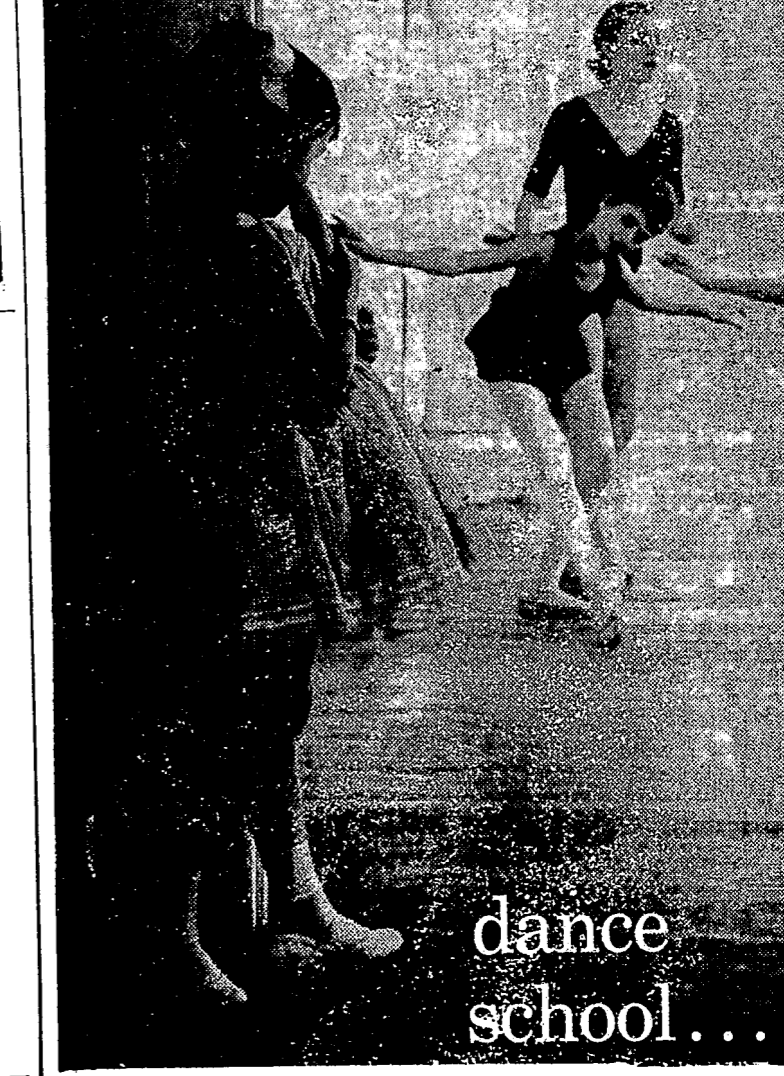

The nature of God as Spirit, not matter, will be brought out Sunday at Christian Science church services.

Opening the Biblical selections in the Lesson-Sermon entitled "Matter" are these verses from Exodus (20): "And God spake all these words saying, . . . Thou shalt have no other gods before me . . . Ye shall not make me gods of silver, neither shall ye make unto you gods of gold."
 This citation will be read from "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" by Mary Baker Eddy (pp. 199,200): "When Homer sang of the Grecian gods, Olympus was dark, but through his verse the gods became alive in a nation's belief. Pagan worship began with muscularity, but the law of Sinai lifted thought into the song of David. 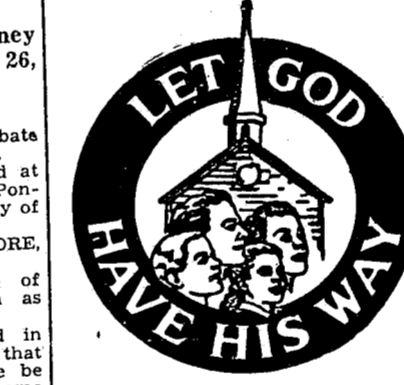

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

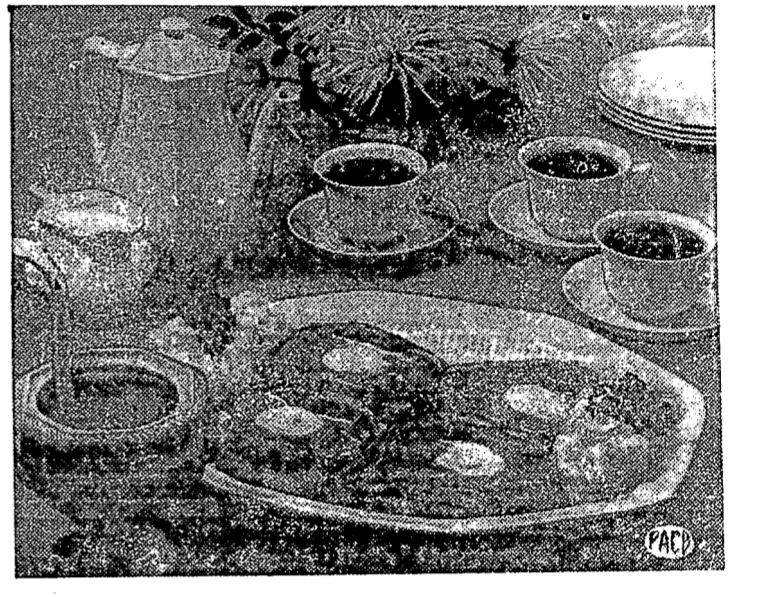

Proof Is in the Eating, Says 4-H'er



The pretty Pennsylvania 4-H miss pictured here is typical of her 4-H sisters throughout the land who can bake a mouth-watering loaf of bread or pan of golden rolls. She is like some half-million 4-H'ers enrolled in a baked foods project, reports the National 4-H Service Committee.

It was just 10 years ago that 4-H club girls took up baking as a serious project governed by rules and certain well-defined objectives spelled out by the Cooperative Extension Service. It was then that the demonstration aspect of good baking practices was launched as a national awards program, according to a 4-H Service Committee spokesman.

The awards were made possible by Standard Brands, Incorporated, and as the years went by, they were increased considerably. Today, six national scholarships of \$400 each are given to the highest ranking girls. An even dozen will qualify for expense paid trips to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago the last week in November.

For the best two-girl team demonstrators in the state and for the Individual 4-H demonstrator as well, Standard Brands provides a \$50 U. S. savings bond for each. Medals are expected to be given to an estimated 2,500 girls this year who win county recognition.
