

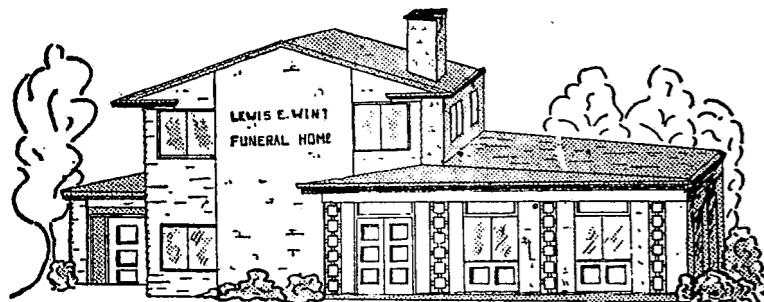

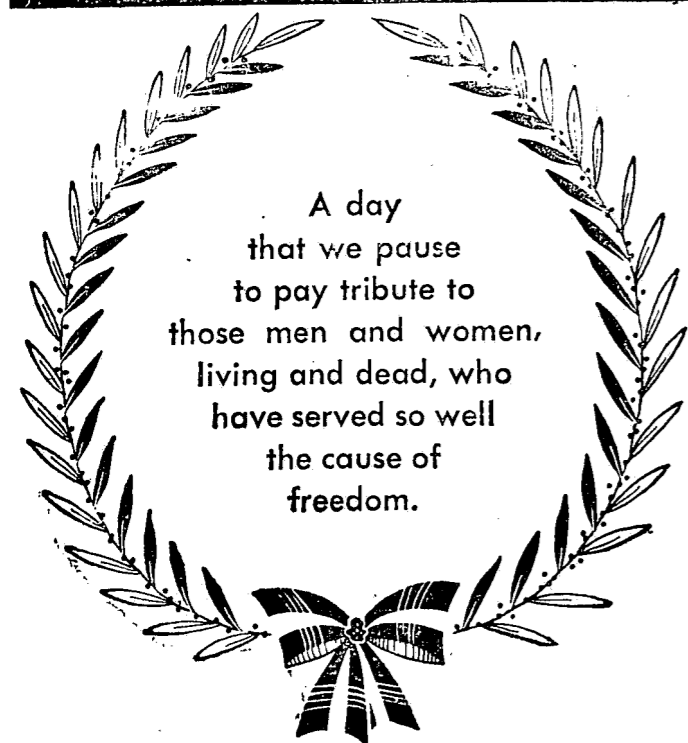
"Then he grins down at me. "By the way, Joe," he says, "I could give you a pretty good

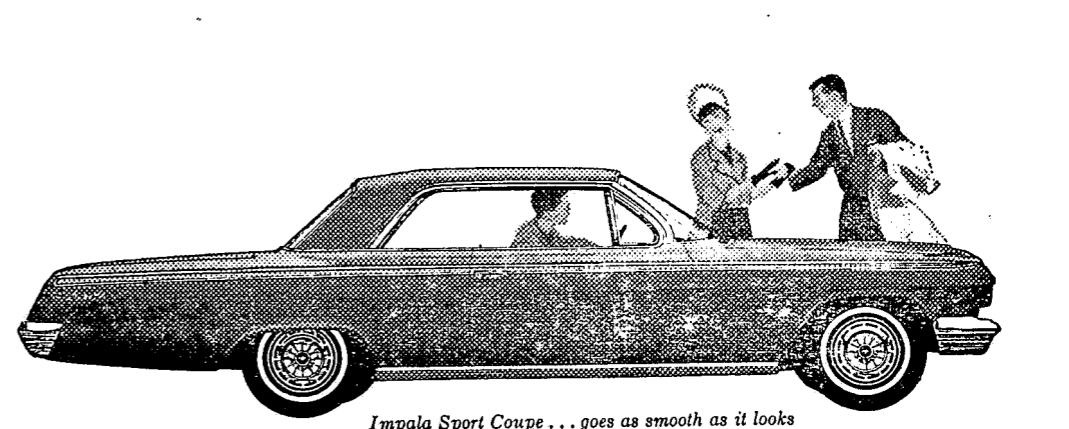

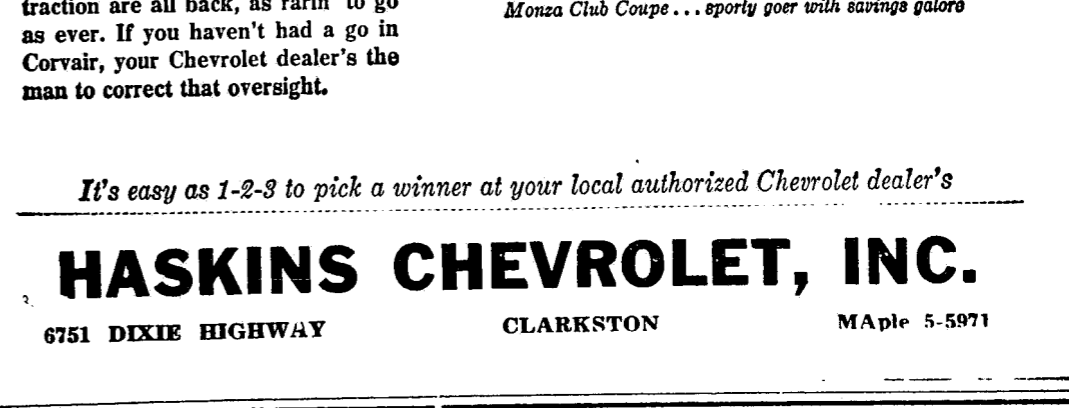
