
Dutch settlers brought the custom to America. Because English speaking people had difficulty pronouncing the Dutch name, San Nicholaas, it soon changed to Santy or Santa Claus.

Two writers are credited for Santa being who he is today. .Washington Irving wrote "Knickerbocker's History of New York," and described Santa as a jolly character who rode over the tree tops in a wagon and took presents from his pockets and dropped them down chimneys. Clement C. Moore wrote "A Visit From St Nicholas" (Night Before Christmas), in which Santa is known as a round figure, with twinkling eyes, a red cherry nose, and a stump of a pipe, and the wagon became a sleigh. A Dutch dustom gave Santa the red, fur trimmed suit. It is believed that Scandinavian settlers added the
