Sunday At First Methodist

First Methodist Church announced last week its plans for the climax of its Christmas season with two Christmas Services on Sunday, December 24th at 9:00 and 11:15 a.m. The Church School hour at 10:00 a.m. will be omitted so that complete families may worship together in the Christmas Services. The Nursery, however, will be open under the supervision of Mrs. Curtis Bishop and Mrs. Robert Runkle.

Featured in the Christmas Services will be Rev. William J. Richards annual Christmas story for the family. This year he will tell the story of "The Fourth Wiseman." As usual Mr. A. Everett Butters, Lay Reader will assist the pastor in the service. Accompanying the six choirs of 150 voices directed by Mr. William Mansfield will be three instrumentalists, Joan Payne, french horn, James Chapman, clarinet, and Dennis Urlick, clarinet. They will play "Trio from Christmas Oratorio" by Saint-Saens. The choirs will sing "Slumber O Holy Jesus" by Wood, and will close the service with "The Hallelujah Chorus" by Handel.

In the evening of Sunday, December 24th at 7:00 p.m. the annual beautiful Christmas Eve Candlelight Holy Communion Service will be held with Rev. William J. Richards the officiant. He will bring a short meditation every eight minutes as the congregation comes and goes during the hour after having received Holy Communion. The nave will be dimly lighted by the glow of candles. The choir will provide a choral background, and the organ will softly play for the periods of meditation as the communicants come to the altar.

Some suggestions for attractive holiday serving of everyday food can be found in **Breakfast and Brunches** on the cook book shelf in your library. Such as, a festive touch can be added to the breakfast drink by setting a many pointed star cut from colored paper on each saucer, Christmas color in the scrambled eggs with the addition of pimento and green pepper or parsley, and fruits served in the shape of a wreath.

There are wonderful recipes for eggs in Mary Margaret McBride's **Harvest of American Cooking**, a book that is as exciting as a novel. It is not just a cook book but a collection of anecdotes and reminiscences of the tastes and smells of good food. She gives recipes for: Mushroom-Oyster Omelet, Pioneer Egg Woodcock and Shirred Eggs Pop-eye.

For Christmas dinner you may want something different this year. Irma S. Rombauer's **The Joy Of Cooking** can help you prepare a Roast Crown of Pork or the English favorite, Roast Beef with Yorkshire Pudding, as well as Turkey with Chestnut Dressing and Goose with Orange Sauce.

For those new cooks, young cooks or not very talented cooks **It's Easy To Be A Good Cook** by Jessie DeBoth is a real find. It

The final score is not indicative of the fine performance by the Clarkston boys, as they led 32 to 30 at the half, and 49 to 46 entering the final quarter. However, they were outscored by the fast breaking Newman team 22 to 6, to go down to their first defeat.

The church team was handicapped by the absence of their 2 big men, Dick Lippert and Don Picmann, who were both unable to attend; and as a result, played without a man over 6' 1". The Newman team had a definite height advantage with George Fed 6' 3", former Pontiac Central great; Jack Campbell, 6' 5", and Jerry Williams, 6' 3", controlling the boards. Earl McKee, captain of the Newman team, led all scorers with 19, followed by Fed with 16, Bob Gemund led the church men with 15, with Bob Yahnke and Bob Mills chipping in 10 between them. The Clarkston boys gave an excellent account to themselves for three quarters, but went completely cold the last quarter to suffer their first defeat.

This was the last game until after the first of the year. A schedule will follow in next week's paper.
