Are we giving our children too much too soon? The Clarkston Woman's Club and their guests were given many statistics and interesting opinions on this subject last Thursday evening.

Moderator Mrs. George Gray introduced her panel consisting of Pastor Paul Johns, Calvary Lutheran Church, Clarkston; Mrs. Doris Wilkinson, Clarkston Senior High School Counselor; Mr. E. J. Zamroski, Oakland County Child Guidance Clinic; and William Donnelly, M. D., Pontiac.

Pastor Johns presented many statistics showing a relationship

between youthful marriages, financial problems, and divorce. He stated that many young courtships with the same status and properties their parents took 25 years to gain. He felt children are given material possessions without the emotional stability and sense of responsibility to accept them.

Dr. Donnelly emphasized the importance of the father's role in the home and the necessity for parents to provide love, interest and a proper example for the children.

The panel members agreed that our culture has changed and parents are at fault for pushing the children into situations before they are emotionally ready to accept the situation. In answer to the statement that child gives -- But everyone else does! -- the panel suggested the parents establish their own home rules and insist the family as a whole abide by the rules.

1961-62 SCHOLASTIC WRITING AWARDS

Christmas vacation is just around the corner and already manuscripts have been pouring in to The Detroit News for the Southeastern Michigan Scholastic Writing Awards program. The deadline for the contest is Friday, January 12, 1962, but many students prefer to get their entries in before the holidays.

Competition is open to sixth through 12th grade students in public, private, and parochial schools in Lenawee, Livingston, Macomb, Monroe, Oakland, Washtenaw, and Wayne counties. More than 12,000 manuscripts were entered in last year's contest, and over 1,000 of these merited awards.

The top regional awards are sent to New York to be judged in the national contest sponsored by Scholastic Magazines. Last year, 32 students in southeastern Michigan won national awards, including \$50 first awards, certificates of commendation, and college scholarships.

A student may enter any of the 27 classifications, ranging from a 12 line poem to a 2500 word historical article. The range of categories covers just about any type of writing a student would do for a class assignment.
