Who's Going PAY?

This was the main issue at the Clarkton Board of Education meeting Monday night. It seems that a split in the built up roofing north end classroom section. over the 11/2 year old High School building.

Sterner Company roofers, were called upon to make necessary repairs to the roof. This being done, it was thought that the condition was corrected. In a matter of days, the opening reappeared, only larger, and such has been the case several times since. Unless a correction is made is is expected that the split will extend to 60 feet before stopping.

Representatives from Kingscott, Inc., architects, Sterner Co. roofers and Schurrer Construction Co. were at the meeting to try and explain exactly what the cause of the split was, and how it could be corrected. It was broughtout that expansion of the building, a normal occurance due to the extreme temperature changes in the State of Michigan was causing the trouble .It seems that it did not appear necessary for an expansion joint to be placed in this particular section of the building. Time and mother nature have proven to the contrary.

The Board requested that King. scott lay out a plan for correcting the condition, which is gradually causing more and more damage to the roof to be carried out by the roofers. Kingsco+ apologized for the misfortune and said they would be happy to lay out a plan to correct the situation.

Who's going to pay? This question remains unsettled. Board, of course, fells that it is out of their hands. They payed to have a building construct correctly, and therefore should not be held responsible for defects in the design or construction. Kingscott feels this was unforseeable occurance for whi h they shouldn't be held responsible. Sterner Co. feels that the" did their job as instructed, and are in no way responsible.

There will be more discussion on this subject at the next Board meeting.
